ENGLISH BARD, William Congreve, in "Mourning Bride" 1697 said, "Music hath charms to soothe the savage breast, to soften rocks or bend a knotted oak."

But, of course, Congreve never listened to some of today's "musical?" rock groups such as: Black Sabbath, Megadeath, White Zombie, Slayer, Obituary, or Anthrax. I thought Anthrax was an infectious cattle disease. In fact, most of those heavy metal rock groups should be classified as a disease and every effort should be made to eliminate them.

Remember when music gave us uplifting messages: "I love those 'Dear Hearts and Gentle People' who live in my hometown," and "Beyond The Blue Horizon' waits a beautiful day," and "I fall asleep 'Counting My Blessings'," and "Love and Marriage'. . .you can't have one without the other."

I think the downward turning point for music came when we began to lose the Italian influence in our popular music. You don't hear much from the old Italian crooners anymore. . . Perry Como, Dean Martin, Eddie Fisher, Frank Sinatra, Tony Bennet.

After all, the Italians practially invented music. The Greek legend of Orpheus playing his lyre to bring his lovely Eurydice back to life shows the mysterious power of music over our lives and has been the theme of many operas. Most of the old classic operas emanating from Florence, Italy were based on the Greek tragedies. Portions of these arias later became the basis of songs which were made popular in the West during the first half of the 20th century.

Religious music, Gregorian chants, Madrigal choirs, Ambrosian hymns, all had their beginnings in the Mediterranean area and became the foundations of our Western music.

We still use the old Latin terms for the technical aspects of all music whether it be vocal or instrumental. Such familiar terms as: tenor, soprano, alto, tempo, fortisimo, andante, staccato, crescendo, allegro. If you've ever played an instrument in a band or sung a hymn in church or in a choir, you will have come across some of these Latin words giving musical instructions.

By contrast, today we have an anti-social, anti-musical movement known as Rap. It is diffucult to use the words 'music' and 'rap' in the same sentence, since rap is anything except music. It is merely the spoken word put to rhythm.

Melody, rhythm and harmony are the basic elements of music. A series of tones, plus composition make up the melody. Words are not necessary for music, but are merely an added expression. Rap has rhythm and words but no melody, no tones, no harmony. Therefore, it simply is NOT music.

Rap represents much of the negative aspects of our world in 1993. It was conceived from the garbage in the streets of our inner-city ghettos; glorifying guns, gangs, sex, defiance of authority and a violent lifestyle. Some of the popular rap "artists" are: Tupac Shakur, Snoop Dogg, Dr. Dre, Ice-T, Ice Cube. I understand that the "ice" term has something to do with drugs. Most of these mentioned, have been arrested on drug charges. Shakur is currently charged with sexual assault and Dogg is charged with

"A festering cancer on the soul of society" might be an apropos description of rap. Do we want our little children and grandchildren listening to this sort of slime? Music (even faux-music) should be a positive and inspiring influence in our lives. . .not a negative one.

But, on the other hand, what can you say about such musicians as Sheb Wooley (cousin of Friona's own Bill Wooley and June Floyd) who gave us that great all-American classic tune from the 50s, "The One-Eyed, One-Horned, Flying Purple People Eater!"

"TAAS" Scores High In Friona

Friona Independent School District rated high in the Texas Assessment of Academic Scores (TAAS), compared to other schools its size in the region.

The scores were leaked to the media recently and have been widely publicized, although they were not intended to be released by the Texas Education Agency.

Of the ten conference AAA schools in the South Plains region, Friona's TAAS scores were the

The TEA ranked school districts according to the percentage of how many of the fourth-eighth-and 10thgrade students passed all parts of the TAAS, which was administered last

Friona had 55.33 per cent of the students taking the TAAS test to pass, 135 of the 244 students taking it. This was well above the state average of 46 per cent that

Besides having the top ranking among the area's class AAA schools, Friona also ranked 18th overall among the 76 schools in the region.

The class AAA schools and their rankings, were as follows (figures represent numbers of students passing the test and the percentage passing):

Friona, 135 of 244, 55.33%; Denver City 211 of 388, 54.38%; Littlefield 183 of 352, 51.99%; Seminole 231 of 459, 50.33%; Cooper 163 of 343; 47.52%; Dimmitt 131 of 307, 42.67%; Floydada 99 of 237, 41.77%; Roosevelt 111 of 281, 39.5%; Muleshoe 114 of 300, 38.0%; Slaton, 116 of 310, 37.42% and Brownfield 181 of 495, 36.57%.

The TAAS is one of many indicators used by the TEA to measure a school's performance as part of the agency's Academic Excellence Indicator System.

According to a TEA employee, such a ranking as that secured by the news media and published should not have occurred.

In information about the indicator system released to school districts, the TEA promised that it "has no plans to rank order schools in the state according to any of the indicators."

However, a new TEA employee, who was "out of the loop," created the list and gave it to state Senator John Montford.

Some school officials whose districts dipped below the state average were critical of the release of the list.

But such was not the case of Hal Ratcliff, superintendent of schools for the Friona ISD, who was more than happy to share the list

Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for his benefits and humbly to implore his protection and favor, and

Whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committe, requested me to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness;

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the twentysixth day of November next to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our service and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war, for the great degree of tranquility, union and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general, for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.





Underclassmen Top Chieftain Leaders

Underclassmen were much in evidence in the final statistical wrapup for the 1993 Friona Chieftain football team, which bodes well for the future.

A pair of juniors--Juan Gamboa and Chris Hanna, finished 1-2 in scoring and in yards gained rushing. Gamboa led in rushing with 544

yards to 525 for Hanna. But Hanna led the scoring department with 42 points, to 24 for Gamboa.

Another pair of juniors, Jimmy Arias and Jay Belcher, led the receiving corps. Arias led with 14 catches for 346 yards, and Belcher had seven catches for 158 yards. Arias had a pair of TD catches, and Belcher one.

Senior Blair Burney led in passing with 791. He finished out his career as a Chieftain quarterback as the all-time leader in yards gained passing, with 3,080 yards.

He gained 1,511 yards as a junior, when he led the area quarterbacks, and had another 681 yards as a sophomore and 97 as a

Clay Bandy is the only other Chieftain quarterback to collect more than 1,000 yards passing in a career, with 1,347 yards from 1972 to 1974. Bandy played for coaches who didn't exactly favor passing.

Burney's passing totals at FHS compare favorably to the all-time rushing leader at the school. Tony Perea gained 2,823 yards for Friona from 1966-68.

On defense, Hanna led the team in interceptions with six, including a near record return of 100 yards against Muleshoe. Arias had five, Jay Belcher 2 and Roy Hendley one.







Soil Moisture Survey Underway For High Plains Water District

High Plains Water District and USDA-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS) personnel are now collecting data for the annual preplant soil moisture survey.

The purpose of the survey is to determine the general soil moisture availability and deficit trends across the 15-county High Plains Water District service area.

Review of the pre-plant soil moisture survey information helps agricultural producers determine the amount of water they need to apply to bring their five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity without over-irrigating or under-irrigating.

Historical data shows that there is a better likelihood of producing above-average crop yields when the plant root zone of the soil is at or near field capacity prior to planting.

"Unless the area receives significant precipitation during the winter, we expect to find extremely dry soil conditions at most of the 310 soil moisture monitoring sites within the Water District," said Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS soil scientist.

"Irrigation for the 1993 growing season ended in early August. Since that time, there has been very little precipitation. Crops remaining in the field continued to deplete the available soil moisture from that time until first freeze," he added.

Three teams are now in the field collecting data for the 1994 pre-plant soil moisture survey. Weather permitting, they should complete their field work in early

Crenwelge and Brian Houston started in Deaf Smith County and are working south to Bailey, Cochran, Hockley and Parmer

The USDA-SCS soil scientist noted that 20 additional temporary soil moisture sites will be read in newly-annexed portions of Cochran and Hale counties. Permanent sites have already been installed in the newly-annexed portion of Lynn

County.

"Until permanent soil moisture sites can be established, five temporary sites in Cochran County and 15 temporary sites in Hale County will help us gauge soil moisture conditions in these new portions of the Water District," says Crenwelge.

Soil moisture sites are selected based upon soil types, the local saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates possible well yields, and crop water requirements in the area. Each site represents typical dryland or irrigated farming conditions in the





Data collected during the preplant soil moisture survey is then used to construct maps illustrating the soil moisture available for plant use within the five-foot root zone

soil profile and the amount of water needed to bring the soil profile to field capacity.

These maps, as well as the results of the pre-plant soil moisture survey, will be provided to local news media and will be published in the Water District's monthly newsletter, The Cross Section, prior to the pre-plant irrigation season.



Keep Food On Hand That Can Be Cooked At The Last Minute

big event such as Thanksgiving Day dinner for the entire family usually comes with a few surprises -- a guest you didn't plan on, Aunt Sally forgot to bring the hot rolls, the dog got into the pantry and ate the snacks you had prepared, etc. The best defense is to be prepared for the worst.

Stock up on ready-to-eat snack mixes, mixed nuts, chips and dips, and a variety of soft drinks--regular and diet. Also, have ready the ingredients for several quick-to-fix dishes. (If you don't use the ingredients for Thanksgiving, plan on making the dish at Christmas.)

Keep on hand the following items for last minute emergencies:

*Dry soup mix: dry onion soup mix and dry vegetable soup mix can be combined with sour cream for tasty dips; or, mix with mayonnaise for a salad dressing. Mix dry onion soup mix with rice as it cooks, and stir a packet of dry vegetable soup mix into a bowl of mashed potatoes for jazzed up side

*Little smoked sausages: wrap an uncooked refrigerated biscuit around a tiny sausage and bake according to the directions on the biscuit package. Or, mix the sausages with a bottle of barbecue sauce and heat in the crock pot. Let guests serve themselves.

*Fresh vegetables: set out a platter of celery and carrot sticks, broccoli and cauliflower florets, cucumber and bell pepper slices and whole green onions; serve wih a bowl of onion dip or ranch dressing. Or, quick-cook a bowl of carrots or broccoli in the microwave for another side dish.

*Fresh fruit: guests can snack on whole fruit, or dip sliced fruit into Honey Lemon Whipped Cream. QUICK HOT ROLLS

2 cups buttermilk

6 tablespoons sugar 3 packages dry yeast

6 tablespoons oil

1 teaspoon baking soda 2 teaspoons salt

4 cups flour

Warm the buttermilk to luke warm in a saucepan over medium heat. Add the yeast and stir to dissolve. Add the baking soda and salt. In a large bowl, measure the sugar and oil; pour the buttermilk mixture over the sugar and oil and *Instant pudding: instant mix well. Add the flour and knead until the dough is easy to handle. Roll out and cut into biscuits. Put some oil in the pan where the rolls will rise and bake. Dip the biscuits in the oil and turn over. Allow them to rise until double in size. Bake at 450 degrees until brown. The whole procedure will take about one hour.

MICROWAVE FUDGE 1-12 ounce package semi-sweet

chococlate chips

1 can sweetened condensed milk

Place the chocolate chips in a microwave-safe dish. Microwave on high for 1 minute. Stir. Continue to microwave, stirring after every 30 seconds, until the chocolate chips are melted and smooth. (Note: chocolate chips burn easily in a microwave, so it is important to stir frequently.) Remove from microwave and stir in sweetened condensed milk and vanilla. Spread in a buttered 9 or 8inch square pan; allow to cool. When cool, cut into small squares.

She married Clurry Wells Phillips on May 22, 1926 in Amarillo. He preceded her in death on June 14, 1974.



do away with the starburst effect created by oncoming headlights, and limit the glare from other types of lighting, too.

The anti-glare coating also helps to eliminate two visual annoyances: seeing your own eye or eyelashes in your glasses; and seeing double when looking at a bare bright light.

When you can see out better, people can see in better; that is, the anti-glare coating does away with the shine reflecting off your eyeglasses, so people can see your eyes.

Are there any disadvantages? Only that the glasses with this coating eem to smudge more than others, so that wearers need to take extra care to keep lenses clean. A new Teflon coating that goes over the anti-glare coating may eliminate this problem.


