

There is an altogether different aspect on life from what existed while the skies were as brass and the sun beat down hard and hot, wilting everything but goatheads, johnson grass and rag weeds. We often thought that if some Burbank could cross or graft maize and cotton stalks onto johnson grass or rag weeds, all future drouths would be whipped to a

Anyway, there is now bouyancy in the people where a little more than a week ago, pessimism reigned supreme. They had heard that the old south Plains always stages a comeback, but some had began to doubt. It looked as if there was not a drop of water in a car load of clouds. The clouds ould come up, thunder and lightning like nobody's business, but a sprinkle or light shower-maybe a dust storm-would result.

Well, we have talked with a number of our farm machinery men and they tell us that new iarm machinery is beginning to arrive, faster and faster, but every tractor, combine or what have you, is quickly snatched up. The people evidently believe that the worst of the drouth is over, maybe for several years, and that good crops will abound for the next eight or ten year cycle.

By that time, the writer believes that many of the Terry county farms will be equipped with big wells and pumps, and that farming will be carried on wet or dry





The Veterans Administration is still grappling with the problem of getting nurses although it offers salaries and other benefits well above private scales. Miss Dorothy MacLeod, Chief Nurse in the Dallas Branch Office of VA, said this week.

VA hospitals in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi, are short 400 nurses, Miss MacLeod said. In some hosptials, notably the huge installation at Temple, Texas, formerly operated by the Army, VA has had to restrict the entrance of patients, she added.

Appealing especially to former nurses in the armed forces, Miss MacLeod said: "Thousands of the younger boys and men of World War II, so well cared for by Army and Navy nurses, are now in VA hospitals. They still need your help."

Salaries for VA nurses range from \$2645 to \$5905 per year, Miss MacLeod said. In addition, VA offers retirement pensions, recreational facilities and other benefits under a new Department of Medicine and Surgery.

VA is now planning a program of training that will be attractive to younger nurses just coming out of schools, Miss MacLeod said.

Application forms for amputee veterans to use in obtaining cars at government expense are expected to be available from VA offices in the Dallas Branch Area in about two weeks, VA announced this week.

VA is responsible for administering the new \$30,000,000 program enacted by Congress to provide automobiles or other conveyances for disabled veterans of World War II who are "entitled to compensation for the loss, or loss of use, of one or both legs at or above the ankle."

## **GI** Question And **Answer Department**

Q. I signed a statement before my discharge that my disability existed prior to my enlistment. Does this bar me from receiving a pension?

A. No. Under Title 1, Section 105, Public Law 346, 78th Congress, any statement of this nature which you may have made at dis-

charge is considered null and void. Q. Are insurance benefits received by the parent considered as income.

A. In determining dependency, amounts received by the mother or father from any insurance under the War Risk Insurance Act, or the World War Veterans Act of 1924 as amended, or the National Service Life Insurance Act as amended will be disregarded.

Q. Under what circumstances are parents considered dependent?

A. Dependency will be held to exist if the parents do not have an income sufficient to provide reasonable maintenance for themselves and members of their family under legal age or otherwise dependent by reason of mental or physical incapacity.
