Dale Hutchins, son of Mrs. Rentfro, former well-known teacher here, was killed in a plane crash near San Francisco, Tuesday, according to information received here by Mrs. Lois Wingerd, and Mrs. Lee Lyons, an aunt of the boy. His mother, now Mrs. C. E. Motley, living at Monahans, is enroute to the California city to return the body for burial, at Monahans, possibly next Sunday.

Dale spent most of his early youth in Brownfield, attending the school here. He enlisted in the Canadian R.A.F., some six years ago. Upon the U.S. entering the war, he served as transport pilot throughout the Pacific area, and in north Africa, and had re-enlisted only two weeks ago. He was ferrying by plane at the time of his untimely death, details of which were not learned. He was 22 years of age.

## Spencer Kendrick Dies Suddenly

This city was shocked last Tuesday evening, when the tragic news spread through town, that Spencer Kendrick, prominent young banker and business man, had died suddenly while working on the roof of the dwelling of his brother-in-law, O. L. Stice, at 620 East Tate street.

It was learned that Kendrick, in assisting Stice in unstopping a flue, had gone up on the one story roof, and while there, Stice and his wife Gladys, sister of Kendrick, who were on the ground, said he seemed to swoon, grasped the flue with both hands, then rolled or slid off. They both caught him, the impact bearing them down. He was rushed by ambulance to the Treadaway-Danjiel hospital, where all efforts of resuscitation failed. Attending physicians stated he sustained no broken neck or skull fractures, and found heart failure to be the immediate cause of his death.

Funeral services were conducted at 3:30 p. m. Thursday, by Rev. H. W. Hanks, former pastor, assisted by Rev. R. N. Huckabee, pastor of the Methodist church, followed by interment in the Terry County Memorial cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, at 420 East Tate street, and two sons, Herbert Spencer, aged 11, and Sammy Kaye, aged 8; two brothers, Clovis, of 418 E. Tate and Richard, now with the U. S. Air Force in France, who could not be present; one sister, Mrs. Gladys Stice, at home.

He was born at Plains in 1912. Eight years later the family moved to Brownfield, his father being one of the founders and president of the First National Bank of this city. After finishing the Brownfield High school he assumed a position in the bank, and had become active vice president at the time of his untimely death. He assumed responsible roles in the bank's daily business. In 1934 he married Miss Elsie Woolsey of Tahoka, whose sister, Mrs. Daniel Davis is Deputy County Tax Collector here.

He was former president, and member of the local Lions club, and of the Masonic Order, the latter extending their rites, and officiating at the funeral.

AN EDITORIAL

Blessed is the South Plains, and most of rural Texas. Because of its agricultural diversification, livestock and small businesses, it hardly knew the recent war was on. Though there was some complaints about this and that, its people fared well, had plenty to eat, and moved about their habitats at will and amicably. True it sent its fair and full quota of sons to the battle fronts. It always subscribed its full quota to Bond drives, Red Cross, and other benevolent purposes. And presumably, its share of parents received that awful message from the War department. Because of consistent home production, we didn't have to go into black markets for our normal living.

Now that the strikes, in the industrial North and East, have all but stopped their way of living, and causing starvation to face its millions, yet this great section, though feeling the increasing absence of mechanical things, like old man river, just keeps rolling along. Because of our remoteness, if it can be called that, mainly because of our living naturally close to the land of plenty, we are not suffering the turmoil and anxiety of the artificial living in the industrial north and east.

For many years, we have wondered why Texas, with its variety of resources as vast as its domain, had not procured more manufacturing. It has been urged by some, and expected by many, and it has been noted that so many sons of capital from the north, spending months in our military camps, visited by their capitalistic parents, seeing the abundant opportunities, and wherewith for industry, would soon begin industrializing Texas. This is being advocated and hoped for, by some, yet with all the griefs and headaches, dire, and serious results of the many strikes up yonder, maybe we best leave off some of this C of C ambitions, remain as we are, and let well enough alone. Good old Texas, just let it alone.

State's Youths Offered Awards

Texas town and country boys and girls are entering competition for college scholarships in a nationwide contest of the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association.

Outlining the sixth annual vegetable production and marketing project, Hines said: "Working with the soil is an education in itself, and the contest is designed to give awards as an incentive to efficient gardening and marketing. Size of project is not a factor, since contestants are scored on efficiency, improvements in methods, leadership in community and school activities, and scores attained in a study course."

Scholarships to be awarded in 1946 include \$500 to the national champion; a \$200 scholarship for each of the four regional winners; \$100 checks to 33 sectional winners and the remainder of the award money in lesser awards within each state. The contest is open to all boys and girls between 12 and 21 years of age.

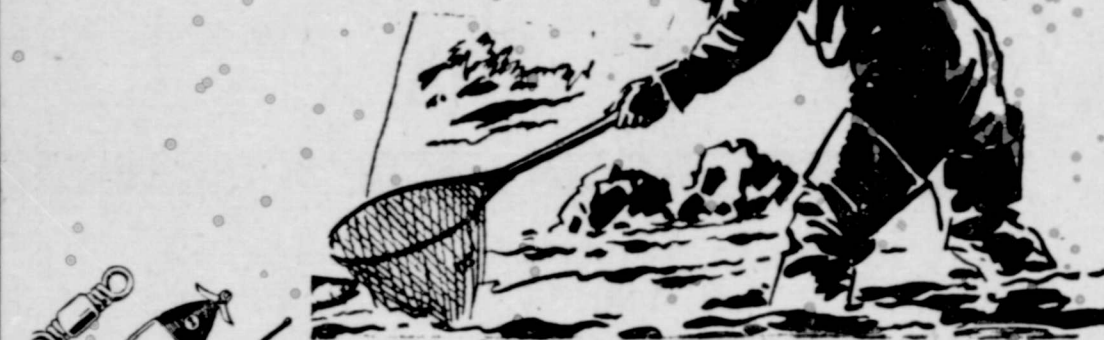

**SIDELIGHTS  
From Washington**

By George Mahon

Many farm and ranch people in Texas are experiencing a delay in getting rural electrification services. Where the delay is caused by the lack of funds by the local REA, much hope is offered by the fact that the President last week asked Congress to increase REA loan authorizations by one hundred million dollars. This would mean about five million dollars in new loans to Texas—more than to any other state—and would take care of the more pressing applications for the next few months.

Claude Wickard, head of REA, has asked some of us who have sponsored the REA program through the years to try to get Congressional action on the new request by March 1st. This we are trying to do.

Prior to July 1st, the beginning of the new fiscal year, we plan to provide an additional and greatly expanded REA program. It is estimated that it will take seven years to fully complete the REA program of making electricity available to all rural homes. Only one farm home out of every three in Texas now has electricity. A rapid expansion of REA in Texas should be one of our major post-war objectives.

Many people have written me about the Poage Bill, which provides REA loan authorizations for a three year period. I am supporting the bill, as it would make possible a better system of planning for the local REA co-ops. However, the best hope for early success on pending projects is the recent request of the President.

This week I was appointed chairman of a five-man subcommittee to handle all appropriations in the House of Government-owned Corporations. The appointment was made by Clarence Cannon, Chairman of the Appropriations Committee.

By an act of Congress approved last December, Congress proposes to keep a closer rein on Government-owned Corporations.

We will have jurisdiction over the Commodity Credit Corporation, which handles loans on cotton and other commodities, Reconstruction Finance Corporation, Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, TVA, and all other wholly owned Government Corporations, totaling in all about forty. The programs of these agencies have

It is too early to tell what our committee will be able to do in promoting economy and improving the service which these various agencies are required to render to the American people. We will do our best to promote and safeguard the public interest.

In addition to the new assignment, I will continue my work on the War Department and Independent Offices Subcommittees.

According to the latest Census report, the 25-county 19th Congressional District has harvested 202,000 bales of cotton from the 1945 crop. This seems very small when compared to the 1,120,000 bales produced by the same 25 counties in 1937.

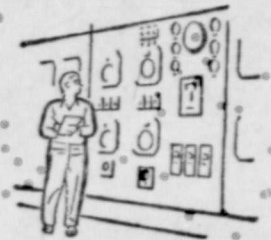

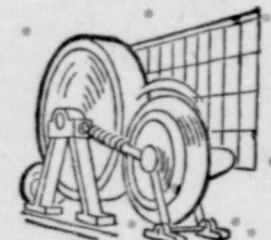

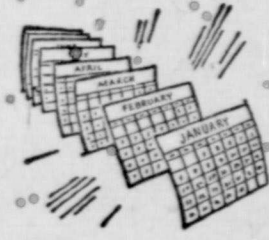

**Texas And Annexation**

(Fifteenth in the series of articles on Annexation by Dr. Eugene C. Barken, Professor of American History, The University of Texas.)

**CONGRESS VOTES ANNEXATION, TYLER URGES ACTION**

Tyler and his advisers believed sincerely that there was danger of losing Texas. The fear of British designs was very real, and he did not wait for the incoming administration to take action. In his message of December 3, 1844, he reviewed the history of Texas to show that it was actually independent and that there was no obstacle in international law to annexation. The chief argument against ratification of the treaty, he said, had been that "the question of annexation had not been submitted to the ordeal of public opinion in the United States." That objection no longer existed. "The great popular election which has just been terminated afforded the best opportunity of ascertaining the will of the states and the people upon it. . . . the decision of the people and the states . . . has been decisively manifested. The question of annexation has been presented nakedly to their consideration . . . A controlling majority of the people and a large majority of the states have declared in favor of immediate annexation. . . . If it is the will of both the people and the states that Texas shall be annexed to the Union promptly and immediately."

Of course, we know that interpretation of election returns is notoriously equivocal. Probably no single issue is ever presented "nakedly" to the voters, as Tyler asserted. Many who voted the Democratic ticket were indifferent to Texas; many favored annexation, and others voted in spite of the platform. Tyler was correct, however, in his assumption that the voters clearly understood that Democratic victory would hasten annexation.

**Congress Acts**

Regardless of their attitude toward Tyler, members of Congress were ready to act. First and last, eight or ten bills were introduced proposing annexation or varying terms. One resolution proposed to incorporate the defeated treaty into an act of Congress and admit Texas as a territory. Another proposed to annex Texas directly as a state. This proposal passed the House of Representatives. The Senate made various amendments. One amendment, offered by Benton of Missouri, gave the President the option of proceeding to annex Texas directly, with its consent, or of offering to negotiate a new treaty, a procedure which might enable Texas to obtain advantages not specified in the original resolution, but which, at the same time, would expose annexation again to the hazard of ratification by the Senate. The House accepted the Senate amendment. Which alternative would the President adopt?

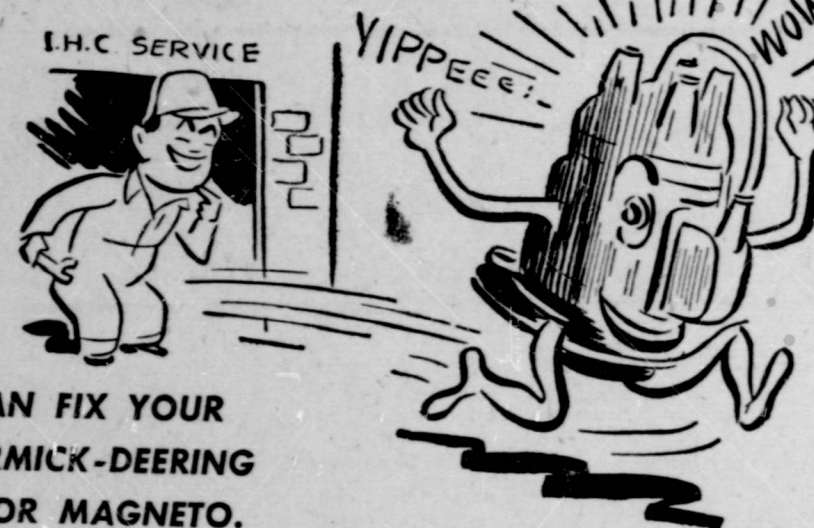
