
"The government," says U. S News & World Report, "has become the biggest source of income in the country. In the single year to end next June 30, the Treasury will spend an estimated \$46,000,,000,000 in cold cash. This means that \$1 out of every \$6 spent in the United States will be spent by the government." The magazine then goes into considerable detail as to how all this money is to be divided.


The biggest item in the budget ___\$17,300,000,000____is accounted for by benefits and subsidies of many diverse kinds. Nearly half of that amount-\$8,300,000,000will go to veterans and is one of the payments we are making because of past wars. Then farmers will come in for something over \$2,000,000,000 in direct payments and government crop loans and price supports. Large sums will be paid to the old, the blind, and the unemployed. Finally, \$5,600,-000,000 will be paid out to foreign governments and for foreignaid purchasing.

I intend to deposit in the bank. Will this jeopardise my pension from VA?

A-Assuming the policy is other than U. S. Government Life Insurance policy, the receipt by you of \$5,000 will cause your income to exceed the limitations set by law so that you will not be entitled to pension for a year. The law provides that a veteran's income cannot exceed the amount of \$1,000 annaully if single and \$2,500 if with dependents and still receive a pension. Proceeds of insurance from other than a government insurance policy is income within the meaning of the law.

You don't specify whether these Bang's disease or Brucillosis in You don't specify whether these brewer's grains are wet or dry. The dried grains are a high-protein feed and excellent in a ration. The wet grains are about seventy-five per cent water, so have only ¼ as much nutrients; however, they are palatable and laxative and excel-lent to use with poor hay or dry cornstalks. The wet grains have a feeding value about equal to good corn silage and make a good sub-stitute for silage. You have to be careful to keep everything very cows and goats is often called "conagious abortion" because abortion is a typical result or symptom in cows. Apparently it does them no other harm. The same germ causes





The Treadaway-Daniell Hospital in Brownfield is a member, and I refer you to them about Blue Cross paying its bills. Four hospitals at Lubbock, four at Lamesa, and four at Big Springs belongs, and various cities that make up to 365.

Blue Cross does not allow anything to Osteopathic Hospitals. The Blue Shield pays anywhere as long as the physician is an M. D. and belongs to his local County Medical Society. In non-Member Hospitals Blue Cross only pays \$6.00 per day for member and \$5.00 per day for dependents, so you want to watch what kind of Hospital you go to. Removal of Tonsils and Adenoids are not covered the first 6 months, and maternity cases are not covered until you have had the policy 12 months.

If you want to avail yourself and family of these services, be sure and get application to me before December 15th, not the 16th. I have the application blanks in my office.
