



VA Examination Is Definite:

Every veteran rated for disability is entitled to and must have one physical examination made by the VA. Regulations now require that if initial rating was based on Army and Navy medical records. A VA examination must be given within 6 months. in a convalescent case, otherwise within one year.

POW's Are Warned To Keep Current Address:

The War Claims Commission has urged all former POW's who have filed claims to advise the Commission promptly of any changes of mailing address. A great number of checks have been returned with a notation on the envelope "Moved-no forwarding address." The letter or post card advising of a change should give old address, new address and claims number, if any. (This is the number on acknowledge card). 



Overplanting Cotton Voids ACP Aid

ments will not be eligible for pay- 432 ments under the Agricultural Conservation program, Hugh H. Harred, chairman of the county PMA committee, reminded growers today.

"There seems to be some misunderstanding about this part of the program," Harred said. While farmers generally know that they may not obtain cotton loans or other cotton price supports if they overplant their cotton allotments, they don't seem to realize that overplanting cotton also affects their participation in ACP."

Harred explains the operation of the law on which the cotton program is based in this way:

Where it is found that a grower has overplanted his cotton acreage allotment, a notice is mailed to him and he is given the opportunity of adjusting his cotton acreage within a period of 15 days. While the adjustment is not mandatory, the grower who does not adjust his cotton acreage to his allotment will not receive as a purchase order for cover crop seed, lime, or phosphate-a refund of the amount of the advance

Since marketing quotas are in another effect from overplanting quota. Until this penalty is paid, or until the cotton acreage is adjusted to the allotment, a lien will be levied on the farm's entire cotton crop and none of the cotton may be marketed penalty

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


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
