Livestock Research To Cross-breed Hereford - Brahma

McGregor, June 24 (AP) The white-faced Hereford will be cross bred with the Humpbacked Brahman in the first livestock research project at Bluebonnet Farm near McGregor, Texas.

"We hope to establish a new string that will be superior to either of its parents," said H. O. Hill, aperintendent of the farm, station of Texas A & M college.

The Brahman, sacred cow in India, has been cross-bred with European cattle before. King Ranch combined % Brahman with 5/8 Shorthorn and produced its Santa Gertrudis breed.

"Cross-breeding the Brahman and the Hereford hasn't been taken through enough generations," Hill explained.

J. C. Miller, head of animal husbandry at A & M, said that selection and breeding of the Brahman and Hereford at Bluebonnet farm will be based entirely on preformance, plus certain standard requirements of body type and conformation.

"In the course of a few generations it is not unlikely that we will produce animals whose ability to gain rapidly and econoof the breed." Miller said.

"Everyone reognized the supiority of the first cross Brahman-Hereford over either parent for the production of mild fat calves at weaning time," Miller said.

"While our plans are not complete, we do contemplate the study of the various combinations of blood between the Brahman and Hereford. And if we succeed in finding a particular combination which is superior, that strain will be intensified through breeding in the hope of establishing a strain which will breed true and retain its superior beef ability." that city.

County Agent Advises On Insect Control

County Agent Jack Cleveland stated this week that this being the time of year when we are most troubled with various insects on shrubs, in the house and gardens, it is well to take notice of the many insecticides, some of which are better for some pests than others. He says that DDT is cheapest and has the longest residual effect and control of flies, fleas and several other like pests, but is not so good as we were led to believe a few years ago. BHC is good on plant lice, but seldom used around the house, because of its pungent odor, and is not recommended on vegetables because it often leaves a disagreeable taste. Cholordan is a promising new insecticide on ant, roaches, grasshopper and blister

He admonishes that great care should be used in all these as they are toxic to all warm blooded ani-

There are several new ones, not yet recommended because of danger to humans. Still another new one is good for cotton insects, but not other uses.

One having specific insects should consult with the county





A veteran who finds his check after reporting its loss should notify VA and hold the check until he has been advised by the Treasury that action to stop payment has been withrawn.

Ann is always hapus to come see them, and she and her daughter always find place to cook. Last year was an exception, however, as Ann got a copperhead bite on the hand just before we arrived. There never has been any serious friction between the whites and blacks in Hardeman county that we ever heard of.
