

Many people who I know have received their allotment earlier in the week, come in the later part of the week insisting that they have not made such purchases. While we know they have received their quota, we get called down if we question their veracity."

Voluntary action by retailers, in which they must have the cooperation of the public, can avert much compulsory rationing which is so distasteful to the average citizen. But it must be a two-way proposition-the customer must cooperate with the store.

Chain stores with many outlets and a uniform policy are leaders in promoting voluntary rationing. The consumer should help in his own best interest.
