And there are still a few so-called Americans that think Wallace is one.

Anything to create a scare and put millions of people back in line for ration cards, etc. And while some laws might be passed to pull down some things, it will hurt some one in the long run. Somebody has to pay for some one else's loss. It has to be made up some way or another. There could be a law passed to have eggs sold at 25c per dozen, or a good suit of clothes at say,

\$20. But you might ask the first farmer you meet if he can feed present high priced feed, pay for present high priced labor and sell eggs at 25c per dozen. And we might add that no manufacturer would make a good suit now to would go bankrupt. Someone, somewhere has to take the rap when rationing comes. And we might add that rationing in the best friend the black marketeer has. What goes up together must come down the same way. That includes the raw materials, labor and the makers. It is rather hard to expect any reductions now with huge government spending. That always spells inflation- not deflation.

Q While living in Canada, I converted my National Service Life Insurance to a permanent plan. Now I learn that because of Canada currency controls, I cannot send enough money out of the country to cover my premiums What can I do about this?

A There have been a number

You should contact the currency control office of the country in which you now reside, and if you cannot make a Grandview in Johnson county our brother is to get 10 per cent satisfactory arrangement you should go to the nearest U.S. consulate and explain your problem. Q I am a World War II veteran is entitled to VA hospitalization? A If she is an ex-service woman

she will be entitled to hospitalization in her own right, but being the wife of a veteran will not itself make her eligible for VA hospitalization.

World War II I surrendered my \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance converted policy for the cash value. I have re-enlisted and want insurance again. Am eligible?

A Yes. Application for a new NSLI policy may be made while you are in active service.

Q I have a service-connected disability rated at 20 percent Cars received from connections | Am I entitled to an increase because of dependents?

A No. Your disability must be rated 60 percent or more before additional compensation for dependents is payable.




Some Fine Points In Handling Returned

Bob Considine, on the staff of INS, gives us some of the fine points displayed by the escorts of the bodies of returned war dead in a recent article. As his article was written on the 10th. day before Armistice, he reverently mentioned the tomb of the unknown, only to God, soldier that reats till eternity on a rise in the national cemetary at Arlington,

In connection with the article Mr. Considine informs us that 62 per cent of the American families with sons or husbands killed over seas, have requested the return of the bodies of their loved ones. Several have been received here in Terry County, and are to come in. One of the things hardly understandable in this day of quick communication, that are still 16,000 next-of-kin of such soilders that have never been located. They have carelessly moved away from the old home, leaving no address no trace of their whereabouts.

But back to the escorts, who in the first place have native ability, and are trained for the position of bringing home again a body to re-broken hearts. These bodies Iwo, and from Dakar to Greenland. While they are in the role of representing the majesty of the USA, they also leave the feeling that the government and the officials t at represent it, feel humbled in the presence of the bodies of these returned heroes.

And as far as possible the government selects one of the 600 trained and qualified men, who escort the body in the stout casket draped in the American flag. For instance, some are full blood Indians who escort the bodies of the Indian soilder dead, and if possible, for instance, a man of Polish descent is selected to escort the body of the dead service man. This cannot always be done, sometimes as near as possible is substituted. In conclusion, let us quote the author: "The grateful folk who have learned to know these escorts have come to think of them as dear and sympathetic friends of the dead, although the odds are overwhelmingly against an escort's ever having known the man he brings home. The families never forget the simple dignity the escorts have shown. Many have sought to have the escorts come and live with them . . To fill an aching void which not even the return of the be-

M. E. (Brownie) Brown and wife Kathryn of Portales, N. M. recently purchased the Grill Cafe from D. A. Brown.


