Next of Kin of War Dead to Receive Gold Star Button After June 1

The Nation's memorial to World War II dead — the Gold Star Lapel Button — will be ready for distribution after June 1, 1948, to the next of kin of men and women of all the Armed Services who died for their country at home and abroad.

The authority for this recognition came in Public Law No. 306, enacted by the 80th Congress, which set up an appropriate designation of widows, parents, and certain other members of the families of those who died in the service of their country between December 7, 1941, and July 25, 1947, both dates inclusive. The term "parents" includes mother, father, through adoption and father stepmother, stepfather, mother through adoption.

One Gold Star Button is to be furnished without cost, to the widow or widower and to each of the parents of a member of the Armed Forces who lost his life while on active military service between December 7, 1941 and July 25, 1947, both dates inclusive. The term "parents" includes mother, father, through adoption and father stepmother, stepfather, mother through adoption. One Gold Star button will be furnished at cost price to each child, stepchild, brother, sister, half brother, and half sister of a deceased member of the armed forces if the death fell within the dates fixed.

Next of kin of deceased Army and Air Force personnel may submit applications to the Adjutant General, United States Army, Washington 25, D. C. Application forms will be available about June 1, 1948, and may be obtained from any Army or Air Force installation, any nationally recognized veterans organization, or The Adjutant General.

Navy, Coast Guard and Marine applications should go to the Chief, Bureau of Naval Personnel, Navy Department, Washington, D. C. BROWNWOOD, April 30. (UP) — Brownwood's bid for the first world championship checker tournament, to be held August 16, has been accepted by the National Checker Association.

J. F. Wright, of Lake Brownwood, secretary-treasurer of the state group who submitted the successful bid, said the tournament will last two weeks or more and will be combined with the annual Texas State Checker Association tournament.

Texas University Claims Champion Relay Teams

AUSTIN, April 30. (Spl.) — A half-dozen youngsters — four of them sophomores — are responsible for the University of Texas' well-founded claim this week to four national championship relay teams.

Past their three big relay appearances of every season at Texas, Kansas and Drake, and with unofficial team championships in league of them, Coach Clyde Littlefield has ample claim to U. S. supremacy in the quarter-mile, half-mile, four-mile and distance medley relays.

Three sprinters, Allen Lawler, Perry Samuels and Charley Parker, ran on all the winning sprint relay teams. Three more Longhorns, Wayne Hanson, Don Sparks and the matchless little Jerry Thompson, were members of all long-distance groups. Of these six, all but Thompson and Lawler are sophomores.

Working with them were John Robertson and Charley Tatom, mixing into the 440 and 880 combinations, while Desmond Kidd was the 440 man in the distance medley and Dick Brooks handled the lead-off work in the four-mile race.

First National Bank Leads ABC Volley-Ball Entry

ABC Club President Charlie Burke today announced that the First National Bank of Cisco is the first entry in the club volleyball league. Bank Vice-President McCracken will captain the team which is counting the days until Monday when it gets its first night's practice at the regular ABC volleyball session.

Other league entrants will be announced soon along with the official volleyball schedule. Besides the bank team the eight teams comprising the league are expected to come from the Baptist, Christian, Methodist and Presbyterian churches; both Rotary and Lion clubs; the Cisco Lumber & Supply Co., and the Cisco school and college teachers.

It is expected that games will be played on two evenings a week, with two 3-game sessions a night. Thus, with four teams playing one night and four the next volleyball night the same week, each team will play at least once every week.

While it is too late to start an inter-class volleyball league now, when classes resume after the summer vacation, it is expected that Senior High School may include the sport in its athletic program, with the possibility of even scheduling outside games.

The regular ABC volleyball session will be held as usual next Monday night at the high-school gym, at 7:30, when another good attendance of both players and spectators is predicted.

Texas Baptists Asked to Contribute To Baptist Hospitals Mother's Day

One million Texas Baptists will pay tribute to their Mothers on Sunday, May 9th, by giving to the charity funds of their Baptist hospitals.

Every Baptist is being asked to make a contribution to the sick poor in honor or in memory of his own Mother. Sunday school classes, Missionary Unions, Brotherhood groups and church congregations will participate.

The Mother's Day Fund will be used solely for giving free hospitalization in the Texas Baptist hospitals to critically ill patients in need of hospital therapy but unable to pay for such treatment. The hospitals are Hendrick Memorial, Abilene; Baylor University Hospital, Dallas; Valley Baptist Hospital, Harlingen; Memorial Hospital, Houston; Hillcrest Memorial, Waco; and Southeast Texas Baptist Hospital in Beaumont. The hospital at Beaumont is under construction but plans to be in operation soon.

Youth Charged With Shooting Father-In-Law

ABILENE, April 30. — A charge of assault to murder was filed Thursday afternoon against Billy Rey Davis, 19, of 625 Peach, a few hours after his father-in-law, Vol Hargrove, was seriously wounded in the abdomen in a shooting which occurred about 10:30 a. m. in Hargrove's Radio Shop, 1534 South Eighth street.

Late last night Hargrove's condition was "slightly improved" following surgery, hospital attendants reported.

The charge was filed by County Attorney Theo Ash in Justice of the peace W. A. Ward's court, after the youth signed a written statement before Ash in which he indicated the shooting occurred over family trouble. Ash said that Davis would not be given an examining trial before Friday morning and that no bond had been set, pending the outcome of Hargrove's condition, described by a physician as being serious.

The youth was arrested by Policeman C. W. Cunningham at Robinson's Pharmacy, 929 Butternut, to which he ran after the shooting.

Hargrove was shot once with a 22 rifle. Davis in his statement, witnessed by Chief Detective C. Z. Hallmark and Deputy Sheriff J. D. Woodward, said that his wife, the former Bettie Hargrove, left him Wednesday and that he blamed his father-in-law for her leaving. He said he went to the Hargrove home Wednesday night to inquire as to the whereabouts of his wife.

Davis said he borrowed the .22 rifle from an acquaintance Thursday morning on the pretext that he wanted to shoot a stray cat.

The youth said he took the rifle with him when he went to Hargrove's shop Thursday morning. Davis said when he went in the shop he demanded of Hargrove: "I want to know where Bettie is." Davis said that his father-in-law started out from behind the counter. As Hargrove reached the end of the counter, Davis said he fired. "I shot at his waist," the youth's statement related.

Detective Hallmark said Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Childers, 550 Sammons; were in the shop at the time and witnessed the shooting. Justice of the Peace W. A. Ward said he performed the ceremony which united Davis and Bettie Hargrove in marriage last December.

A resident of Eastland for the past 28 years, Griffin had been employed in various lines of work ranging from farming to trucking. He kept a number of horses most of the time.

Griffin, it is understood, had some horses staked on some lots across the railroad in the north part of town and was on his way to look after them when the accident occurred. It was his custom to make the trip each morning.

Funeral arrangements were pending at noon today. The body is at Hammers Undertaking establishment.

Political leaders here and in most of the other states this week are watching with interest the rising support being received by Harold E. Stassen, Minnesota's Governor, in the race for the Republican nomination for President and wondering how far it will go before convention time in Philadelphia.

Upon the heels of Stassen's impressive victories in the Wisconsin and Nebraska primaries in which he outdistanced all his opponents, has come a report of a poll by Dr. George Gallup, taken from April 9th to 17th, which has set all political leaders and ordinary citizens alike, speculating on changing trends in the preferences of voters. The poll shows Stassen has jumped into first place in the Gallup poll and now for the first time is leading all his rivals. Standings of the various candidates among voters who class themselves as Republicans were as follows:

Stassen — 31 per cent
Dewey — 29 per cent
MacArthur — 16 per cent
Vandenberg — 10 per cent
Taft — 9 per cent
Warren — 2 per cent
Martin — 1 per cent

Stassen has more than doubled his strength since the last Gallup poll, reported March 28. He has jumped from 16 per cent at that time to 31 per cent, while Governor Dewey, his closest rival, has gone down from 34 per cent to 29 per cent. Senator Taft, another major contender, has gone down, 12 per cent to 9 per cent. Last December Dewey had 39 per cent, and Stassen, 10 per cent.

Stassen led all potential nominees listed in the Nebraska primary. Latest reports give his total vote in Nebraska as 80,522. Votes for other candidates were Dewey, 63,885; Taft, 21,228; Vandenberg, 9,259; MacArthur, 6,782; Warren, 1,771 and Martin, 835.

Stassen's rising support is being attributed to the increasing number who are becoming acquainted with his abilities as his campaign progresses and particularly his views frankly on all issues. The question and answer periods with which he followed his talks in the Nebraska and Wisconsin primaries made a big hit with audiences. Wisconsin responded to his unusual method of campaigning. Stassen led all candidates there with 19 delegates. Nebraska followed. Next will come the primary contests in Ohio and Oregon.

Sometimes there may be several "weeks" telescoped into one, like Yam Week, Letter Writing Week and Square Dance Week.

The pride that Texans are well known for is borne out in the governor's proclamations.

At various times there has been Citrus Week, Turkey Trot Week,

and just to make sure no one overlooks it, there's Texas Week.

At other times there are weeks, months and days set aside for organizations (Boy Scout Month, Jaycee Week, YMCA Week), special drives (Spring Clean-Up Week, Cancer Control Month), and patriotic periods (Army Day in Texas, Recruiting Month, Stars and Bars Week, and Statehood Day).

The governor proclaims a number of special weeks in response to requests from organizations. Other proclamations are issued in connection with national observances.

Just to remind ex-servicemen to keep their insurance up to date, the governor one month proclaimed National Life Insurance Reinstatement Month.

Then there has been Atomic Energy Week, Music Week, Poetry Day, Women Broadcasters Day, and good government week.

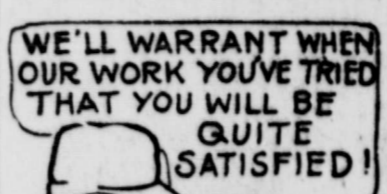
Impossible, But Unus Can Stand On One Finger

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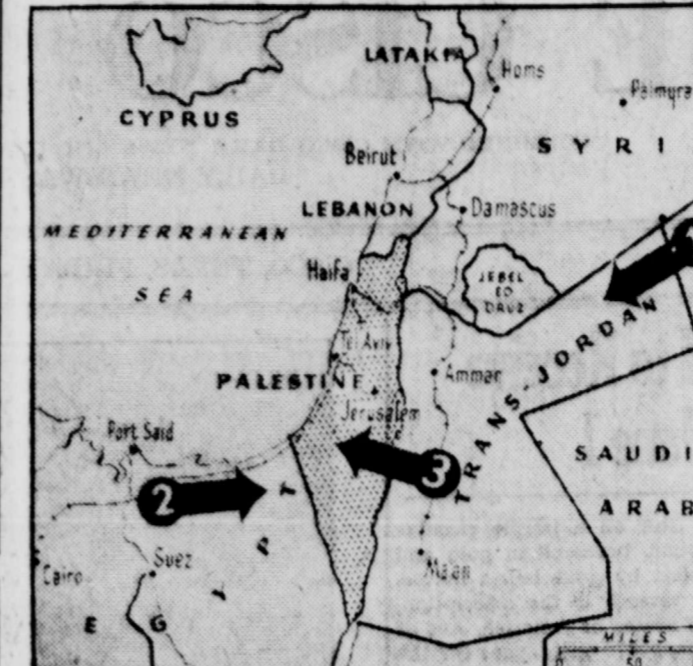
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Arabs Draw Palestine Net Together

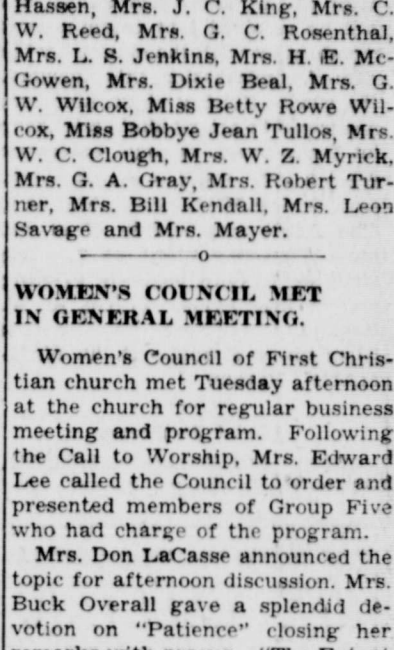
