## Colored School Wins Dimes Contest

The Phyllis Wheatley school for the colored folks, in north part of town won the Ten Dollar prize offered by March of Dimes committee in a contest ending last week. The contest was based on the largest amount raised for the drive according to number of pupils. The list is as follows:

Lee Fulton, who delivered the prize in absence of Lee O. Allen, said it was worth the prize to see the joy expressed on the children's faces.

The Womens part of the bridge and 42 party held by them Thursday of last week at the Legion hall netted \$150. Many valuable prizes were donated by local merchants.

The overall drive brought in a little over \$2800.000, including a liberal donation from Yoakum county.

These funds are to be used in treatment and combating the spread of infantile paralysis. Terry county had about seven cases during last year, some were apparently cured, others are still under treatment.

## Building Program For Colleges Outlined

Twenty-three members of the state senate are co-authors of a joint resolution submitting a constitutional amendment authorizing a building program at the 16 state-supported colleges and Universities.

The resolution was introduced on the third day of the general session of the Legislature by Sen. Keith Kelly of Fort Worth. A similar resolution will be introduced in the house of representatives.

The proposed amendment which would be submitted to the people next summer, if senate and house approve it, is the result of unanimous agreement among the 16 state-supported schools on what they conceived to be the best plan for meeting building needs which have been brought into sharp relief by the great influx of veterans enrolling under benefits of the G. I. Bill. Governor Beauford Jester has endorsed the program.

The fact that 23 members are co-authors of the resolution is an indication the resolution will receive prompt approval of the senate, where 21 votes are needed for final passage.

Joining Kelly as co-authors of the amendment which permits the University of Texas and Texas A & M College to issue \$15,000,000 in bonds payable out of income from the university permanent fund and permits the other 14 schools to issue bonds payable out of the revenue from five cents of the presently-authorized 25-cent state property tax for general fund purposes.

## County Club Elects New Officers

About 100 members of the Country Club met at Courthouse Monday night and elected Prentice Walker president, Glen Akers and Lee O. Allen as directors. They also conducted other business furthering the building and grounds at their club site east of town.

They expect to soon install their shooting skeet, the swimming pool to be ready by summer and the golf course is useable. The club house 60 by 120 is to be erected in next 60 days.

## BUILDING PERMITS INCREASE

Building permits issued the past week, totaled \$16,250.00, this includes a \$9,000 residence on East Tate, being erected by Jas. F. Daniel, formerly of Meadow, now living here. The others are for remodeling and for some smaller houses.

## Too Many Being Killed On Highways

AUSTIN, Feb. 6 —An automobile collision can kill a human being just as certainly as cancer, and a traffic accident can cripple just as badly as poliomyelitis, and for this reason Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges Texans to protect their health and lives by using the utmost care on highways.

"It is the duty of the State Health Department to do everything in its power to foster good health and prevent as many needless deaths as possible," Dr. Cox declared, "and because so many Texans each year are killed, permanently crippled, or disabled for long periods of time through preventable traffic accidents, I earnestly urge every driver in the State to do his conscientious best to help reduce the number of these tragic and often fatal smash-ups."

Dr. Cox said that it is a driver's responsibility to know that his lights, tires and brakes are in good condition; that he pay proper attention to traffic signals and road signs; that he give due regard to other drivers and pedestrians; that he use great caution at un-marked inter-sections, and above all, he urged, "use common sense and follow a live-and-let-live policy when in your car, whether driving to the corner grocery, or going from coast to coast."

## Suspect Confesses To Culver Murder

Harrold Romeo Dove, of Halifax, Vermont, was arrested in Enid, Oklahoma last Wednesday in connection with the slaying of Bill Culver here on Dec. 30.

Culver's badly battered body was found by a train crew at 1:15 p. m., New Year's Day. The body had been placed away from the highway across the railroad, thus delaying discovery. The train crew stopped some passing motorists who summoned officers from Seagraves and Brownfield. Sheriff Ocie Murry, who had been sworn in a few hours previous, Deputy Bual Powell and Justice of Peace W. H. Dallas responded from here.

Culver's failure to arrive here Dec. 30 alarmed his wife. She with her daughter Mrs. Hanks of Levelland started the search that night. It ended with the discovery by the train crew on Jan. 1.

The suspect, Dove, 18, told officers he had traveled over 32 states and had worked in Plains a month earlier. He admitted leaving Culver's car in Amarillo and working in Borger. He worked Borger until he read that he was suspected of the murder and had traveled as far as Enid when the law trapped him. His residence had been traced to Vermont, where officers has mistakenly taken his father name. Dove was reportedly on his way home when arrested.

The young suspect was taken to Austin and submitted to a lie detector test by the State Department of Public Safety. When the lie detector test and other corroborating evidence was thrust upon him, he confessed to the murder. He is being held in jail here, pending action of the grand jury.

## Poll Tax Payments Show Decline

Tax Collector Herbert Chesshir, reports 2347 poll tax payments up to the deadline, January 31 for Terry county. There were 3069 for 1945. Overs and unders not having to register, will likely be same as last year. It is thought this being an off year, with no heated election expected, many just neglected paying.

He also reports about 90 per cent of property taxes being paid. Those failing to pay such taxes will automatically incur a penalty after February 1.

So anxious is the state of Tennessee to get their farmers to plant pine on their eroded lands, young pine seedlings are being offered at county seat towns for \$2 per thousand. That certainly is some inducement to get the red hills of old Tennessee growing something more profitable than gullies.

C. W. Ratcliff, staff writer of the Avalanche-Journal had a very interesting article last Sunday in

those publications, starting on page one, with two illustrations on the very new subject, Alcoholics Anonymous. We say new, as it has not been too long since we began to see articles about this group of mutually helpful men who had let J. Barleycorn get the best of them. Mr. Ratcliff, who was allowed to visit their meeting, but could use no names, says that some 60 now belong to the Lubbock club, and understanding their conditions more than some one who had not let liquor get the better of them, they seem to be of great mutual help. Of the two pictures made, all faces were blotted out, as they would no longer be anonymous if they had been recognizable. It is a pitiable condition, and perhaps more sympathy and less censure would be helpful.

Boog-Scott died at Cleburne last Friday, and perhaps little more than an inch or two down some obscure daily paper column would have announced the fact had not this Scotland born Texan played a leading role in the cattle industry in Texas. During the time back many years ago when the foot and mouth disease invaded Texas from old Mexico, Boog-

Scott was a member of the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission. It is related that he obtained a great ditching machine from a railroad company in south Texas, and after a huge and deep trench was made, he ordered all the suspected cattle killed and rolled into that trench. Thus, almost single handed Boog-Scott, rancher and cattleman, stamped out the most dreaded livestock disease ever to invade Texas.

Just why upper classmen ever get the idea that their flesh is superior to the clay of the freshmen, is beyond us. Or why they think it's great to abuse and humiliate younger men or boys by making "maids" out of them to satisfy the senior's ever whim, we can't figure. To us its nothing more or less than Hitlerism gone to seed, and the people of Texas are paying taxes to encourage this form of nazism. Not many years ago, one of our freshmen down at A & M, wrote his folks about conditions. We innocently said in these columns just what we thought of such stunts. The boy told us later that when that paper came to him, he burned the last bit of it for fear upper classmen would see the Herald

and read the article. We are for President Gib Gilchrist 109 percent, and we hope he stamps out this condition if he has to send every upper classman home or to jail. Texas don't need such cattle.

Even had the ground hog failed to see his shadow Sunday, and he did as it was very clear here we still think we are in for some blooming cold weather for six weeks; maybe more. And in this we are backed by the opinion of the official weathermen.

For the past several days we have been trying to figure out just what Editor Joiner meant by an article in his Rails Banner last week. Was he being funny, serious or sarcastic? We refer to an article about the regents of the University of Texas stopping the pay of professors on leave of absence, after one year. One J. Frank Dobie, now on leave for some four years was specifically mentioned. Well, the board of regents are not paying Mr. Dobie or any faculty members' salary; it is the taxpayers of the state of Texas that do the paying. In the meantime Dobie is running around lecturing and writing books while drawing a salary. And as for Editor Joiner getting his children in

### Mental Cases 50 Pct. Hospital Patients

Mental disorders today represent a real problem and it is estimated that more than fifty per cent of all hospital beds are filled by persons suffering from mental or nervous diseases, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

It thus appears that modern civilization is exacting a terrific toll. High speed living, with its cruel exactions upon nature, is responsible for a large part of the trouble. But improper personal conduct must also shoulder much of the blame. The fact is that nearly fifty per cent of the patients entering hospitals for mental disorders are there because of organic or toxic causes.

For examples, general paralysis is the direct cause of one-fifth of the mental troubles in males entering hospitals and one-

tenth of the disorder for all groups. This condition is an organic disease of the brain due to the germ responsible for syphilis. It is a preventable disease. Early and effective treatment of acquired syphilis will block the end results of general paralysis in the insane.

The excessive use of alcohol is responsible for a number of mental disorders, at least in males. Alcohol and syphilis combined are responsible for approximately one-fifth of the hospitalized insanities. Nevertheless, improper living habits continue to impair many brains. Insufficient sleep, neglect of bodily care and an over forcing of nervous energy are the pitfalls to avoid in this connection.

Nature demands that her fundamental laws be at least reasonably observed. A constant outraging of the physiological economy takes its toll not only in bodies but in minds also. Insanities and lesser nervous disorders could be

spectacularly reduced if this fact was more generally respected. Training for mental health must be started in childhood as that is the time when corrections can be made to the best advantage.

The average size farm in the United States is now 50 acres larger than 25 years ago, and 20 acres larger than five years ago.

### Fewer Acres; Higher Yields With Use Of Fertilizers

Secret to getting higher cotton yields in West Texas is "not so much acreage, and more attention to production per acre," is the belief of Hudspeth County Agricultural Agent C. M. Knight, of Sierra Blanca.

"It's not the big farmers that always make the largest yields per acre on cotton," Knight reports. He points to the case of Marge Guigliardi, Fort Hancock farmer, who owns a "dandy good small farm." Guigliardi produced 145 bales of cotton on 50 acres last year.

Knight says the high yield was a result of "rotation of cotton and alfalfa, and the use of barnyard manure." Guigliardi hauls to his farm all the manure his neighbors will let him have.

Another point in favor of high cotton production per acre in West Texas is the level land, Knight believes. Level land makes irrigation much cheaper and very easily done.

Guigliardi's high yields "prove that it is better to have fewer acres of land and increase the production per acre," says Knight. "It means less trouble, more pleasure and better profits."

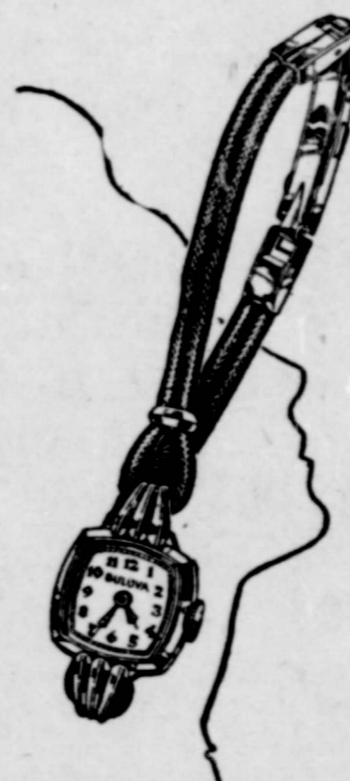

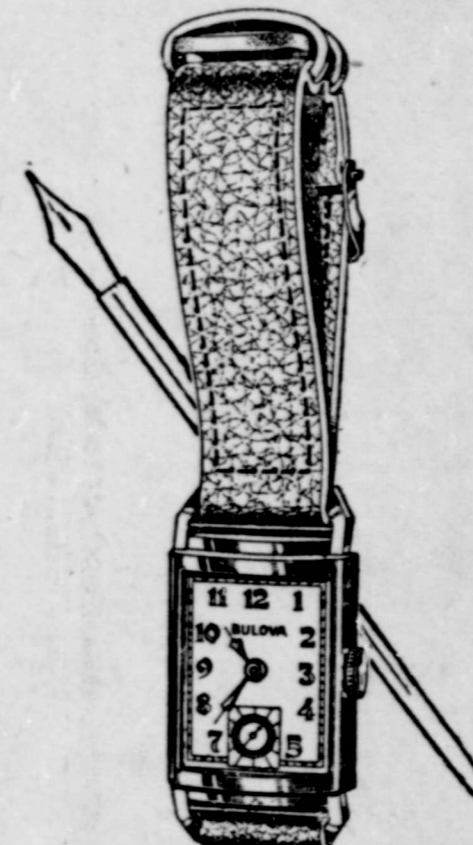

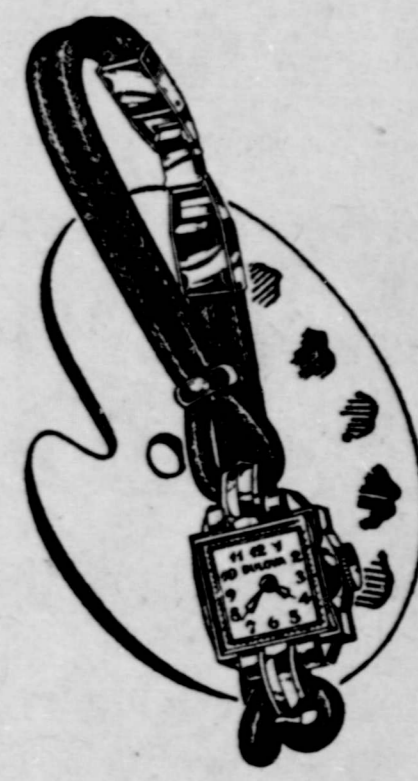

### Babson Discusses The Keys To Successful Living

BY ROGER W. BABSON

For three score years I have been analyzing the causes of success and failure. Experience has taught me that financial success, job success, and happiness in human relations are, in the main, the result of (a) physical well being; (b) constant effort to develop one's personal assets; (c) setting up and working toward a series of life goals; (d) allowing time for meditation and spiritual regeneration.

#### Health And Success

Good health plays an important part in both contentment and achievement. Unhealthy persons generally lack poise, cannot sleep well; are fidgety. If we want happiness and success, if we want to avoid the ills that beset many Americans—headaches, indigestion, neuritis, backaches, and especially that tired feeling—then I suggest we adopt a set of simple rules of physical conduct and follow them rigorously. There is no royal road to health. Every person probably needs different treatment. That is why I urge you to seek your health rules from your physician. Be sure, too, that he gives you a thorough going overhauling at least once a year.

#### Developing Personal Assets

Furthermore, if we are to be really happy and successful, we must discover the kinds of things we like to do vocationally and are most capable of doing. Whether we be pupil or parent, I wonder if we realize that after school and summer jobs have work elements which lead to good life jobs? For example, a part-time gas station attendant job, where the worker supplies the customer with gas, oil, air and water, does not differ materially from many other types of permanent jobs in customer service work. Take schooling seriously. Correct English and spelling, for example, are the keys which unlock all subjects and many vocations.

It is important to develop a few hobbies—make model airplanes, collect stamps, cook, read about great men. We should seize every opportunity to visit places of work, shops, hospitals, farms and factories. If after such practices we still have not found ourselves vocationally, then it's time to pay a visit to a nearby college, university, or YMCA and ask them for help. Have them find out what special abilities we have such as mechanical aptitude, musical ability, clerical aptitude, social intelligence, etc. We must get a line on both our char-

We must remember that the chief difference between unsuccessful and a successful person is not one of knowing, but of doing.

#### Take Time To Meditate

Too many people these days are living too much on nerve alone. To be sure, quantity of production comes from working energetically; but quality of life comes from exposure of the soul to great ideas ennobling thoughts, enriching personalities and inspiring meditation. My automobile battery is a considerable help to me in turning the starter and lighting the lights on my car. But it will not give power for long unless it is connected with the generator. Too many of us are connected only with the starter. In missing exposure to prayer, music and meditation, we are missing the very thing that will build strength to make the rush of life possible.

Real success in life will depend much on how we feel inside about what we are doing. I've discovered that to feel right one must know that his labors are making not only himself but others healthier, happier, and more prosperous.

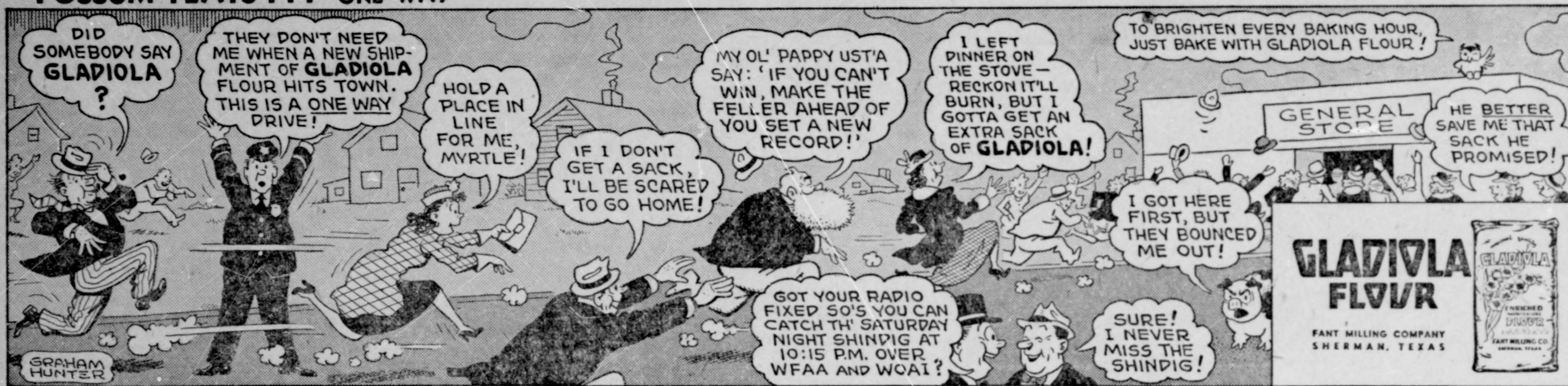

The following farms in Zone 4, Conservation Group 5-8 all had terrace lines laid out by the district engineering crew this past week: G. E. Ashburn (E 1-2 of Section 16, Block 4-X, Meadow community, Dr. John R. Turner's farm in the Pleasant Valley community, and E. F. Bell, who lives in Lubbock.

Mrs. G. M. Cosby, Gilmer, Texas, by request from her brother, C. S. Copeland, Northeast of Meadow, Texas, has secured the services of the District to plan a complete terrace system and conservation plan on 475 acres in Section 52, Block E.

Mrs. Opal C. Dillard, Meadow, Texas, is having the CYT District plan a complete conservation program on her 246 acre farm in the northeast corner of Terry county.

There is an increased demand for terrace planning and construction in Terry County through the Soil Conservation District program. Contouring is on the increase, too. Many of our farmers are realizing that the cheapest water put on their land is from rainfall and that to hold it, mechanical structures such as terraces must be built.

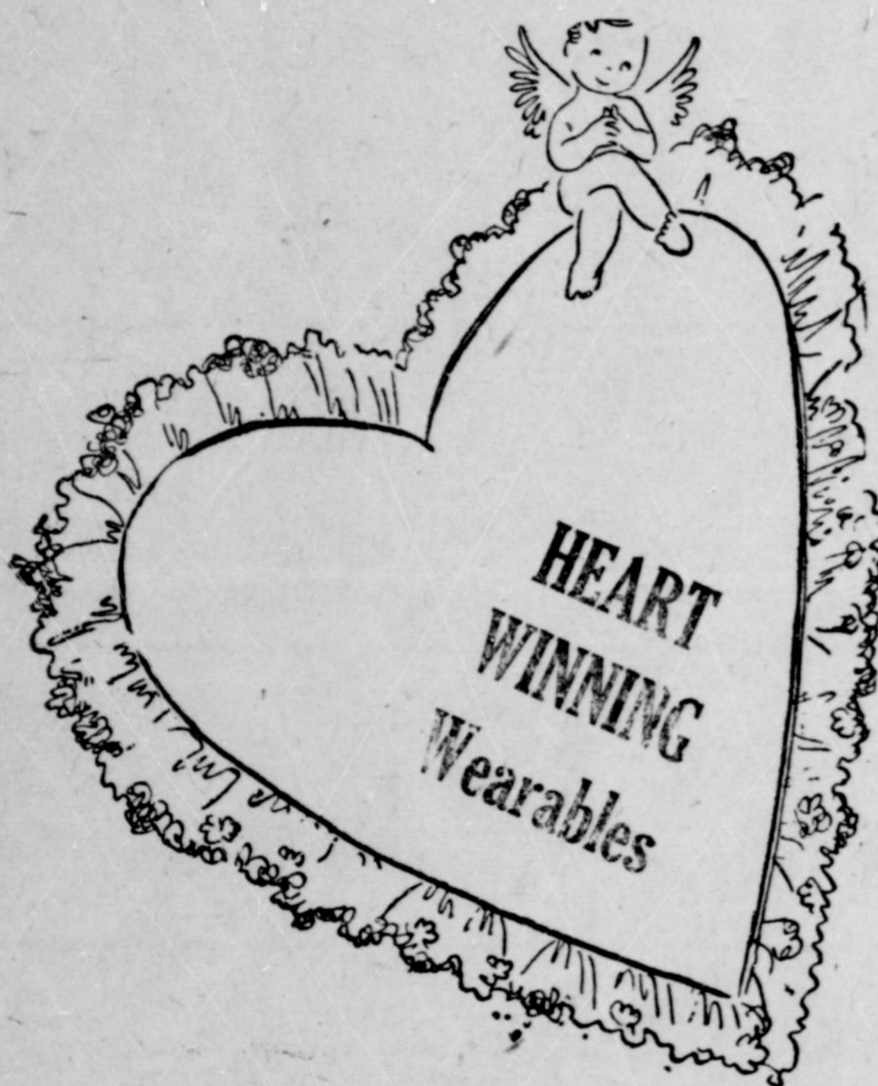

## Fair Trade Law - A Misnomer

Texans must continually be on guard every time the Legislature meets in order to thwart its abortive attempts to pass legislation inimical to the public good.

Once more a bill is being introduced that will do more to limit free enterprise and concentrate power into the hands of a few. It is the so-called Fair Trade Law, a scandalous misnomer because it is not Fair, it is not Trade and it is not Law.

The vicious bill proposes to prevent by law the sale of retail goods at a price lower than that set by the manufacturer. The retailer of any item would be required to exact from consumers the price printed on the box.

Enactment of the bill would remove competition in retail lines. A merchant would have to accept the profit allowed by the manufacturer. He could not be content with what he considers a "reasonable mark-up." He could not appeal to the thrifty by cutting prices. His entire bookkeeping system and financial intake would be regulated from afar by invisible hands.

For instance: drug stores now sell a 25c box of aspirin for 19c. They make 100 per cent profit by retailing it at the low price. Under the "Fair Trade Law" they would all sell for 25c. Some merchants believe the idea sound because it would seem to increase his profits and eliminate competition. The reverse is true; the minute the law is passed, manufacturers will "up" the wholesale price to absorb the retailers expected increase in profit.

The entire law in a vehicle concocted by unscrupulous manufacturers, backed by chain store enemies. It appeals to small business men who see a shadowy chance at increased profits; it appeals to people who believe in labels. "The Fair Trade Law" was so named to enlist the support of "suckers" who believe everything they see in print. It appeals to those who oppose chain stores because they are able, through quantity buying, to give the public fighting chance at keeping its wages. But most of all, it appeals to the small group of politically powerful men who see a chance to "clean up" before John Q. realizes he has been taken for an expensive ride.

This paper has been bombarded with requests from manufacturers to support editorially enactment of the "Fair Trade Law." One request says, "a Fair Trade Law in Texas will go a long way towards making our advertising in your newspaper more effective." We not only fail to fall for cheap bribery, but roundly denounce the lying text of the "Fair Trade Law."

It is undemocratic, dictatorial, a foe to free enterprise, and a relinquishment of small business to the clutches of big business. Texans have opposed price-fixing by government officials. Why, then, do they propose to allow unknown profit taking manufacturers to fix the price they pay for consumer goods? If we have price fixing, let it be done openly by the government. Then the voting consumer can always "turn the rascals out" if necessary.
