## There Will Always Be Christmas Trees

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special) - Fifty years ago a President of the United States banned the use of Christmas trees in the White House because he thought the practice of cutting young evergreens was wasteful.

That order, issued by Theodore Roosevelt, went unchallenged until two of his young sons were caught in the act of smuggling a Christmas tree into the Executive Mansion. To escape their father's presidential wrath they appealed to America's first professional forester and Theodore Roosevelt's good friend, Gifford Pinchot, to intercede for them.

Pinchot did, pointing out that proper cutting of small evergreens for Christmas use is not harmful and frequently actually helps a

That advice, good enough 50 years ago to lift a White House ban and convince a strong-minded president, is echoed this year by no less an authority than the American Forest Products Indus-

"Don't worry about the plight of the poor Christmas tree," says this wood-industry sponsored organization, "it's as replaceable as the Thanksgiving turkey and just as indispensable to the American

Nearly half of the 21 million evergreens that make up America's 1949 Christmas tree harvest were farm produced. Nearly ninetenths of the entire crop was cut on privately owned timberland. To augment this domestic Christmas tree harvest, about five million evergreens are imported annually, most of them from Canada.

Besides bringing a fragrant freshness of the forest into two out of every three American homes this December, the threemonth Christmas tree harvest pours an estimated 50 million dollars into the Nation's economic bloodstream.

Most American Christmas trees are thinned from natural growth forests. An original stand of from five to ten thousand trees per acre will actually mature only a few hundred sawlog-size trees. Most of the small evergreens, selectively cut for Christmas sale, would sooner or later have been eliminated by Nature in the life and death struggle for forest space.

We built a house and the rough grading is done and we want to fit the land for lawn and garden. The soil seems to be a heavy clay. way to put this land in condition

Keep three things in mind: physical condition or texture so soil will hold some water but also drain off any excess; biological condition so bacteria are present and active clay or heavy, work in some sand or gravel, or coal ashes, or even 1/4-inch pound of sixteen per cent super-hosphate per fifty square feet. Inish grading and sow rye for a ceed with lawn or garden. Use one-half pound of 5-10-5 per 100 square feet with each seeding.

Q. How do you clip a hen's beak? A. Use two operators, one to catch

and hold the beak closed and with and hold the beak closed and with a sharp pocket knife, or a pair of wire clippers, snip off the tip of the upper beak till it is back even with the lowest half, or to the quick line. An electrical "de-beaker" is often used where there are a lot of birds to handle. It does not interfere with eating but does check cannibalism and prevent cating eggs. We do it when pullets are moved into the laying house and again in the middle of winter.

Please send me instructions on "how to find water" and any information you might have on "how to clean a well?"

Unless you are so gifted yourself, better hire a recognized water witch to locate your water.

To clean a well-mix about a half a can of chlorinated lime (5 oz.) in a pail of warm water and pour it into the well. Let it stand twentyfour hours. Pump some through the pipes, wash down the sides of several shovels of coarse gravel and pump well dry several times till

### Christ of Christmas Is a Genuine Story of Triumph

OUR celebration of Christmas centers chiefly, if not entirely, round the infant Jesus, and the tory of the birth in Bethlehem. That, in a measure, is as should be; for it brings Christmas into every home, and surrounds with sanctity every birth, ennobling and sanctifying mothernood as well.

## Learning, To Save All The Oil

state universities are overlooking tiac, Mich. pteroleum recovery research, Dr. G .H. Fancher, University of Texas petroleum engineering professor, declares.

He terms the policy "penny wise and pond foolish" and says 60 million barrels of oil may be left in the ground in the U. S unless researchers find new secondary recovery means.

"About 2,500 students are studying petroleum engineering in oil-state schools each year," Dr. Fancher declares. "They need the benefit of teaching inspired by research and of obtaining perhaps some research experience themselves to serve better the country in increasing oil recovery."

The Pennsylvania legislature is the only state law-making body appropriating money for either fundamental or applied oil recovery research, except in pitifully inadequate amounts, despite the recognized importance of petroleum to oil-state economies, he

Dr. Fancher reported the research information as a member of the Advisory Committee on Secondary Recovery, set up in N 1947 by the Interstate Oil Com-


