Above all, they need the wholehearted support of every loyal 'American to maintain the strength authorized by Congress. On this our thirtieth Armistice Day, we would do well to remember not only those who sustained us in war, but those who now stand between us and the threat of attack.

Last time we forgot. And in our forgetfulness, we allowed our Armed Forces to grow weak. In our weakness, we could only hope. We cannot-we must not-repeat that tragic mistake.

On this day of memory, let every one of us resolve that America shall stay strong.

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





Cattle Going Into A Hard Winter

College Station, Nov. 9 Texas cattle, both beef and dairy, face a hard winter.

In average years cattle enter the winter months in good shaps after feeding on green grass. This year, however, many cattle are already suffering from a lack of the green feed There just isn't any to be had.

Many cows that are now carring calves may not be quiet up to the task of giving birth and taking care of their young, says Dr. W. C. Banks, extension veterinarian of Texas A & M College.

Banks suggests that stockman plan a good feeding program for the cattle. In addition to protein feeding, plenty of good quality hay should be kept on hand. And, if possible, hay with a good, green color is recommended. If you can't get green hay, Banks suggests getting some other source of vitamin A to add to the ration.
