

Bright Career of Ray Conger

R AY CONGER, Illinois A. C. star, whose recent triumphs over circle of Olympic prospects, started outdistancing competitors in his own section early in his undergraduate days at Iowa State U. The boy hung up his first record three years ago when he broke the Mid-Western association outdoor record for the mile. The time was 4.27, a figure which he cut considerably in later performances. He has

run the quarter in 50 seconds, the half in 1.53, and mile in about 4.17. Conger at present holds the national mile title. In capturing it at 4:23 3-5 he defeated Nick Carter, who was the only athlete besides Hahn to beat Edvin Wide in a mile scratch race. He ran the mile in 4.22 2-5 last year in the Central Association championships and won that title also.

Besides scoring individual honors under the banner of Iowa State college, Conger was a member of the record-breaking two-mile relay

team which romped to victory over so many Mid-Western opponents. After he was graduated in June, 1927, he stayed on at the college in order to do further work in physiology and physical education.

He has been conducting a series of experiments to discover now dlet affects vigor. Conger wished vainly that he might try out his schemes on athletes, but, failing that, experimented with rats instead. According to the last reports he found rats fed a balanced diet showed more energy than the vegetarian rats.

Conger was one of the strong middle distance candidates for the United States Olympic team anyway, but his win over Doctor Peltzer. followed by his extraordinary feat of making the 1,000 yards to 2.11, thus beating Hahn's record, unquestionably put him in the front row. RE you superstitious and do you believe that Friday, the 13th, is a jinx

If so, you'd better begin worrying now, for there's such a day in the offing-Friday, April 13. In fact, the year 1928 seems to be better supplied with this ominousto-some-folks date than

most years. There was one in January, the April one will soon be here and then there's another one due again in July.

So if you're a believer in this superstition, you've got two more such jinx days during which you'h need to watch your step, even if you did escape disaster on Friday, Jan uary 13. The aviators whose pictures appear above probably would tell you that there's nothing in it, anyway. But if you needed additional reassurance here's a news item which appeared in the Kansas City Star last January:

WARRENSBURG, MO .- Thirteen holds no terrors for Copper Norman, center on the Warrensburg college basket-ball team. The other night he wore sweater No. 13 and was the high man with thirteen points. The game was played on Friday, the 13th.

13th superstition point to the fact that, if it were as unlucky as it is supposed to be, American history might have been vastly different from what it has been. For instance, away back at the beginnings of this republic a certain Friday, the 13th, turned out to be a lucky day instead of an unlucky one. For in October, 1776. King George the Third of England caused the issuance of a proclamation, calling for a day of prayer and fasting throughout the kingdom, intended to bring about the defeat of the rebellious American colonists, who on a certain day, in the preceding July, declared that they were "of right and ought to be free and independent" from the mother country. That proclamation, as printed in the London Gazette of October 30, 1776, reads as follows:

We, taking into our most serious consideration the just and necessary measures of force which we are obliged to use against our rebellious subjects in our colonies and provinces in North America and putting our trust in Almighty God, that He will vouchsafe a special blessing on our arms both by sea and land, have resolved, and do, by and with the advice of our privy council, hereby com-mand, that a publick fast and humili-ation be observed throughout that part of our kingdom of Great Britain called England, our dominion of Wales, and town of Berwick upon Tweed, upon Friday the thirteenth day of December next; and so both we and our people may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain pardon of our

And may, in the most devout and solemn manner, send up our prayers and supplications to the Divine Ma-jesty, for averting those heavy judgmexts which our manifold sins and provocations have most justly deserved, and for imploring His intervention and blessing speedily to deliver our loyal within our colonies and provinces in North America from the violence, injustice, and tyranny, of those daring rebels who have assumed to themselves the exercise of arbitrary power; to open the eyes of those who have been deluded by specious falsehoods into acts of treason and re-bellion; to turn the hearts of the authors of these calamities, and finally to restore our people in those distract-ed provinces and colonies to the happy condition of being free subjects of a

Given at our court at St. James, the thirtieth day of October, one thousand seven hun-dred and seventy-six, in the seventeenth year of our reign.

to whom the Hanoverian king wished to appeal for aid evidently decided not to take sides with that ruler against his rebellious subjects, and for that reason, it would appear that there was at least one Friday, the 13th, which was a lucky day for America, even though it may have been unlucky for England.

More recently than this example of Friday the 13th, being lucky rather than unlucky for the American people is the fact that the man chosen to lead our troops in the World war, Gen. John J. Pershing, was born on Friday, the 13th, and one of the greatest victories of his men was that at St. Mihiel which was won on Friday, the 13th.

In fact, there are many people who not only scorn this superstition but never pass up a chance, as the aviators pictured above did, to defy this and other jinxes. There was once a famous Thirteen club, which used to smash a mirror before it sat down under umbrellas, thirteen at a table, on the occasion of its monthly dinners on the thirteenth, and there is no record that bad luck trailed any of its members and got them in bad. Several years ago thee Chicago couples were married on Friday, the 13th, at the 13th hour in cell No. 13 of the old convict ship "Success," which was then on exhibition in the Chicago river. Each bride carried a black cat and thirteen mirrors were broken at the time of the ceremony. So far as is known, all three of these marriages have suffered no disastrous fate.

In an age of what we are pleased to term "enlightenment and progress." It is interesting to note how the superstition about the number 13 has survived when other superstitions seems to be going into the discard. The belief that this number is a hoodoo seems to be world-wide. In France, especially in Paris, no house bears that number. In the French capital there are persons, known as "fourteeners," who are held in reserve to make fourteen at dinner

AN and wheat seem always to Man and wheat seem Wheat Is in the picture of the life of mankind at the earliest point at which science, research and investigation have been able to give that picture an outline. Its cultivation in China goes back at least 2700 years B C. In the remotest civilizations of the Valley of Mesopotamia of which any record has been obtained, wheat was a stuple crop and staple food. The scientist Unger found grains of wheat in the bricks of a pyramid at Dushur, Egypt, which is believed to date from 3359 B. C., and wheat grains of the same form have come from Stone age remains and rubbish heaps in the Swiss take country and in Hungary.

Whether Aryan, Chinese, or Stone age European of a type long since disappeared, mankind has had wheat at every point at which science has revealed anything accurate of his


