Buildings Purchased

To begin the work over there properly it was necessary to purchase some property. Bro. Linscott was able to find a Villa near Frascati, some 12 miles from Rome that could be bought. The ee of property had two houses. on it, containing 28 rooms. After some time this property has been secured. It will be used as a center of this church's activities in Italy for a while. They plan to begin a boys' home in these buildings, and to conduct daily Bible classes in them. Also to use it as a distributing center for food and clothing that will be sent over there from churches in America. The buildings are said to be very beautiful, and ideally located for such a work.

Food and Clothing to be Sent This church believes that the Gospel must be preached in planning to carry an extensive benevolent work in Italy. Already some 300 boxes of clothing have been prepared to send to Italy. These boxes will weigh 22 pounds each and contain bed clothing, and all sorts of good usable clothing. They will be sent to Italy Jan. 1, when the workers go. This church is still urging that all d usable clothing be brought to the church building so that it

can be prepared to send.

Milk Prices Reach An Four Courses Open **All Time High**

Austin, Texas, Oct. 27 -(AP)remember when you used to put down a nickle and tote home a generous quart of milk in a lard pail?

Those good old days are now gone for good, along with the nickle movies, the nickle beer, the you must serve four years in an five-cent hamburger and the fivecent cigar.

Texans now are competing for the privilege of putting a quart carton or bottle of grade A pasteurized milk in their market to 25 cents.

Milk is big business now. Man's first food has increased in popularity because of health education and prosperity and supply is hard pressed to keep up with the demand. Where a city's source of supply used to be its neighboring farms, improved refrigeration and pasteurization methods have spred it out to distant counties and even other states.

They call these areas "milk sheds."Unlike water sheds, where gravity guides water down land slopes toward the sea, money makes the milk flow. Bidding for the limited supply has forced prices up and up in Texas.

The contest has reached the courts here. Attorney General Price Daniel has charged a number of major city dairies with price fixing in violation of the state anti-trust laws. The South Texas milk producers association and six Houston dairies have been temporearly enjoined in 98th district court here against alleged Constitution Revision price fixing practices.

If DDT fails to control flies around the barn, it's probably because there are manure piles or old strawstack bottoms nearby. These breeding places can turn out flies faster than DDT can kill them.

Blackhead of turkeys is caused by an organism that is carried by ecal worms. Phenothiazine is effective in removing these worms from chickens and turkeys. Many turkey raisers now give phenothiazine in the mash every three or four weeks to prevent outbreaks of black-

Farms Use Six Times

As Many Tires as Cory
The typical Midwestern American farm has six times as many rubber! tires on its rolling stock as a onecar city-dwelling family, a survey conducted by B. F. Goodrich company indicates. The survey covered 105 farms in a representative "agricultural" county in Illinois. and disclosed an average of 32 pneumatic rubber tires per farm. From the standpoint of actual rubber volume the farmer's edge is greater.
