## **Colored School Closes Next Week**

According to Mrs. L. M. Sparks, the colored school on north side, was named in honor of Phyllis Wheatley, the first small negro girl brought over from Africa in the dawn of American slavery. A white woman named Wheatley of Philadelphia, noting the child's unusual ability, took her over and educated her. She later became a famed poetess of that day and is a heroine among the literary colored folks.

The school, a two roomed wooden structure, has 95 pupils and their daily attendance averages 65. Several recently enlisted in military forces. Mrs. Sparks, who has taught here six years, is a graduate of Prairie View Normal, and holds a first grade permanent certificate. She is assisted by Miss Eddie Sayles, who has a college diploma from a Tyler college. One teaches sewing, the other music along with their regular courses They teach from the first to the twelfth grades. They have 12 pupils in high school classes, but will have no graduates this term. One, a Miss Richardson, went from this

school to a Tyler college last year. They will have a picnic and ball game today, and expect visitors from Seagraves, O'Donnell, Tahoka and Slaton. They will stage open house next Wednesday, the 15th, for their patrons, and the white folks are invited to come by and inspect their work. Mrs. Sparks expressed thanks for the kindness of many white folks. and will appreciate magazines, books and pictures, and anything that would aid her pupils.

Without any graduation exercises or programs, the school will close May 17th.

Q. Is there any restriction on the use of the money secured from a loan guaranteed by the Veterans Administration?

A. Yes. Funds secured from a loan may be used only to purchase, build, repair, alter, or improve a home or farm to be occupied by the veteran, or to purchase a business property, or equipment to be used by the veteran for the purpose of earning a livelihood.

Q. In an emergency, how can a veteran secure admission to veterans hospital?

A. Before proceeding to a Veterans Administration Hospital, the veteran or someone acting for him should communicate with the nearest VA contact unit or hospital by telephone or telegraph, and request authority for admission and for transportation, if necessary. Prior authority is needed before a person can be reimbursed for any expenses incurred in such

Q. Should a man who obtains National Service Life insurance from the Government while in the military or naval service retain such insurance after discharge?

A. By all means, because the premium rates are low in comparison with the rates of private insurance, especially in view of the valuable protection granted. After separation from active service, veterans cannot apply for new National Service Life insurance and the obtaining of new insurance with private companies will have to be accomplished at his present age for which rates would necessarily be higher. Furthermore, the additional medical examination which would be required for a new non-government policy might disclose some impaired health condition which would bar the granting of new insurance by the private company. If the veteran has let his National Service insurance lapse, he should seek its reinstatement at


> Governor I. W. Duggan of the Farm Credit Administration has appeared in support of the four Government Corporations under his supervision, all having a direct bearing on the year to year operations of millions of American farms.

Governor Duggan expressed alarm over the sky-rocketing of farm land prices. However, in contrasting the rise in farm real estate during World War I and World War II, he pointed out the encouraging fact that while the mortgage debt of farmers rose sharply during World War I, the mortgage debt of farmers went down during World War II. The mortgage debt of farmers is now 5 1/4 billion dollars, the lowest since 1916.

The remarkable war record of the farmers of America was made in spite of manpower and machinery shortages and often in the face of inadequate prices.

According to Governor Duggan, the total assets-real estate and otherwise-of farmers have increased from 53 billion dollars in 1940 to 90 billion dollars in 1946. He said that American farmers are now indebted for all purposes only to the extent of 10% of their Government bonds and bank deposits the farmers of the Nation have a total of 15 billion dollars.

## Tech Man Advises Spraying of Fruits

Lubbock - Fruit crops in the South Plains area should be protected against worms this year, according to Dr. W. W. Yocum, professor of horticulture at Texas Technological College.

A spray of lead arsenate, composed of about one to two tablespoons of the compound to one gallon of water, shuld be used, Yocum says.

Apple trees particularly should be sprayed at once in order that a dose of poison may get into the blossom end of the apple before it closes. The worms try to enter there, and unless spraying is done before the blossom end closes, the poison will be ineffective.

## Mumps Now On Upgrade In Texas

Austin, Texas - With a total of 5,906 cases of mumps having been reported in Texas in the first seventeen weeks of this year, Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, has issued a statement stressing the fact that the contagion factor exists before symptoms appear, and urging strict isolation of all patients, in order to control the spread of this disease.

Mumps is transmitted by direct contact with an infected person and with articles freshly soiled by the secretions or discharges from the mouth or nose of persons having the disease. It takes from 12 to 26 days for mumps to manifest itself after the infection takes place. The disease can be easily transmitted, but one attack usually establishes immunity although second attacks sometimes occur.

The most easily recognizable characteristic symptom of mumps is a painful swelling of the salivary glands. Sometimes there is an involvement of other portions of the body causing disturbances in the digestive, nervous, circulatory, and genito-urinary systems. The disease is usually accompanied by a temperature rise which more often than not is mild.

"The patient suffering with this disease should be isolated from other members of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exists, and the family physician should be called promptly," Dr. Cox advises. "In the meantime, complete rest in bed is in-
