



Several drugs developed in the | past few years give the 16,000,000 high blood pressure (hyperten-sion) victims in the United States a better chance of living with a condition which, if allowed to go unchecked, can lead to severe heart, brain and kidney damage and even to death.

Two of the new drugs have proven particularly valuable in control of this disease. One is . . efinement known as reserpine from a crude root used for centuries in India for a score of ailments.

The second drug is hexamethonium chloride, a compound discovered in Europe which was administered only by injection until an American pharmaceutical firm succeeded in producing it in tablet

Reserpine is believed to lower blood pressure by its calming effect upon the central nervous system. It slowly lowers mildly elevated blood pressure. 

A simple way to improve your work output and mental alertness is suggested by recent studies at the College of Medicine of the State University of Iowa.

The scientists' prescription for this improvement will probably sur-

prise you. They have no new magic formula, and it's no expensive treatment. All they recommend is that you eat a good, sensible breakfast.
They have found this by comparing the mental and physical efficiency of many groups during periods when they ate breakfast, and when they didn't. All their tests have shown that people, from young school boys to older men and women, show up best when they

This is as logical as it is simple. You wouldn't expect a motor to start without fuel, or to run most efficiently on inferior fuel. Your body and mind need fuel too-and that's food - especially after a long night's fast. Yet many of us think of breakfast as unimportant -rush off to a day's work with only a cup of coffee and a bite of toast. That's hardly being fair to ourselves, as you can see from the latest study of Dr. W. W. Tuttle and his associates at Iowa.

In this study 25 boys cooperated. It lasted for 26 weeks, divided alternately into two- or threeweek periods of breakfast and nobreakfast. All this time, records were kept of the boys' work rate, work output, and school marks. When the test was over, two and two were put together, and here's what the scientists found: (1) Maximum work rate and maximum work output decreased during the no-breakfast periods, and | mind with working power.
