PROHIBITING THE TAKING OF WATER FROM CITY FIRE HIDRANTS, EXCEPT AS HERE-IN PROVIDED, AND PRES-ORIBING A PENALTY.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Brownfield:

That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to take from any fire hydrant in the city of Brownfield Texas, any water without written permission from the City Superintendent; provided this shall not apply to the Fire Department. Section 2.

That it shall herafter be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to take from any fire hydrant which is supplied with water from the City of Brownfield water system any water without the written consent of the City Superintendent; provided this shall not apply to the Fire Department.



Colored Sergeant Retires Here

S/Sgt. Robert Fuller, well known Brownfield colored man, after three years service with the army in the Pacific Islands, and with 179 points, came in recently to retire to civil life. His first act was to have his discharge papers, which were crowded with meritorious citations, recorded and his next was to the Ration Board, for his first book. Our Cub Reporter, who wishes every race, creed and kind, to have their just dues, in a lenghty interview, found him very intelligent and interesting.

Robert went with the very first shipment of troops to the Pacific, landing in Australia, in New Guinea, and nearby islands, finishing up with the task force that taken Leyte. His job was to haul munitions up to the front, with the jungles so thick they often met the Japs hand to hand. before either knew it. "God made them jungles a million years ago, went off and left 'em, and nobody bothered them, till now," the fallen leaves and muck often waist deep. His worst complaint was the sultry heat, fever and insects. Often a rain in torrents for a few minutes, then the sun shines out hot, and many boys suffered sunstrokes, toppling over. Their supplies and heavy weapons were carried over the Stanley mountains by the natives, who can carry unusual heavy loads, on their heads and back.

Sgt. Fuller says the Japs are hard fighters, very cunning and tricky. Our men have to take no chances, and few prisoners. They come out with raised hands, in surrender, then when close enough will pull one or more hand granades, and kill or wound several of our men, with himself. Fuller was head of a platoon of fifty men, and 15 trucks, always on detached duty. Just before any landings, the air force bombed all installations possible, and the Navy's long range guns would make a "prairie out of the jungle," where they landed. He stressed the value of teamwork, between the many branches of the military, and among their own men, and remarked, that their main object was to live and help their buddies live.
