Says Postmaster

Through recent improvement in Air Mail service for this section of the country, the Brownfield Post Office now offers extremely good service to the larger Texas cities via Air Mail. Until recently Air Mail postage was of practically no value to the larger Texas cities, due to the late arrivals of trains for the Air Mail redistribution centers of Dallas and Fort Worth. With the exception these two cities, letters for the larger Texas cities mailed after 11 a. m., at this office were not received in time for delivery the following day. Air Mail for Texas points was formerly dispatched to Dallas and Fort Worth for train redistribution. Under present schedules Air Mail is dispatched to Amarillo by star route and dispatched from Amarillo to Dallas and Fort Worth for much better service, says Postmaster Greenfield.

An Air Mail letter deposited at the Brownfield postoffice not later than 6:45 p. m. will arrive at the following Texas points on the following day at the time given:

This new Air Mail service is also beneficial for mail addressed to the smaller town and cities in east and northeast Texas, as the mail arrives in Dallas for connection with the early morning trains.

In connection of the above it might also be mentioned that due to the fact that Lubbock is now an Air Mail point, most of the incoming Air Mail for the Brownfield office now arrives one day earlier than formerly, stated Mr Greenfield.







Texas To Participate In Cotton Campaign

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 10-Texas position as the nations No. 1 cotton state has been reflected by its participation in the cotton industry's campaign to raise \$2,000,000 fighting fund to protect cotton's markets when the war ends, the National Cotton Council pointed out today.

The Lone Star state leads in the number of cottonseed crushers participating in the drive with 50 signed, and also is first in the number of cotton merchants with 39 already taking part. It is second in the number of gins signed with 605, and third in the number of compresses with 32 enlisted.

All branches of the cotton industry have joined in the campaign, which is sponsored by the Council, whose research labratories are located in Dallas and Austin. The campaign calls for 20 cents on each bale of cotton produced to finance scientific research, sales promotion, and oth-l er projects. Half of the fund will | come from cotton producers, and half from handlers and proces-

Oscar Johnston, Counci president, points out that any extensive loss of markets after the war would seriously disrupt the economy of Texas and other southern states, since cotton means \$2,552,000,000 in annual income. More than 15,000,00 people either directly or indirectly are affected by this income, he added.

Sgt. Hardin is married. He lives with his wife, Verna, and eight year old daughter, Peggy Lou, at 1217 Ave. I., Galveston.

As to his plans when he becomes "Mr." Hardin, he said, "I think I'll go back into construction work. Before I went into the army I was a carpenter. I'll probably start contracting for myself."




