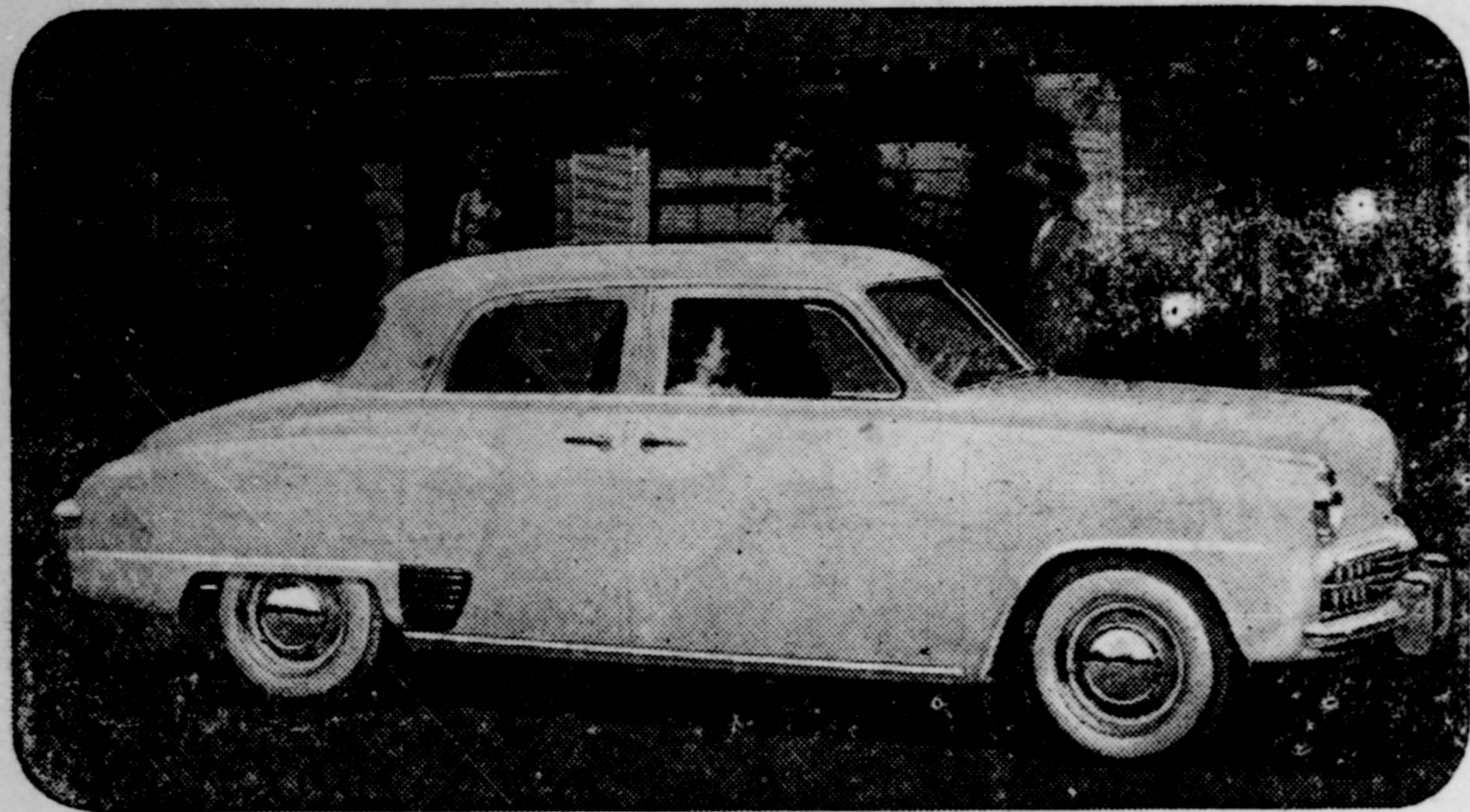

AN EVER PRESENT HELP

At a meeting one evening, a minister friend of mine, who is a great soul, a rugged personality, a man's man, made the assertion that Almighty God could solve any problem no matter how difficult. The following morning another minister phoned him and said, "I have a woman in my study who heard you last night. She says you are wrong, that her problem cannot be solved."

When my friend met this woman, she said, "My husband is a scientist, 33 years old. He committed a bad moral crime and is now in the State penitentiary. Psychologists and others pronounce him hopeless. The judge refuses to parole, stating he must serve his full term of 20 years. You said God could solve every problem; let us see Him solve that one."

As God's ambassador, my friend accepted the challenge. He went to the penitentiary where he immediately recognized the prisoner as a former professor, a man of distinction.

The prisoner said, "You have driven a long way to see me, haven't you? That was nice of you, but I have no use for ministers and I have no use for God. You might as well turn around and go back. You cannot do anything for me. All you do is preach theory."

"All right, I will go," my friend said, "but, let me say I did not come out here to enjoy myself. I came to do something for you, but you are so stubborn that you do not want anything done for you. However, I will leave you two Bible texts. Mull them over and I will be back here in two weeks. If you heed these words and believe them, you will be changed."

He gave him a passage from the 1st Chapter of Romans, Verses 28-31, which shows man at his worst; "And even as they did not like to retain God in their knowledge, God gave them over to a reprobate mind, to do those things which are not convenient; being filled with all unrighteousness, fornication, wickedness, covetousness, maliciousness, full of envy, murder, debate, deceit,

God is the answer. He is your refuge and your strength, an ever present help in trouble. Say that to yourself until your doubting mind begins to believe it and put it up next to your problem, I care not how difficult it may be. That problem will open as do flowers in the heat and light of the sun. There is no human problem which God cannot solve.

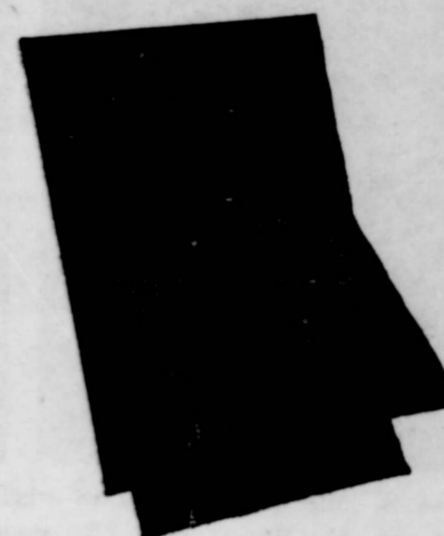

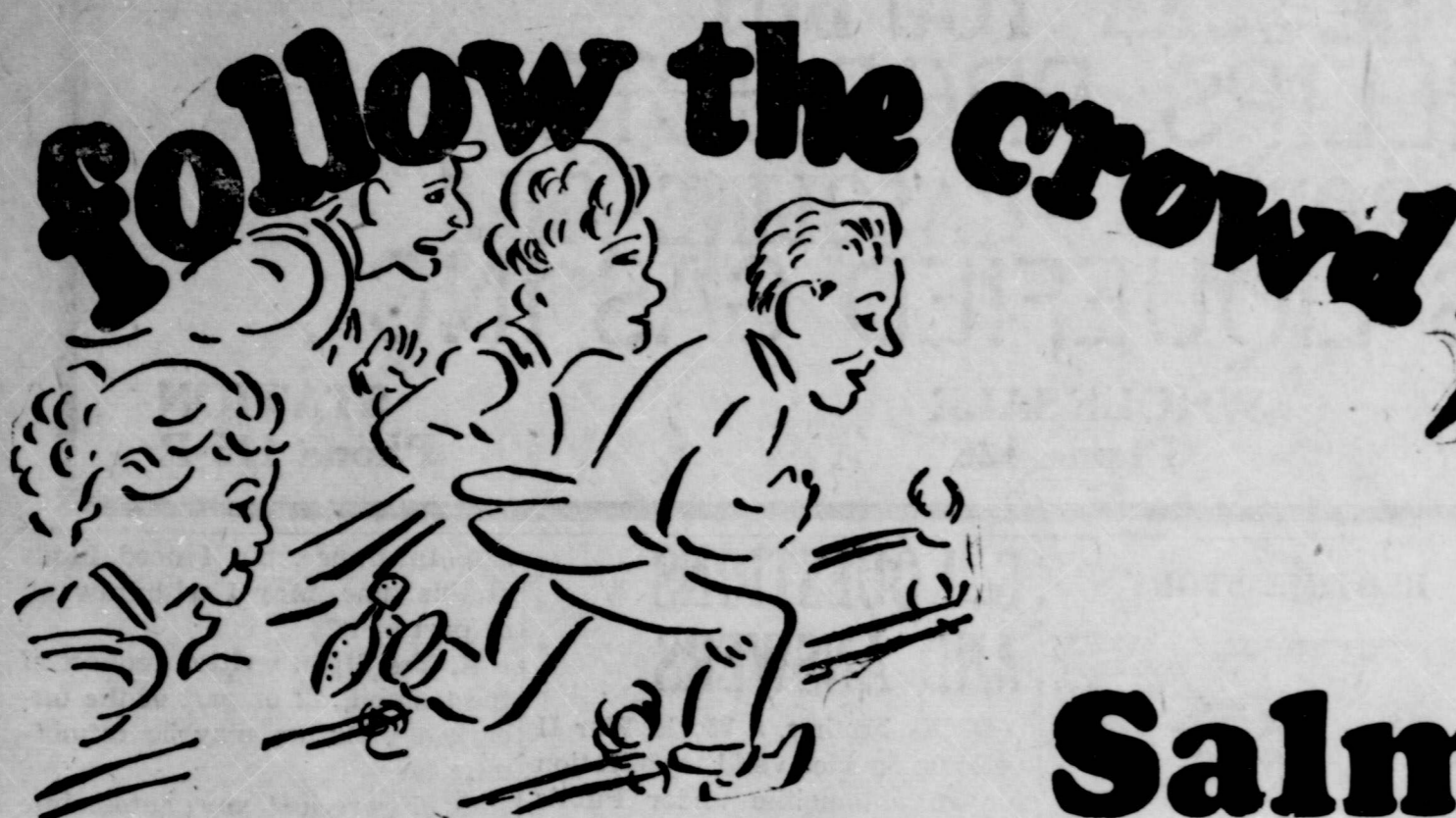

Chicago Seen As World Video Center

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago will have a population of 20 million people and will be the world center of all television broadcasting in the year 2048, claim Chicago news experts and city planners. Their prediction was sealed in an atom-bomb-proof "time capsule" buried here at the site of Chicago's first depot by the Chicago and North Western Railway. Burial of the capsule—which contains more than 500 photographs of railroading as it is today—marked the end of the first century of railroading in Chicago. One radio commentator said he believed the Chicago of 2048 would be vastly cleaner than it is now. Electrification through nuclear energy will reduce the use of coal mainly to the production of steel," he wrote. "With soot virtually eradicated, the city will move toward washed buildings, swept streets, better garbage removal and more efficient street lighting."

The secret of cancer will, by 2048, "be definitely simple to comprehend," according to another forecaster, and the only real threat to human life will be the "incurable bends suffered when pressurized cabins fail in space flight."

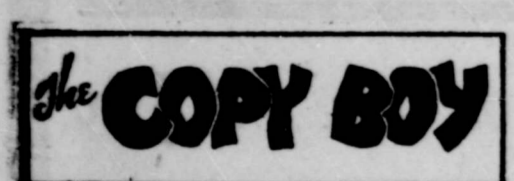

G I QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. My brother, a World War II veteran, made valid application for an automobile under Public Law 663, 79th Congress, but he died before delivery of the car could be made. May it now be paid by the VA and delivered to his estate?
A. No. Payment for the car by VA is contingent upon its delivery to the veteran.
Q. I received a leg injury in an automobile accident recently which requires outpatient treatment. Will VA furnish the required treatment?
Out patient treatment is available only for service-connected disabilities.
Q. I assigned my armed forces leave bond to pay premiums in advance on my National Service Life Insurance, but I need funds at this time. May I withdraw all or part of it?
A. Yes. Upon written request of the insured, all or part of the unearned premium may be refunded.
Q. I wrecked my automobile which was furnished by VA under the provisions of Public Law 663, 79th Congress. Will VA give me another car to replace it?
A. No. There is no provision under the law to provide more than one automobile to an eligible veteran.

G I QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I am a World War II veteran and would like to know how to get a concession to operate a stand at one of the VA hospitals?
 A. Under Public Law 636, Veterans Administration operates canteens with fountain service

and a stock of cigarettes, shaving cream, razors and similar items. Therefore, VA no longer lets out concessions.

Q. Can my National Service Life Insurance include coverage for total disability?
 A. Yes. For a small additional premium, there may be added to any NSLI policy a total disability rider which provides monthly payments to the insured while he

is totally disabled longer than six consecutive months. Such payments begin with the seventh month of such total disability.

Q. May I assign my National Service Life Insurance to a lender who will lend me money to go into business?
 A. No. National Service Life Insurance may not be assigned as payment of an obligation.

Q. I converted my NSLI about a year ago but have since let it lapse. Can my permanent plan insurance be reinstated by the payment of two monthly premiums?
 A. No. Only term insurance may be reinstated by the payment of two monthly premiums. In reinstating converted insurance on a permanent plan, all premiums in arrears must be paid with interest.

Noel Joy Can Go Up In Smoke

Each year fire turns Christmas, the most joyful time of the year, into tragedy in hundreds of American homes. But if parents knew the hazards surrounding a Christmas tree, and learned how to prevent tragic fires, says the National Safety Council, they could help keep Christmas as joyful as it should be.

How can you prevent accidents from ruining your holiday? All you have to do, says the Council, is to follow some simple rules.

First, buy a fresh, green tree. Put it in water outside of the house as soon as you get it home. If you live in an apartment, place it in the coolest spot in the apartment and turn off the radiator nearest it. Then, cut off the bottom of the trunk on a slant—at an angle with the line of the trunk—and stand it in one of the special tree holders with a water cup and fill it daily.

Plain water is best, says the Council. Chemicals to be added to the water, supposedly to fire-proof the tree, have not proved to be satisfactory. Some have made trees even more flammable. No fire proofing done at home can be depended upon.

Be sure that your tree is fastened with wire or cord to at least to points on the wall to prevent it from being pushed over by junior.

If junior is to help you trim the tree, reserve the lower branches for his contributions to the artistic effect. Do not, under any circumstances, use cotton or paper for decoration on the tree or around the tree.

Get your Christmas tree lights out of storage well in advance. Do it now, says the Council. Look over the wires and examine each socket carefully. If the socket is broken, if any of its parts appear to be loose, if any bare metal is visible where the wires enter the socket, then cut the socket out of the string and replace it with a new one.

If you use metal foil "icicles," avoid the possibility of a short-circuit by being careful not to allow the metal to come in contact with any lighting sockets or fixtures.

Don't attach too many light strings to one outlet. A blown fuse is the signal of a dangerous overload. Be sure fuses are the right size and never use a penny in a fuse socket.

Don't use lighted candles on the Christmas tree or with other decorations. Place tree well away from fireplace or any other location where it is exposed to sparks or strong heat. Also keep tissue wrappings away from heat.

On Christmas morning, provide a large basket, box, or carton for the gift wrappings removed from the presents. Remove the wrappings from the room as soon as possible after the gifts have been opened.

Other prevention hints are provided by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. They add that it is a good idea to provide a switch some distance from the tree rather than a plug, for turning the electric lights off and on; not to leave tree lights burning when no one is home; inspect the tree to see whether any of the needles near the lights have started to turn brown. If so, change the location of the lights. When the needles start falling, it is a good idea to take the tree down and discard it.

Illiterates Plentiful In United States

FOR WORTH, Nov. 23 (AP) Editorial Writer Robert Hicks of The Star-Telegram has revealed some startling statistics on illiterates in the United States.

And he is fearful that they are a threat to the freedom of the press.

There are 2,800,000 people in the U. S. over 14 who can not read or write, he said, compared with 3,400,000 people who have four or more years of college.

Newspapers perform an invaluable service in reporting and interpreting the news, but Hicks said people must be able to understand and judge the facts or the effect is worthless.

He blamed disregard for compulsory school laws for part of this bad situation.

"In Texas we have a compulsory school attendance law," Hicks said, "but it obviously is not being observed. We have 1,500,000 children of school age and the average school attendance is only 1,000,000."

He said plugging the loopholes in the school law would help maintain not only freedom of the press but the value of this freedom.

Hanging Out The Wash

Here are some hints from Gladys Darden, assistant home management specialist of the Extension Service at Texas A & M College, for making the washday job a little easier.

Hang the clothes on lines located near the laundry area to have steps and time... and save energy by placing the clothes basket on a laundry cart of the youngster's wagon. An apron with large pockets or a bag hanging on the line will keep the clothespins in easy reach.

Hang the cup towels, pillow cases, and towels one-third over the line so you won't get dog-eared corners. The same goes for sheets and table cloths, except that should be doubled with the hems together.

By grouping the napkins and handkerchiefs together and hanging them over the line like other flat pieces, quite a bit of space can be saved. But don't hang them by one corner. They'll get dog-eared that way. Pin the shirts up by the tails, and hang the dresses, gowns, and pajama tops by their shoulder seams. Trousers, shorts, and pajama bottoms should be hung by the waist... and to make ironing easier, try using pants stretchers.

Hang the slips by the underarm section and fold all the flat clothes as they are taken from the line to reduce wrinkles as they are put in the child's wagon or the laundry cart, says Miss Darden.

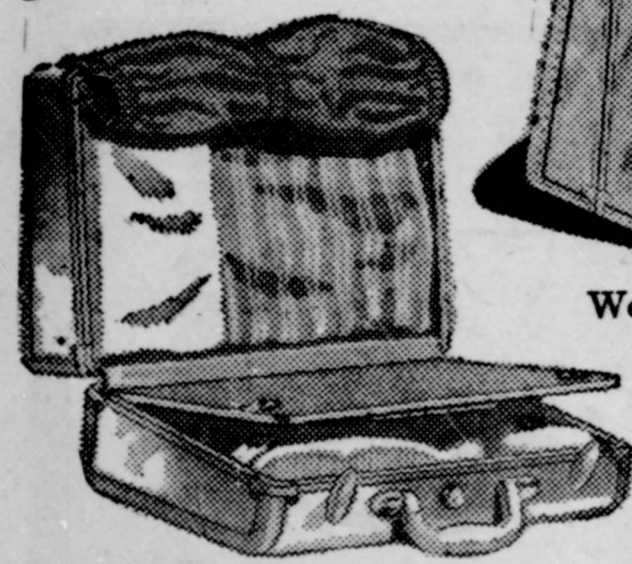

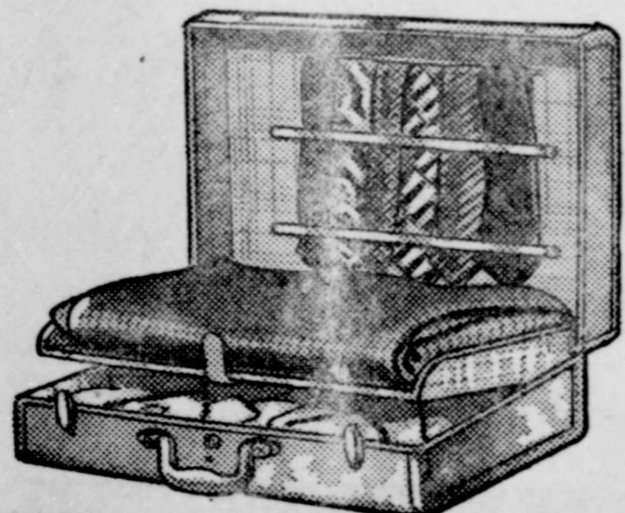
