November 7 is the date set for voting on the bonds for the new 50x60 foot addition to be built on the east end of the present structure. Approximately \$250,-000 in bonds with a 10 year option and which will not run over a period of 25 years will be voted for at the designated time. The bonds are not to exceed 3 per cent interest, and interest payments will be made out of the 14 cent tax from the hourthouse and jail fund. Payment on the bonds will not begin for 7 years, and by that time the oil fields of Terry county should have developed to such an extent that no increase in taxes will be necessary. If the oil fields do not develop, the evaluation will not increase and taxes will have to be raised.
