The third and final phase of a grazing experiment at Texas Technological college for comparative results on feeding Hereford cattle on irrigated pastures of alfalfa, mixed brome and rye grasses and alfalfa and mixed grasses will begin May 1.

A. Allowances may be claimed for any week ending on or before July 25, 1949, or two years after date of discharge, whichever is later, but not after July 25, 1952, except for persons enlisting under the Armed Forces Recruitment Act of 1945. Such persons have two years after the end of their first period of enlistment or re-enlistment in which to claim the benefit and five years after the date of such discharges to use their rights.

Q. What is the function of the Board of Veterans' Appeals in the VA?

A. The Beoard of Veteran's Appeals renders final decisions on cases appealed to the Administrator of Veterans Affairs. The Board has no original jurisdiction; its work is similar to that of a court of appeals.





They are also taught to cooperate in community safety activities. The entire program is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

The state winner is given an all expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, and also an opportunity to be selected for national honors and one of the eight \$300 scholarships. Give The Range **Plants A Chance**

In many areas of Texas, range lands were overstocked last year, and the bad effects from this practice will last for several years, says A. H. Walker, extension range specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

Overgrazing not only makes it harder for the valuable range grasses and plants to grow and make seed, but it also causes the soil to pack. This means less pore space in the soil and a lighter covering of litter on top of the ground. Ranges in this condition receive little benefit from the hard, dashing showers that are common to Texas during most of the year. On the other hand, reminds Walker, ranges that have been only moderately grazed have a turf that will slow down the run-off and will give the water a chance to soak into the soil. Such range land will soak up water from two to four times as fast as overgrazed ranges.

Less run-off means less erosion and more water in the soil. The increase in the stored water supply in the soil and the saving of valuable topsoil makes range plants grow larger and better. And any ranchman will tell you that more grass means a larger calf crop, heavier calves at weaning time, lower feed costs and better conditioned breeding cows in the herd.

It is always well, says Walker, to think in terms of future effects on the range when you're stocking a pasture. It is better still to make a close check on the amount and kinds of forage plants growing on the range and then stock in proportion to the amount of vegetation available. Light to moderate stocking will give the more desirable plants and grasses a chance to reproduce.

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

The Wall Street Journal has published what it terms "American industry's report card." It is a comparison of 1948 earnings of 376 leading industrial concerns, in two dozen industries, with the earnings made in 1947. It makes very interesting reading for those who are concerned with the economic state of the nation.

The most obvious fact is that 1948 produced record dollar profits, running well over \$5 billion for the 376 companies. But, as any economist will tell you, dollar totals alone don't tell the whole story by a long shot. Other factors, tangible and intangible, enter the picture.

First of all, there were tremendous differences in the profit experience of various big industries last year. Gloomy Outlook For **Peanut Growers**

In a nutshell, there isn't much good news ahead for the Texas peanut grower, as far as the supply is concerned. That's the way Texas A. & M. College extension specialists in agronomy, and agricultural economics see it. It just isn't favorable at all from the producer's standpoint. And here's why. The 1948 bumper crop gave the peanut people ket, other than for eating.

Large supplies of oil crops are on hand, and the world exports of fats and oils are increasing,

On the demand side, there are some favorable points, however, The level of employment in the nation and the consumer income is high. Right along with that the nation's population is increasing two million persons a year. This year's support price of peanuts is 90 per cent of parity, and world needs for fats and oils is more

than the supply can keep up with. The rest of the picture doesn't look as good. Funds of savings are declining and the competition for the consumer dollar is more than in past years. Peanuts for food uses have dropped from the high war-time level.





Retail trade in February showed a substantial rise from the January level, with the Bureau's index rising 4 per cent after adjustment for seasonal variation. It is significant that all of the increase in the index of retail sales was in the sales of durable goods stores. The sales of nondurable goods stores declined less than 1 per cent from January while sales of durable goods stores

increased 12 per cent. Building activity as measured by permits issued in February registered a substantial rise to carry the Bureau's seasonally adjusted index up 12 per cent from January. However, this level is still considerably below the rate of building during 1948, and it was down 21 per cent from February 1948. Except for erratic month-to-month fluctuations that characterize all building permit series, the course of the Bureau's index has been consistently downward since the beginning of 1948 However, the level of building is still extremely high in comparison with prewar standards, and at no time during the past year has the value of permits issued during a month been less than four times the value of permits issued in the prewar years.
