The important thing to remember about building farm fences is to build a good one. The use of posts treated with a preservative, well braced corner posts and the use of quality fencing plus a good construction job, will add years to the life of the fence.

Failure to provide farm livestock and poultry with the protection and feed they need during the winter months may mean the difference between a profit or loss for the producer.
