Veterans training on-the-job or n below-college-level courses under Public law 16 (for the disabled) must continue to apply for leave at VA.

Governments, however, want the grants program abandoned. They only want it minimized. And they want the federal gevernment to withdraw from tax collections in certain fields where states can step in and raise money to conduct their own social welfare programs. But federal experts, and even Council representatives, admit that this probably would not be the answer. Localities hate to tax their own people, and states try to keep their taxes down because of interstate competitionthe effort to provide tax havens for weality corporations and in-

The programs now financed by grants-in-aid might lag or be abandoned. And even if states and localities impose taxes as heavy as their people can afford, the poor states will end up with revenue which is inadequate for such programs as those now in effect. None of the critics seem seriously to expect any development except a gradually expanded program of grants-in-aid.



Some of the divisions under this contest are: farmer, or ranch a Soil Conservation District, essay for stundents in public schools. Also a community Chamber of Commerce and local weekly newspapers, which had the best editorial in support of the soil conservation district program.

A. B. Carpenter, Lamesa, Texas, made Application for Soil Conservation Planning on 1920 acres through the District. This work is to be done on three of his farms n Yoakum County.

J. M. Welborn, Lubbock, Texas contacted the C. Y. T. District Office this past week and requested conservation planning on Sec 97, Block D-11. The proposed practices will be either terraces or a complete contour system and using crops according to good land

J. H. Mackey, Rt. 1, Meadow, Texas who operates three seperate farms here in the District made applications this past week for assistance under the C. Y. T. District Program for a planned coordinated conservation plan on each farm.

Soil and water conservation problems of Texas and the other Southwestern States will receive special attention during the annual convention of the National Association of Soil Conservation District in Denver, Colorado, Feb. 15 to 17 according to Jay Barret, Chairman of the Cochran-Yoakum Terry Soil Conservation District.

Mr Barret said, "One full day of the National Convention, Feb. 16, will be given over to a train trip into the Rockies in order that delegates from all sections of the country may see the conservation needs of the West. This special train will take the delegates from Denver to the Winter Park area beyond the west portal of the famous Moffat tunnel."

Soil and water conservation, grazing land and watershed management, forestry practices, and the Colordo Big Thompson Reclamation Project all will be discussed informally by the delegates and representatives of Federal agencies

in charge of these programs. Mr. Barret further stated that the three-day session of the National Association will be preceded by the one-day meeting of the Colorado Association of Soil Conservation Districts on Feb. 14th. Mr. Kent Leavitt of Millbrook, N. Y., President of the National Association, will open the session on February 15th. Mayor Quigg Newton, Denver, will welcome the delegates after which reports will be heard from all state district associations represented. Women guests of the convention will hold a luncheon on Febuary 15th. Robert Wilson, Vice-President, of the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co. and an ardent soil conservation-

ist, will be a dinner speaker. Following the all-day tour in

the Rockies on Feb. 16, Palmer Hoyt, Editor and Publisher of the Denver Post, will stress the need for world wide conservation on Feb. 17. President Leavitt will discuss National Association affairs at the concluding banquet. Walter A. Green, President of the Colorado Association, is making plans for more than 500 delegates from 2,000 locally governed Soil Conservation Districts.

# For Enlisted Men

Sgt. Carnes and Dobbines, in building and had her formal open- charge of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Service at courthouse, Brownfield, revealed today that a new clothing credit system for enlisted personnel of both the Army and Air Force, will go into effect on 1 July 1949. This system will save the taxpayers approximately 8 million dollars a year in administrative and maintenance costs and will result in more econmical use of clothing by enlisted men and

> "The plan is expected to call for a sum of money to be placed to the credit of each enlisted person at the beginning of each three months period", said Sgt. Carnes. "Enlisted personnel, who take care of their clothing, may gain \$25 a year, since any unused amount of clothing credit will be given to them in cash. Under the present system, where clothing is issued directly, this incentive is lacking.

The savings were estimated on the basis of pre-World War II experience when the credit system was in effect. The new practice will be used only in peacetime.

Eventually, it is said, this system will be replaced by one whereby enlisted personnel will be given a cash allowance to buy their own same clothing plan.

The three services are now working out the details necessary system is being adopted as an interim measure so savings may be realized as soon as possible.


