### **VA Warns Against** "Side Payments"

Veterans Administration has warned veterans, builders and lenders against the consequences of making or accepting so-called "side payments" in the sale of home properties to veterans with the aid of GI loans.

VA said such side paymentsusually made for the purpose of evading the prohibition against than 35,000 miles. sales to veterans in excess of appraised "reasonable value" - are a direct violation of law and subject offenders to possible federal prosecution.



The scholarship provides for assistance one year to a student majoring in foreign language chosen by the foreign languages faculty.


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
