The U.S. Senate, after reasonably brief hearings and debate, will ratify the United Nations Charter adopted at San Francisco. That is the prevailing view in Washington. There is an air of eagerness and optimism which exceeds the early expectations of friends of world organization.

Within two hours after Senator Connally arrived from the conference he gave us Texas members a preliminary report on the new charter.

Early U. S. ratification would set the pattern for other nations. War has become such a terrible destructive thing that there can be no hope for the world unless we can establish an effective organization for peace.

The charter makes dull reading, but it can and must become the greatest instrument for peace ever created by man. There will be many disappointments ahead, and we must steel ourselves against them, realizing that the Charter is far from perfect and that we must not expect too much or too little of it.

#### T-5 Tom Harred Home From 2 Years Overseas Duty

T/5 Tom Harred of Rt. Brownfield, Texas, veteran of two years of duty overseas, has completed a furlough at his home and reported yesterday at the Army Ground and Serivice Forces Redistribution Station in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

The Redistribution Station is one of the installations set up by the Army Service Forces' 8th Service Command to reassign service men and women who come back to the United States from the fighting fronts.

These returnees will stay at the station for a period of less North 4th, Brownfield, Texas, than two weeks, during which time they will be given a thorough physical examination and their records and back pay will be brought up to date. The veterans will then be given interviews so as to reassign them to Italy. the jobs where the Army will reap the fullest benefits from their qualifications.



### **Old Timer Gives Brief History Of South** Plains For Past Fifty Years

My mind runs back to over fifty

We had no conviences, but we were used to it. After all, I guess we enjoyed life about as well then as we do now.

I was raised in West Texas. I came into New Mexico, near where my ranch is at present, in the spring of 1903. In those days, there were no mail lines in this part of the country. We first got our mail from Meadow, Texas, about once a month. Later we found that by cooperating with ranchers in this area we could get our mail more often through Portales. At that time the 7L Ranch, which was located near where Bronco, Texas, now is, was sending a freight wagon to Portales once or twice a month to bring out supplies. Most of the cowboys and ranchers in this part of the country made arrangements with the 7L Ranch to bring their mail whenever the 7L brought And if you know where he has out supplies. In thinking the past over, people were not so bad then. We were all mostly crowded out for grass in Texas, and came here for this free grass and to get a start in life. Almost everybody had from a few hundred to probably a thousand cattle. And if a fellow knew his business, had plenty of good saddle horses, made friends, and treated the people right, they treated him right.

This was Chavez County at that time and Roswell, about one hundred miles west, was our County Seat. We did not need much law-It would have taken a week or ten days to make a trip to the County seat, so we generally settled our own little difficulties at home. #### BUTTER AND ICE CREAM SHOW INCREASE

Austin, Texas, July-As output of butter and ice cream increased in Texas during May, production of American cheese decreased, according to records prepared by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Compared with May, 1944, production, creamery butter production was up 6.3 per cent; ice cream, 8.9 per cent, and American cheese production decreased 3.2 per cent.

There were 2,183,000 pounds of cheese manufactured in the month; 4,250,000 pounds of butter, and 2,276,000 gallons of ice cream.

#### ONLY THE FREE EAT WELL

"Some of our more advanced thinkers," says the Wall Street Journal, "have had the effrontery to put into so many words a statement to the effect that 'freedom is all right but you can't eat it.'

"Well, perhaps you can't eat freedom. But note one thing. People who do not have freedom are likely not to eat."

Proof of the latter statement becomes more evident in the United States each day. Due to wartime restrictions, the people of our country have given up many of their freedoms, a principal one being the right to produce and sell.

We have accepted wartime rationing and price control as essential to the distribution of existing supplies. But as we have given up our freedom to produce, supplies have dwindled until the United States today faces acute shortages of the essentials of life. All the alibis that are offered in the name of "anti-inflation," will not supply the nation's needs when freedom to produce and sell is gone.

his cattle every night, kept strict herd on them, and picked up all the unbranded calves he thought he could get off with. He killed other people's beef every week, never ate his own. It looked as if he would soon get rich. But all the other cowmen were against him. If any of his cattle got away, he likely never saw them any more. Someone ate them, crippled, or ran them off. They did his horses the same way. They watched him and kept him in the Roswell Court. Even if he beat the case, the expense they put him to, hiring lawyers and making the long trips to Rohwell, with all expenses, kept him broke. Someone kept him in Court all the time. He finally had to leave here, broke and with no friends, when homesteaders began to settle the country.

Them days I would generally try and locate our cattle at home. We kept a saddle horse handy. When the snow storms came, I would try to throw our cattle in a little pasture until the storm was over.
