

The City Bank study gives the reasons and the figures. Since Pearl Harbor, we have bought from foreign nations almost \$5 billion more than they have bought from us. Much of our buying has been of needed raw materials to feed America's mighy war industries.

To pay for these goods, we have shipped some \$2.2 billion of gold abroad, and earmarked other gold here for foreign account. Thus many a foreign nation which formerly owed us money now has gold and US dollars among its assets, with which it can buy American-made goods in the post-war world. But over a period of time, the Bank believes, the U.S. could regain-if it wishes-its position as "the world's greatest creditor."

This bright new post-war world is going to bring you some surprises. One of these days a salesman will call at your store, be placed in a pool, as provided and give you a card bearing a in the loan agreement, and sold noted airplane company name. by Commodity Credit Corpor-Then the salesman will try to sell you on handling his airplane, but his line of optical goods, or farm implements, or household appliances. The statistics of this invasion of the other man's business are impressive. Dunn and Bradstreet, Inc., has just finished a survey of 22,314 companies. The survey shows that 37 per cent of the manufacturers and 44 per cent of the wholesalers plan to make or handle new lines. This does not mean new products in the sense of gadgets never made before. Of course, there will be some wholly new items. But primarily it means that established companies in one business will also try another man's established field. To illustrate: a shipbuilding company plans also to make farm implements and building material products. And, so on. The post war shoemaker apparently wants more than one

should.




