One Gold Star button will be furnished at cos price to each child, stepchild, brother, sister, half brother, and half sister of a deceased member of the armed forces if the death fell within the dates fixed.

Next of kin of deceased Army and Air Force personnel may sub mit applications to The Adjutant General, United States Army, Washington 25, D. C. Application forms will be available about June 1, 1948, and may be obtained from any Army or Air Force installation, any nationally recognized veterans organization, or The Adjutant General.

Navy, Coast Guard and Marine applications should go to the Chief, Bureau of Naval Personnel, Navy Department, Washington, D. C. and they likewise, may be procured from Naval installations or veterans organizations, or from the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

Brownwood Bid for World Champ Checker Player Tournament

BROWNWOOD, April 30. (UP) -Brwnwood's bid for the first world championship checker tournament, to be held August 16, has been accepted by the National Checker Association.

J. F. Wright, of Lake Brownwood, secretary-treasurer of the state group who submitted the successful bid, said the tourna ment will last two weeks or more and will be combined with the annual Texas State Checker Association tournament.

Rudy Munzinger, Alton, Ill. wrote a formal letter of acceptance of the Brownwood bid which involved a \$1,250 guarantee, Munzinger is secretary of the national association.

Munzinger wrote that he will communicate with officials of the Southern States Checker Association, which has a tourney planned for this fall, "with view to combine the two tourneys, if possible, and thereby make the Brownwood affair the largest in the history of the United States,

Foreigners will be invited to compete in the Brownwood tournament for tournament championship of the world Wright said. And he said it will be the first big checker tournament ever held in Texas and the very first world tournament ever held.

The successful bid was entered on behalf of the Texas State Checker Association which has the backing of the Brownwood civic organizations. The state tournament has been held at Brownwood for the past three years and has been scheduled here for August. The Texas players advancing farthest in the world tiurnament will become the 1948 Texas tournament cham-

'There's no telling how many players will compete in the world tournament," Wright said.

Martin - 1 per cent Stassen has more than doubled his strength since the last Gallun poll, reported March 28. He has umped from 16 per cent at that time to 31 per cent, while Governor Dewey, his closest rival, has gone down from 34 per cent to 29 per cent. Senator Taft, another major contender, has gone down, 12 per cent to 9 per cent. Last December Dewey had 39 per cent, and Stassen, 10 per cent.
