Kizer's Outfit Smash German Installations

With The Fifth Army, Italy .-Lt. Thomas T. Kizer, battalion Motor Commander, is a member of the 403rd Field Artillery Battalion, which smashed a wealth of German installations recently in the path of Fifth Army doughboys who took a mountain overlooking Po Valley in Italy.

All their 155-millimeter howitzers pumping shells at Mount Grande continiously for nine hours on two consecutive days, the artillerymen blew up a German ammunition dump, knocked out two anti-tank guns, a self propelled gun and a 105- milimeter howitzer and accounted for at least 25 German dead.

The 403rd already has amassed 202 days in the line when it was temporarly withdrawn from combat last November 15. Most these it had served in support of the 85th "Custer" Division, but it had been attached for a time to II Army Corps.

Often the planes return to their bases riddled by flak with wounded crew members aboard. Off to the hospital they are rushed and placed under skilled hands of the doctors, then under the surveillance of the nurses. through the long hours of the day and night medications and greatly aid in raising morale of the sick.

These wounded men do not constitute all the patients in the hospitals. At times, one contacts malaria, dysentry, jaundice and other diseases less prevalent in the states as well as casualties suffered during football games and other sports. All these cases need constant care of the nurses and doctors of the Medical Corps.

Not all the trouble for officers centered around Seagraves so far as other places were concerned. Here in Brownfield the two highway patrolmen as well as county and city offices were busy every night and especially Saturday as the "loaded celebrants" not only from here, but up the Levelland, Lubbock and Tahoka highways passed through Brownfield to reach their homes, and many of them in a fair way to fading out. And some had reached the point where safety to themselves, other drivers or pedestrians were of little regard. So, even those here who like to take a bottle of beer occasionally, and go about their business, became disgusted with what they saw and heard of after effects of a souse at Seagraves.
