



Cross Breeding In Dairy Herds, **Bad Business**

LUBBOCK, Dec. 26 - Under no circumstances should farmers and dairymen crossbreed purebred dairy animals, according to Prof. K. M. Renner, head of the department of dairy manufactures at Texas Technological College.

Improvement of dairy herds is perhaps the most important factor today in profitable production, the professor stated, pointing out that a few good animals will give more milk at less cost than a large number of poor cows.

Any good purebred cow is likey to produce milk more economcally than a crossbreed, Renner



United States who met the exacting advanced-breeding requireprovement Plan during the 1945- schools. 46 season, twelve were Texas breeders, the Department of Agriculture has announced. The Texas Breeders who met the requirements numbered twice as many as any other state. Kansas had six of the top-notch flocks, and the remainder were distributed among Minnesota, Missouri, Oklahoma, New Hampshire, Maryland and Washington.

The requirements of the National Poultry Improvement Plan include trap-nesting pedigreeing and progeny testing. These procedures, which involve extensive records, are laborious, costly and time consuming but they have proved to be a valuable basis for the breeding of exceptionally high-quality turkeys, the Department of Agriculture explains. The advanced stages of the turkey improvement plan in which the Texas breeders took part are known officially as U. S. Register of Merit and U. S. Record of Performance, the former being tops.







Income Tax Time Coming Soon

Thousands of Texas farm and ranch operators must soon bring and start figuring income tax re-

All farmers with a gross income January 15, followed by a final DON'T SCRATCH! return by March 15, or, he can make a final return by January 15, in which case he does not have to file a declaration.

While a record number of farmthe average tax bill will be less in rate and the combination or the normal tax and surtax levies, Bates says. Farm income taxes should average about 17 per cent less than in 1945 predicts the farm management specialist.

A change in the tax law permits deduction, as a business expense, on reasonable wages paid by a father to a minor dependent actually employed on the farm or a different proposition from any Department in Washington as well

of breeding cattle may be taxable. Bates advises farm operators to consult their county agricultural agents for information on this point or contact an Internal Revenue deputy.


