H. R. Garrett reported on the high school assembly program which was put on at the high school recently.

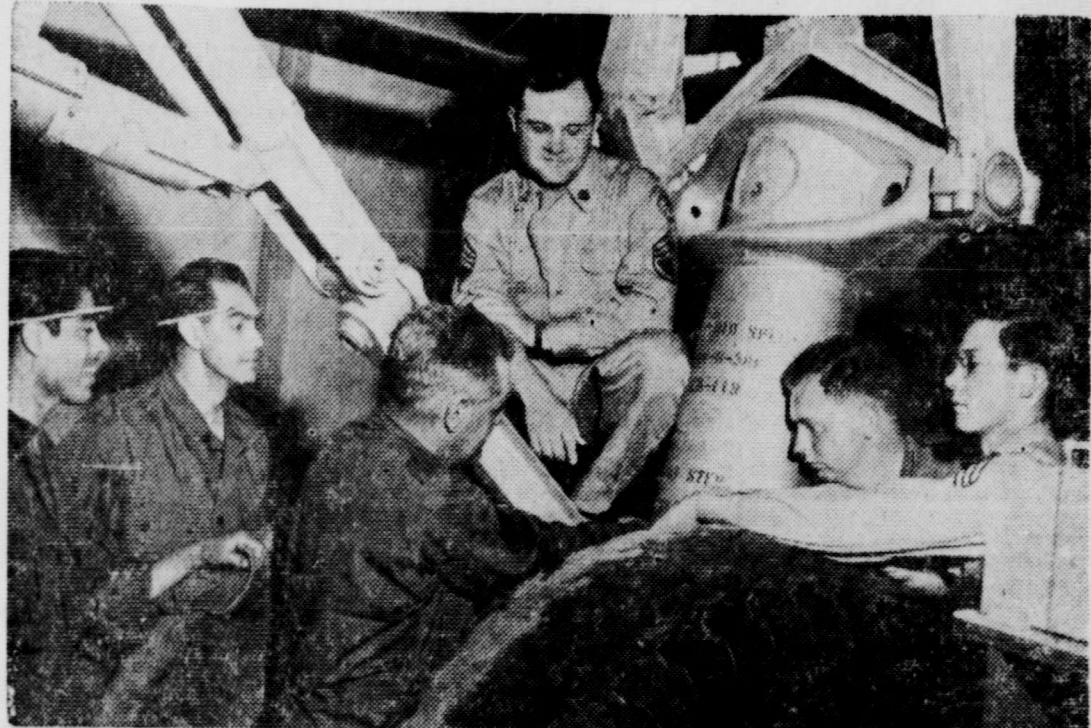

## R. W. Mancill Tells Of Cyclone Of 1893 When Cisco Was Blown Away

R. W. Mancill, whose memory retains happenings in Cisco through the years, reminds the Daily Press readers that today is the anniversary of the Cisco cyclone of 1893 when most of the town was blown away and many people killed.

The wind blew so hard that a 1x4 scantling was blown right through the door casing of the depot building which was of wood-frame structure. The plank was sawed off on either side of the door facing and remained there as a curiosity until the old building gave way for the present brick structure of Union Station.

But let him tell it in his own way:

"And again we are reminded of the terrible and disastrous cyclone that passed through Cisco 55 years ago, today. It came about 9 p.m. and there were 22 people killed that night, and a great many more injured. Some died later from their wounds.

"It was one of the darkest nights I ever saw, while it was doing its destructive work, but after passing over, it was one of the most beautiful nights I ever saw, and you could have read a newspaper out in the moonlight, it was so bright.

William Frederick Watson was born in Dublin, Texas, Nov. 6, 1889. He married Miss Annie David and came to Cisco in the early twenties. He lived at his home here at 300 West Sixth street for a number of years and was not through moving all of his household goods.

In the reorganization which took place S. H. Nance was made mayor pro tem, George Downie, retained as police and fire commissioner, Odom made finance commissioner, while Brown took over sanitation and Stafford was named to be in charge of streets. Mr. Nance will be water commissioner.

On account of a vacancy in the chamber of commerce directorate, caused by the resignation of Mason Pec, Jerry W. Sitton, publisher of the Cisco Daily Press, was elected to the place by the city commission, on the nomination of the chamber directorate.

Some routine business was transacted and the remainder of the time taken in discussion of plans and getting acquainted.

## Lake Texoma Fish Rodeo Open To All Comers

LAKE TEXOMA, April 2.—Thousands of Southwestern fishermen are getting ready with rods and reels, cane poles, outboard motors, and other sporting equipment for the \$200,000 Lake Texoma Fish Rodeo which officially opens May 1.

The \$200,000 Fish Rodeo which offers prizes for the capture of any of the more than 1,000 tagged fish, is sponsored by the Lake Texoma Sportsman Club, which represents six towns — Madill, Marietta, and Kingston in Oklahoma, and Gainesville, Sherman, and Denison in Texas.

The Fish Rodeo is open to all fishermen regardless of where they live. There is only one rule: All contestants, to be eligible for the prizes, must hold a membership in the Lake Texoma Sportsman Club. This membership which costs one dollar, can be purchased at all Lakeside concessions, or by writing to the Chambers of Commerce in any of the six sponsoring towns.

The Rodeo opens May 1 and closes September 30. All of the 1000-odd tagged fish are worth between \$100 and \$200 to the lucky angler who catches them.

But there is a grand prize fish— "The Ghost of Woodville." This fish is worth \$1,000 in cash, and each month that he goes uncaught, his value increases \$125. If he is not snared by September 1, he will then be worth \$1,500 in cash.

Sunday afternoon, May 2 at 3 o'clock "The Ghost of Woodville" will be released in the center of the lake. A large armada of boats will assemble between Washita Point and Preston Bend Peninsula to watch the event.

The opening of the 1948 Lake Texoma Fish Rodeo marks the first major undertaking supported by towns all around the lake. Merchants in the six towns sponsoring the Rodeo have contributed the prizes of cash and merchandise which make the sport of fishing more attractive than ever.

## Baptist Training School For Negroes Is Planned by Leaders for Abilene

ABILENE, April 28.—Negro Baptists of Abilene, West Texas and the state are setting up tentative plans for establishing a West Texas Religious Training School for Negroes to be located in Abilene.

The plans are dependent upon just one thing—that the City Commission of Abilene will grant a request made by Negro Baptist representatives that the present site and building of the Americanization School on North Eight be given for that purpose.

Already work is underway by the city to erect a new building at a new location for the school, and the commission is considering giving the old lot to the Negroes of Abilene for use as either a community center, a playground or for the training school.

Some weeks ago the Rev. Z. H. Hickerson of Mineral Wells, moderator of the West Texas Baptist, Missionary and Educational Convention of Texas, appeared before the City Commission with the Rev. A. B. Carroll, pastor of the Mt. Moriah Baptist Church of Abilene, in behalf of the proposal. They presented the commission a petition bearing signatures of several prominent men and religious leaders of Abilene.

The delegation pointed out to the commission that with use of a park tentatively planned for the Negroes on North 10th and of the playground of Carter G. Woodson School, a playground would not be needed on the site of the Americanization School.

They proposed that the present school building could be used for religious training purposes and that they would continually add improvements to it.

Carroll has explained that there are in Abilene and West Texas Negro ministers who have not completed elementary school and that they need a place to prepare for their work. He also pointed out the need for giving Negro laymen religious training.

It is proposed that the school would not be confined to Negro Baptist alone, but that it would be open to persons of any religious affiliation. The Abilene minister said such an institution would not only serve Abilene, but would serve West Texas as a whole. He said there is not such a Negro school in this section, that the nearest ones are Bishop College in Marshall, Butler College in Tyler and Mary Allen College in Crockett. He asserted that through establishment of the school which might eventually become a college, Abilene would receive an even higher rating as an educational center.

## Sky Writer for Pepsi Cola to Give Aerial Display Over Cisco Thursday

Skywriter Bud Francis, who will give an aerial penmanship display across the skies over Cisco Thursday and surrounding territory, when he pens his smoke message Pepsi across the heavens, weather permitting according to announcement by Wesley C. Ruth of the Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company of Brownwood, Francis, who only joined the Pepsi-Cola Skywriting Corps in 1947, has already added to his 4,500 hours of flying time by writing Pepsi several hundred times in the skies. A former Air Corps Captain, Bud is now a member of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

In the aerial penmanship exhibition, Francis will use the plane as a pen and a specially prepared smoke as ink to write his message across the heavens in letters one mile high and six to eight miles long. Written upside down and backwards as "ispep" by the Skywriter, in order to appear correctly to spectators in the streets below, the smoke message will be visible for as long as thirty minutes, if wind conditions are favorable, and can be seen within a radius of twenty miles.

The technique of skywriting requires six months to a year to be learned by a trained pilot who, as he maneuvers his plane to form the letters in the sky,

## Five Clearance Sales of WAA to Finish Surplus

Five clearance sales this week will write the finish signs at scattered locations in Texas and Louisiana for War Assets Administration disposal involving approximately \$1,060,000 in war surplus inventories.

Four of the disposals will be in Texas. The other, at Gulfport, Mississippi, will liquidate stocks with a cost value of \$750.00 at the Gulfport Naval Supply Depot and the former army air field there. Gulfport buyers will converge on Wednesday to claim purchases.

Two sales in the Houston area will include house trailers on university property in the city and about \$103,000 worth of hospital supplies, heaters, gas ranges, furniture and other miscellany at Camp Wallace Hitchcock, Texas. The trailer sale will be concluded Wednesday, while the sale at Camp Wallace will be over Friday.

Second largest liquidation sale of the week will be climaxed at the Crystal City, Texas, Internment Camp on Wednesday following two days of inspection. Furniture, and general products with a cost value of \$116,000 will be offered to bidders in 160 lots.

Some \$65,000 worth of surplus goods, including a few sedans and trucks, will be cleared this week from Hangar Number One at Love Field Dallas. Following an inspection by various buying classes, this disposal will wind up on Friday.

Besides releasing considerable warehouse and storage space, the various disposals will materially reduce protection and maintenance costs charged to the government for its custody of the property, according to Col. Karl E. Wallace, director of WAA's regional office at Grand Prairie.

## Principle Still At Stake.

The 48-hours between midnight Friday and midnight Sunday are the most dangerous of the week. Take it easy, the department warns on Saturday and Sunday — the days on which 38 per cent of the fatal accidents occur.

And for the month, December takes the mourning cloth.

August paces it a close second. Last year 225 persons died during the month of December. Another 202 had met death during the 31 days of August.

Last year 16 persons, alive on the morning of Dec. 24, were dead by Christmas Eve. That figure was surpassed on two other days, March 29 and Sept. 21. In all, 17 Texans died on each of those days.

And from the live-a-little longer side, the period around 5 o'clock in the morning seems to be the safest time. There are fewer deaths then, likewise fewer accidents.

Wednesday is the "safest" day and January the "safest" month. That's according to the statistics.

Of the fatal accidents last year, 24 per cent involved pedestrians. Of those pedestrians, 24 per cent (eq) had been drinking.

Nine other death-dealing situations are recognized by the Department of Public Safety.

Here they are:

Of the fatal accidents, 20 per cent of the persons involved died in head-on collisions. Fourteen per cent started a curve in their automobile, and ended it on a slab in a morgue. Eight per cent simply went off the road. Four per cent took their final ride by plowing into the rear end of the car ahead. Another eight per cent contested the right-of-way with a bridge or

some other fixed object. Seven per cent died at an intersection when both cars hit the same spot at the same time. One per cent of the motorists died in side-swiping or being sideswiped by another car. Five per cent were involved in accidents with trains. Nine per cent, too varied to catalog, died in the other types of accidents.

It is one thing for Mr. Lewis and the union he completely dominates to fight for high wages and other material benefits. The only solution seems to be to bring the powerful labor unions within the scope of the antitrust laws which prevent industrial monopoly.

**Strawberry Cream Pie.**  
2½ cups fresh strawberries.  
½ teaspoon lemon juice.  
½ cup sugar.  
1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin.  
¼ cup cold water.  
½ cup sieved cottage cheese or 1 3-oz. package softened cream cheese.  
¾ cup whipping cream.  
¼ teaspoon salt.  
1 Crumb Pie Shell.  
Mash 1½ cups washed, drained strawberries; add lemon juice and 1-3 cup of the sugar. Soften gelatin in cold water; place over hot water and stir until dissolved; add crushed berries and mix well. Chill until slightly thickened. Combine cheese, whipped cream and salt; spread lightly in chilled corn flakes crumb crust. Slice remaining berries in halves; sprinkle with remaining sugar, and arrange on top of cheese mixture. Cover with chilled gelatin and strawberries;

chill until firm. Garnish with whipped cream if desired.

## Under the Dome At Austin

United Press Staff Correspondent. AUSTIN, Tex., April 28. — If the somber figures of the statisticians are correct, a funeral cortege will wind through a cemetery each this year for 2,150 Texans — each

of them the victim of a traffic accident.

That figure will set a new record, surpassing the previous all-time figure of 2,043 smashed out on the streets and highways of the state in 1937.

Last year, 1,997 persons died as the result of traffic accidents. The total was 23 per cent above the 10-year average.

Increased vehicle miles — in the language of the layman, more driving — is the principal reason for the forecast of a record in 1948.

If you want to ring the New Year in on Jan. 1, 1949, the Department of Public Safety sets out a few things a motorist might well remember.

The department has charted the accident death rate by hour of the day, day of the week and month of the year.

In the 60 minutes between 7 p. m. and 8 o'clock more Texans take their last ride than at any other time. Blame it on poorer visibility. Distractions increase. Faster speeds and drinking drivers both appear. Reactions are slower. Drivers relax from the tenseness at the end of a business day.

Take your pick as to reasons. The corpse count is still the same.

The clear and distinct portrait is enclosed with a document signed by Sam Houston in which the signature covers a space of four by seven and one half inches.

Both have been donated to the famed auction by Herbert Fletcher, Houston Collector, dealer and publisher of materials about Texas.

The Historical Association, which has headquarters at the University of Texas, expects over 500 junior and senior members to attend its 51st annual meeting that will feature reports on new historical research in addition to the auction of books and documents relating to Texas.

H. Bailey Carroll, Austin, is director of the Association.

"To be perfect," Dreicer added dreamily, "the steak must follow certain standards."

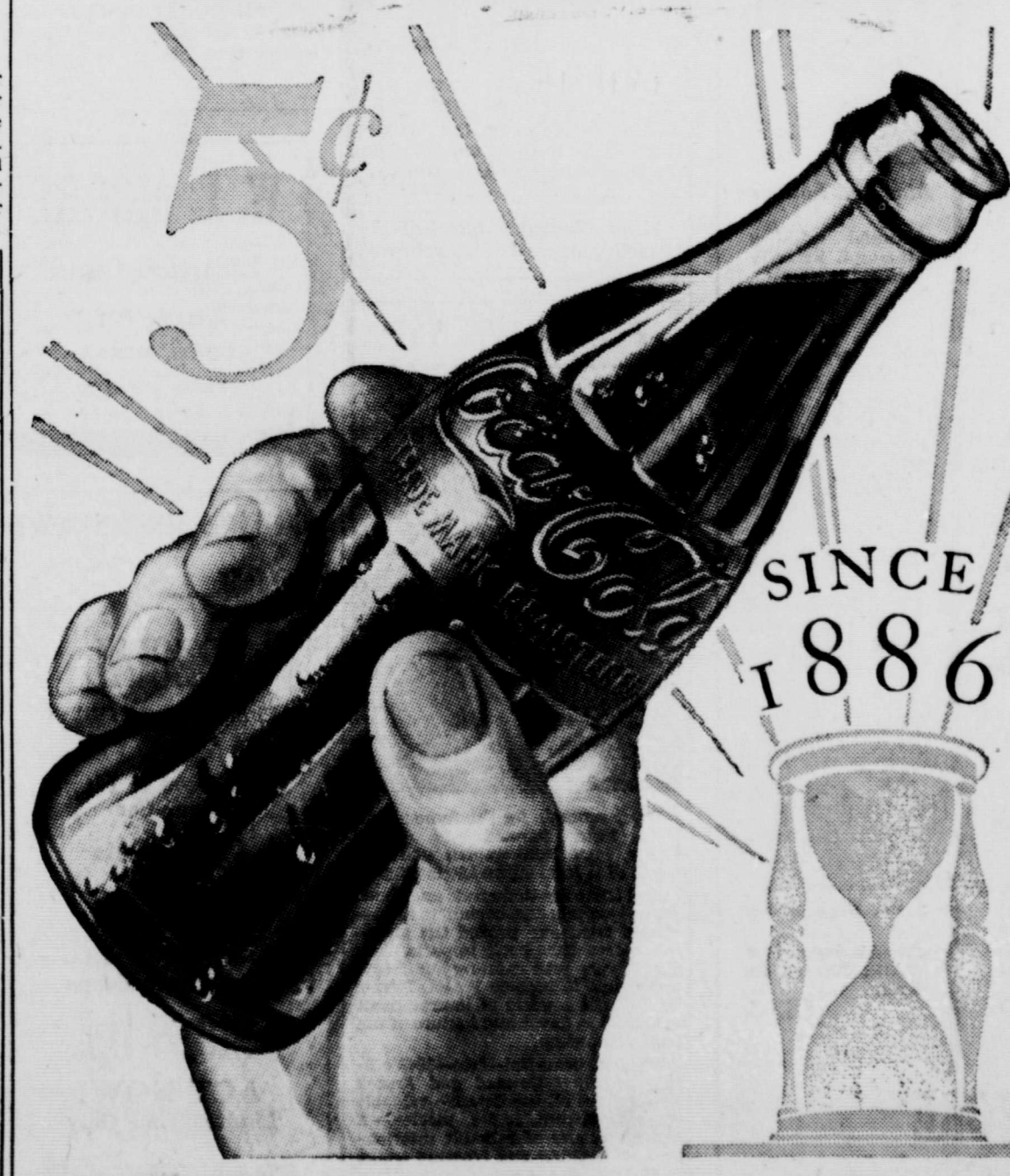

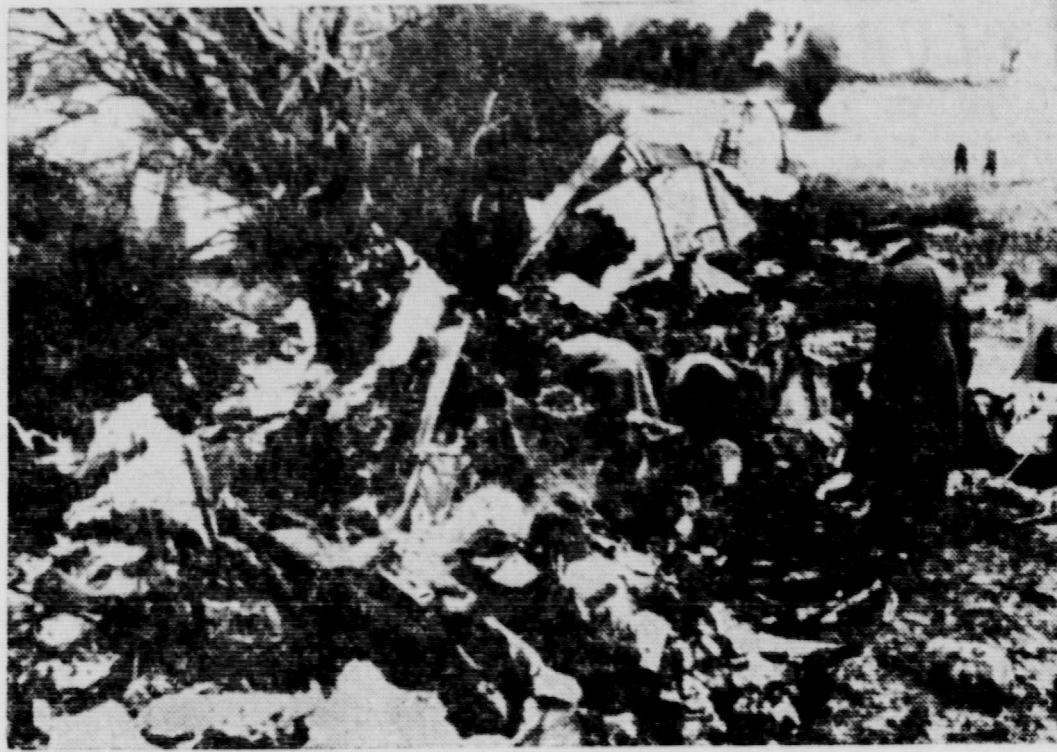
