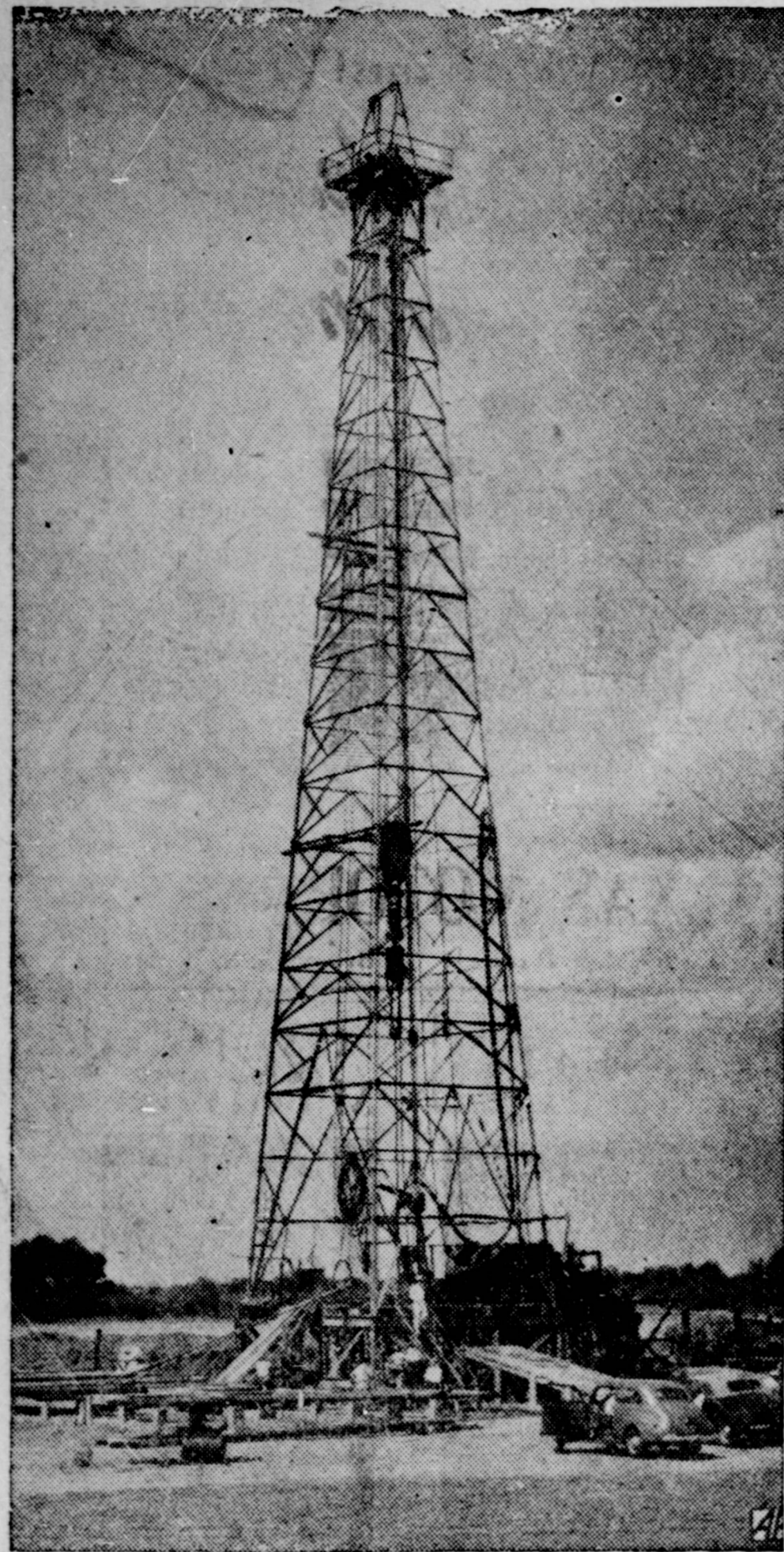

## FARM QUESTION BOX

- Q.** Please tell me the proper time to start a new bed of rhubarb from the old plants, and something on raising and care?
- A.** Prepare a deep, rich, sandy-loam seed bed with lots of manure in it because the plants stay there a long time. Dig up or buy old crowns about September 1; split them apart so each piece has at least one good eye or bud. Dip for five minutes in 1 to 1000 mercuric chloride solution to disinfect for disease; plant and cover with sharp sand so eye is two inches deep. Fertilize well every year and stop cutting when stalks begin to come up slowly, thin and weak.
- Q.** How can I get rid of snakes? They seem to be grass or water snakes and come near the house.
- A.** Remove, as far as possible, any rubbish, grass, rocks, etc., that can furnish them shelter and refuge. Teach a dog or cat to hunt and kill them. That is about all one can do about it.
- Q.** I have a garden in which the soil is clay. Have noticed a green substance on top of the soil. What is it and does it indicate that the soil needs attention?
- A.** It is moss and fungus and indicates the soil is poor and probably too wet. The addition of humus and fertilizer and drainage are indicated.
- Q.** How can I keep toadstools from growing in my lawn every time it rains? They come from an old elm stump, but I don't want to dig that out if there is an easier way to get rid of them.
- A.** Saturate the ground with a solution of bluestone and keep them mowed off with the lawn mower and they will soon disappear.
- Q.** What materials, such as vinegar, cleaning powder, etc., should not be put in septic tanks?
- A.** All such things are bad for the bacteria that are necessary for the proper functioning of the tank; reasonable amounts do no serious harm, but excessive amounts kill too many bacteria and the tank soon fills up with solids.

## G I QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- Q.** I am a World War II veteran and intend to go abroad for several years. Does VA have representatives in foreign countries?
- A.** The Foreign Service of the Department of State cooperates with Veterans Administration in the administration of certain benefits available to veterans in foreign areas.
- Q.** Does VA attempt to improve types of prosthetic aids available to veterans?
- A.** Yes, Veterans Administration conducts extensive research projects in attempting to discover new and better prosthetic devices.
- Q.** Is a disabled veteran in on-the-job training permitted to receive wages and if so, how much can he receive?
- A.** A disabled veteran in on-the-job training may receive wages while training, but if the wages plus his subsistence allowance exceeds the journeyman rate for a trained worker in that occupation, the subsistence allowance will be reduced by VA proportionately. However, other payments that he receives from VA because of his disability will not be affected.
- Q.** Will Veterans Administration pay for the medical care of my dependents?
- A.** No. Under existing laws, only eligible veterans are entitled to VA medical care.



That old enemy of the farmer the Weatherman, has been playing mean tricks on Terry county farmers to a fare-you-well for the last several years, and that too, just when prices are high, and the one-gallus guys had some chance to put a little moluka away for a rainy day. Just about the time the cycle for wetter years come, we will perhaps have 10c cotton and 75c per 100 maize.

Way back beginning about 1937, there was a long cycle of good crops every year lasting until 1944. Oh, some would get blown out occasionally, and hail would damage areas. There was some bugs and worms to play heck with the growing crops. But in most cases the old farmer ended up with fair yields, and in most of those years a field hand did not draw the salary of a railroad president.

In then come the change. In 1945, the year the war was over, a fair grain crop, but no cotton—and it high. The same happened in 1946 only more so. But there was some good rains the last few days of August that year and the rather discouraged farmer sowed some wheat—for pasture. Well, what do you know, it kept raining and snowing through the winter, the cows were took off the wheat in the spring and the doggone stuff made more wheat than Terry county had ever

dreamed of, some 750,000 bushels. That all happened last year, though the wheat was planted the year before.

Add to that an above average cotton crop and perhaps a record breaking maize crop, all at high prices. Well, you ask, what are you wanting about? Just this: On August 1, it appeared almost certain that Terry county would have a cotton crop of 50,000 bales, but by the 29th, the estimate was down 15,000 bales. With present prices, that's nothing to sneeze at brother. And it is still dry most places, and the crop still deteriorating.

Just take you pencil and paper and figure what 15,000 bales of cotton would bring on the market today. Along with that, another bumper maize crop has trickled out of the hour glass, and it is still twisting and burning. Why couldn't we have the wetness that we had from 1937 to 1944?

We are not exactly griping. We're just telling you.

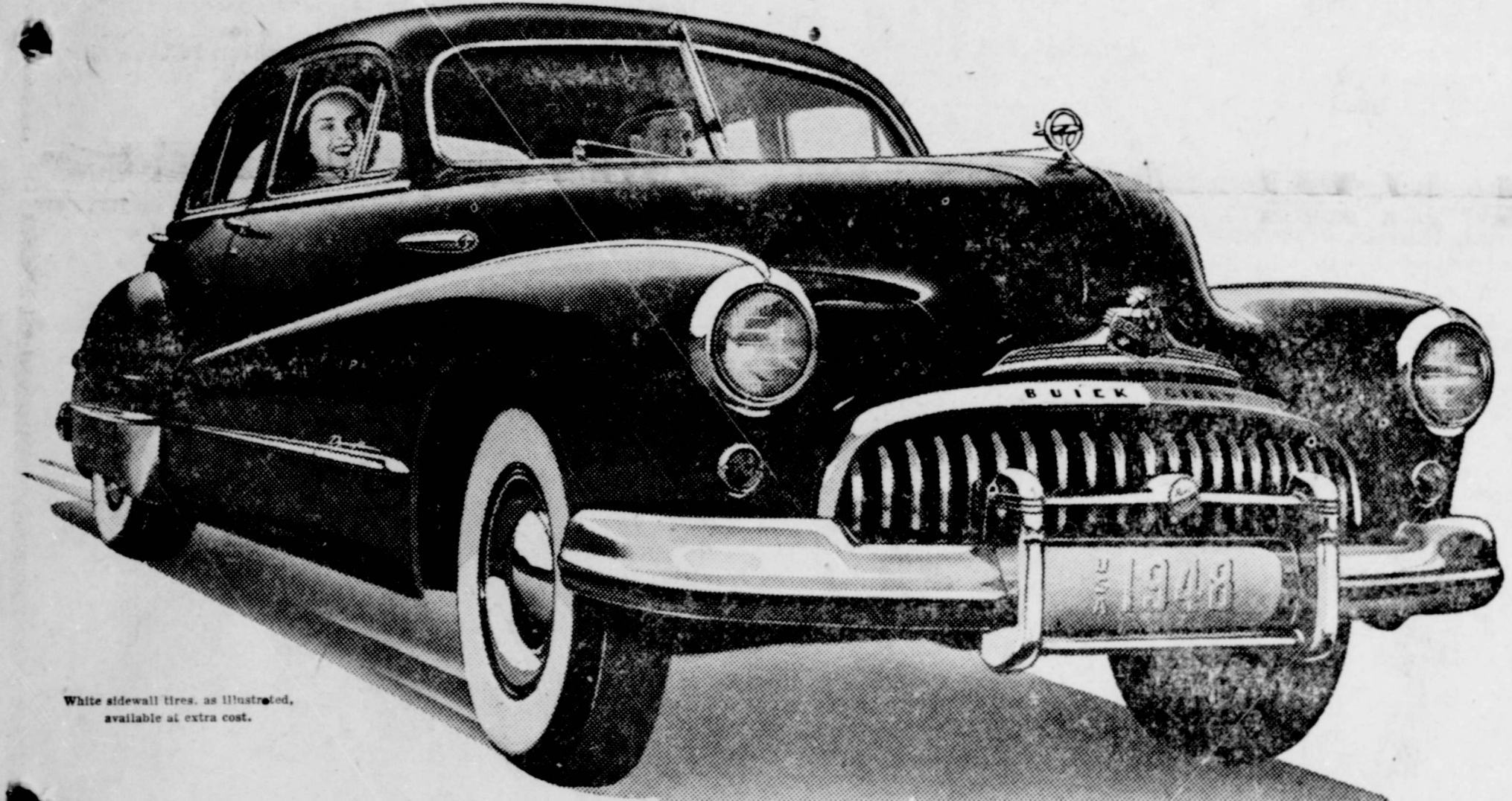
