The Miller fought the war from the Marshall Islands to Tokyo seven times arounds the world with fast carrier forces during its part in a total of 27 engagements.

It was the Miller that rescued some of the first survivors of the blasted carrier USS Franklin while explosions and fires were raking that vessel from stem to stern. The destroyer pulled away to transfer the rescued personnel to another Proclaims Christmas carrier, but quickly returned to the Franklin.

Pausing along the way to pull 11 exhausted survivors from the water, she spent most of the afternoon and evening alongside the carrier, pumping water into her fires until the guages of her

pumps blew out from the strain. The skipper of the Miller received the Navy Cross for his part in helping save the Franklin.

Coxswain Brown Helps Take Ie Shima

T. P. Brown, coxswain, Brownfield, went ashore at tiny Ie Shima (where the famed Ernie Pyle met his death) to carry on the work of a Fleet unit bearing the legend still raged 200 yards from the beaches, Navy records of that operation have disclose.

"GroPac" became a highly respected term in the Navy because of its performances at Ie Shima and other bitterly-contested islands in the Pacific. The term is short for Group, Pacific, which served as a part of the Service Force, Pacific Fleet.

The job of "GroPac", after landings had been effected, was to unload the huge quantities of supplies from the LSM's, LCT's and barges, supplies without which the island beachheads and advances could not have been sustained Group, Pacific also included small boat repair which worked 24 hours a day to put wrecked and damaged craft back in shape.

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

EAT CABBAGE WHEN FIRST COOKED

College Station-If cooked cabbage is on the menu, the family should answer the dinner call promptly, says Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Otherwise, the cabbage, kept over hot water to keep it warm for serving, loses a very large per cent of the vitamin C. Shredded cabbage cooks only about half the vitamin C of raw cabbage.

Strange as it may seem, cooked cabbage held in the refrigerator two or three days and then reheated does not lose as much vitamin C as that kept standing on the stove an hour or so. When warmed up after refrigeration it contains 24 to 32 per cent of the vitamin C it had when fresh and raw, Miss Lawrence states.
