

GENOA REPORTS **ON COLUMBUS**

ROME-(AP)-As far as his home town of Genoa is concerned, Christopher Columbus is buried in Santo Domingo and not in Spain. Recent reports from Seville, Spain, said that a burial found there was now believed to be the remains of the Genoese navigator. The burial was in a grave in the crypt of the Church of Santa Maria de las Cuevas. The Genoese Center for Columbian Studies which specializes in such matters says Columbus was once buried in Seville, but the present finding must be inacurate. The body was moved. According to the Genoese Center, the "admiral of all the oceans" died at Valladolid, Spain, May 20, 1506. He was buried there. Then his son, Diego, had the body removed to the Church of Santa Maria de las Cuevas in Seville in 1509. But in 1544, or earlier, the body was taken from Seville to the Cathedral of Santo Domingo, in the present capital of the Dominican Republic.

FIXED-TIME (STOP AND GO) HIGHWAY TRAFFIC SIGNALS

What do you know about traffic signals? If your knowledge is limited to the fact that you go when the signal shows green and stop when it shows red, you can make the problem of traffic control an easier one for your public officials by knowing more about traffic signals.

You can help bring about uniformity of traffic signals by learning to identify the standard traffic signal and then encouraging your officials to use only standard types when they install new signals or replace existing non-standard signals. Wouldn't it be much easier for you to understand the indications given by traffic signals if they were all of the same design in every town and state? In fact, standardization of traffic control signals is considered so desirable and important that the Fiftieth Texas Legislature specified that all highway traffic signals installed in Texas after 1947 shall conform to National standards.

The sketch will help you to identify the most common type of a standard fixed-time . (stop and go) signal for suspension over the center of the highway. To be standard each face must have at least three lenses, with red at The top, yellow below the red, and green below the yellow. Additiional lenses ,showing arrows and walk-wait, may be added at complicated intersections to provide for special movements of traffic. The standard position of the lens-

G. I. QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

Q-As the beneficiary of my late husband's NSLI policy, I am at present receiving monthly insurance payments. How should I proceed to collect NSLI dividends on this policy?

A-Since the policy was in force at the time of your husband's death, the NSLI dividend will be sent to you, his beneficiary, automatically. 4. - 18 1 E Q-My husband, a World War II veteran, died from a nonservice connected disability. Am I entitled to a pension even though we had been married less than 10 years?

A-Since you were married within 10 years of the official close of World War II, you may be entitled if you meet income provisions, but there must be a showing that at time of his death. the veteran also had a serviceconnected disability. However, it is not necessary that death resulted from the service-connected condition.

Q-I had an arm amputated when I was 10 years old. Am I entitled to a pension as the dependent child of a Civil War veteran?

A-You are not entitled to a pension. To receive a pension after age 16, a child of a civil war veteran must have been totally helpless prior to that age. Q-If my husband, a pensioned





This time it's Rep. Lloyd Bentsen, Jr., of McAllen. Bentsen's views, expressed in his weekly newsletter, corresponds to a statment made at Amarillo recently by General Ernest O. Thompson of the Texas Railroad Commission.

Both say they are motivated by the same thing: A feeling that eight ore votes in the U.S. Senate might give Texas a better chance to retain control of tidelands. The U. S. Supreme Court ruled recently that the Federal Government has paramount rights to the tidelands. day.




