



Keeping Bluebonnets | The Low Down From | That Fantastic Suit **Against Railroads**

The Dallas Morning News recently ran an editorial on the government's suit against the railroads for allegedly overcharging the government \$2,000,000,000 on freight moved during the war. In it, it made this all-important point: "This is not a case originated by a hostile party taking over the books of previous incumbents. It is a series of claims made against an operation which could not have occurred at all without the official sanction of the administration."

The railroads did not quote the government rates on a take-it-orleave-it basis. Instead-at the government's request- they set up a committee of experts to arrange the charges. This committee was given the formal approval of the then assistant attorney general who had charge of anti-trust proceedings. Every rate arrangement made had to be approved by the responsible government official concerned before it became operative. In not a single instance was the government charged a rate higher than that quoted to commercial shippers. In most instances the rate was less, and often by a very large margin.

As for profits, the government paid the railroads \$5,606,000,000 in freight charges during 1942-45, inclusive. In those same years the railroads paid back \$3,668,000,000 in taxes. Thus, if the government were now to win its case for \$2 .-000,000,000, the railroads would have paid out \$62,000,000 more than they received for the magnificent job they did in moving war freight!

These are facts of record. During the war, when speed was allimportant, the railroads followed a system of rate making which was both suggested and approved by the government. What more could they have done?



FARM QUESTION BOX

- Please tell me the proper time to start a new bed of rhubarb from the oid plants, and something on raising and care?
- Prepare a deep, rich, sandy-loam seed bed with lots of manure in it because the plants stay there a long time. Dig up or buy old crowns about September 1; split them apart so each piece has at least one good eye or bud. Dip for five minutes in 1 to 1000 mercuric chloride solution to disinfect for disease; plant and cover with sharp sand so eye is two inches deep. Fertilize well every year and stop cutting when stalks begin to come up slowly, thin and weak.
- Q. Can I use the litter and droppings from the chicken house as the basis for a compost pile? What should I add to it?
- A. Nothing could be better; add any vegetable matter you can collect.
- Q. Is it advisable to put clover alone in the silo? If not, please tell me what to do when putting heavy . clover hay in the silo.
- A. If hay is over 50 per cent a legume—clover, alfalfa, pea vines, soy beans, etc.—either add an equal amount of grass such as timothy or grain, oats, rye, wheat, millet, sudan grass, etc., or add 10 pounds of molasses or 100 pounds ground feed (preferably corn) to each ton of silage to provide carbohydrates. of silage to provide carbohydrates. Put in blower or on feed table to get an even mixture.

- How can I get rid of snakes? They seem to be grass or water snakes and come near the house.
- Remove, as far as possible, any rubbish, grass, rocks, etc., that can furnish them shelter and refuge. Teach a dog or cat to hunt and kill them. That is about all one can
- I have a garden in which the soil is clay. Have noticed a green substance on top of the soil. What is it and does it indicate that the soil needs attention?
- It is moss and fungus and indicates the soil is poor and probably toe wet. The addition of humus and fertilizer and drainage are indi-
- How can I keep toadstools from growing in my lawn every time it rains? They come from an old elm stump, but I don't want to dig that out if there is an easier way to get rid of them.
- Saturate the ground with a solu-tion of bluestone and keep them mowed off with the lawn mower and they will soon disappear.
- What materials, such as vinegar, cleaning powder, etc., should not
- be put in septic tanks? All such things are bad for the rot bacteria that are necessary for the proper functioning of the tank; reasonable amounts do no serious harm, but excessive amounts kill too many bacteria and the tank soon fills up with solids.


