## Responsibility For G. I.'s

The Veterans Administration has relieved its training officers of all responsibility for the direct supervision of 45,000 non-disabled World War II veterans in training under the G. I. Bill in the 51-county Dallas Region.

Responsibility for the training of these veterans rests with the state schools and training establishments. Public Law 346 originally made the state and community accountable for this training, but VA has been augmenting that service because state agencies and communities were not equipped nor in a position to carry out the responsibility delegated them.

Leon P. Howell, Acting Manager of VA's Dallas Region, said the change will permit training officers to devote full time to the needs of 7,500 disabled veterans in training under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act. Now that VA has been relieved of its obligation

for the training of non-disabled men and women, VA will be permitted to better and more efficiently supervise disabled veterans under jurisdiction of the Regional Office, Howell said.

Communities and service organizations will be expected to assume their responsibility for assisting in veterans training.

VA, said Howell, will look to an increased extent to State Approval Agencies to carry out their obligations to approve only schools and job training establishments that are fully qualified and equipped to give good courses and instruction and are otherwise satisfactory on the basis of current inspections. Schools and job establishments are obligated to furnish effective education and training to each veteran that enrolls. The institutions must not keep a veteran in training longer than his conduct and progress warrant. They must provide VA with reports of veterans' attendance and progress. VA will use these reports, along with surveys of veterans in the G-I Bill

## State Colleges Have Phenominal Student Growth

HUNTSVILLE, April 29. (UP)—Sam Houston State Teachers college here, the first of seven established in Texas, has just observed its 69th birthday.

The seven colleges, geographi-

cally located for all the state, have issued 141,273 teachers' certificates out of a total of 243,878 issued by all colleges.

A single board of regents govern the seven colleges. Legislation approving establishment of what now is Sam Houston State Teachers college was signed April 21, 1879, by Gov. O. M. Roberts. The other six colleges are Sul Ross, Alpine; West Texas, Canyon; North Texas, Denton; Stephen F. Austin; Nacogoches; Southwest Texas, San Marcos, and East Texas, Commerce.

Present campus enrollment of the seven schools is nearly 14,000 and an additional 5,277 students are receiving courses through correspondence.

programs, to safeguard the veterans' rights to adequate and progressive training and to prevent possible fraud against the government.

The new supervision policy varies among the different kinds of training institutions. No change was made among colleges and universities which already have the responsibility for supervising all veterans enrolled. VA, said the Acting Manager, will use periodic conduct and progress reports to supervise ex-servicemen and women in other schools and in job training establishments. Like procedures will be used in supervising veterans taking institutional on-the-farm training.

## Ranchers Urged To Wage War on Brucellosis

AUSTIN, April 30. (Sp1)—Farmers and ranchers were urged today to step up a spring campaign against brucellosis of cattle—now regarded as the greatest cause of economic loss to the nation's livestock industry.

Brucellosis control has ground during the war and postwar years, and renewed efforts against the disease are urgently needed, the American Foundation for Animal Health points out.

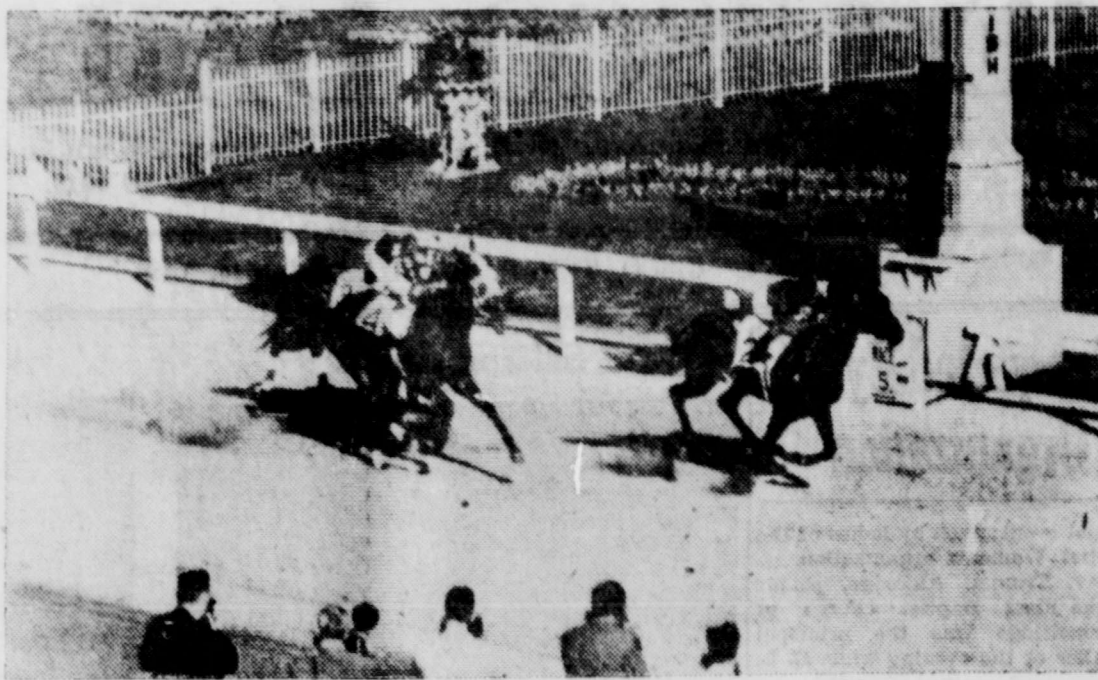
Brucellosis is commonly known as Bang's disease. "In 1941, seven million cattle were tested, and the infection rate was only 2.4 per cent" the Foundation said. "Last year, only a little over five million cattle were tested, and the infection rate was up to 4.5 per cent."

"If we hope to stop the increasing loss of meat and milk production due to brucellosis, and protect our human population from infection with undulant fever, the organized brucellosis control campaign must be extended to every cattle raising area.

"Blood tests to identify reactors, disposal of reactors in accordance with federal and state regulations, strict sanitation and herd management, and calfhood vaccination—all these measures fit into the brucellosis control picture.

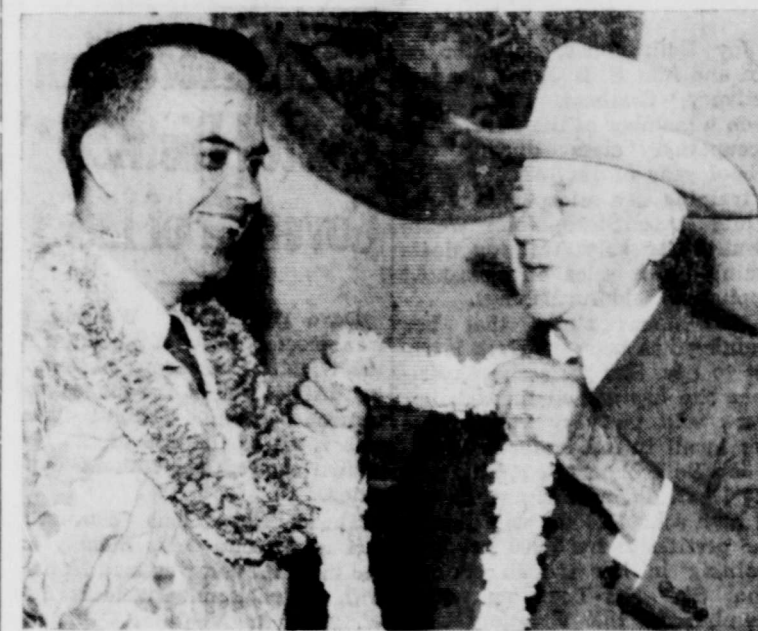
"Close co-operation between veterinarians and cattle owners is vitally important, however, to be sure that these measures are properly applied—and to be sure that control measures go forward on a sound basis."

## Meeting For Next Of Kin on Return Of Honor Dead

## Movies Put Finger On Topsy Drivers

POMONA, Cal. (UP)—Authorities here are boasting a new technique of wiring drunken drivers for sound, and capturing their inebriated characteristics with a motion picture camera.

Here's how it works: An officer picks up an erratic driver who maintains that he has had only one beer. They go to the station where the driver is given a sobriety examination which includes the "line-walking test," the "pass-pointing" test and the revolving Rhomberg test which measures reflex action.

A doctor is present to check his eyes, speech, balance, gait, breath and general behavior. But that's not all—the driver's every word is

recorded on a wire recorder, and every action observed by a 16 mm. camera. He is then booked, if pronounced drunk.

## Medical Cane tradition Carried on By Doctors

BERKELEY, Cal. (UP)—A hollow-headed gold cane which early physicians used to fill with herbs to protect themselves against disease is the model for an annual award which the University of California gives to outstanding medical students.

The tradition dates from the times of a Dr. Radcliffe, English physician who carried a gold-headed cane from 1689 until his successor was named. The cane then went to his successor.

The cane's head was hollow to allow the physician to carry "protective" herbs when entering a sickroom. The cane awarded prize-winning medical students, also hollow and gold-tipped, is given to the medical student deemed most likely to be successful in his profession.

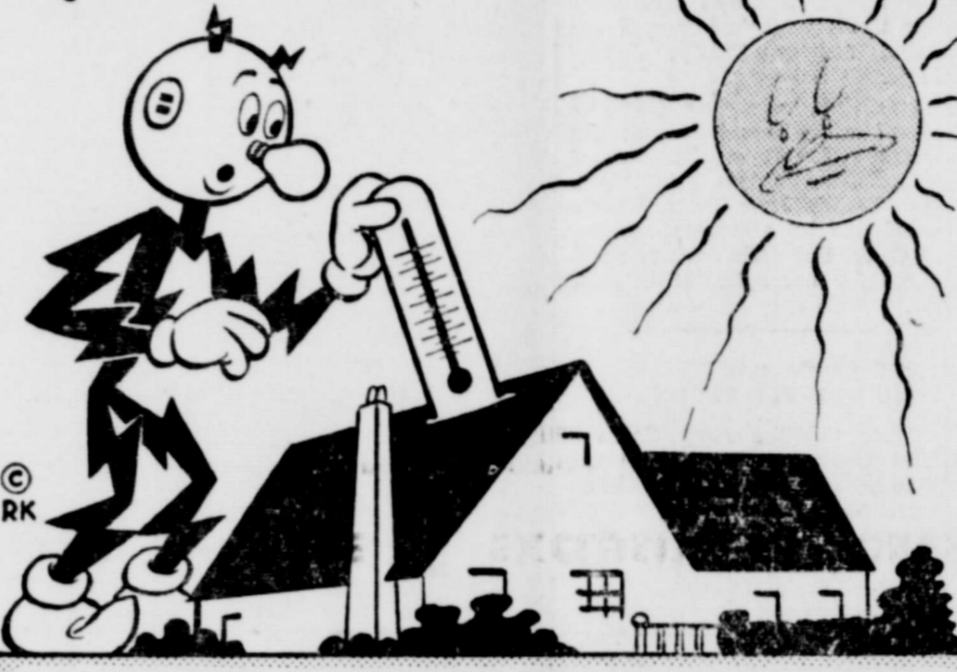

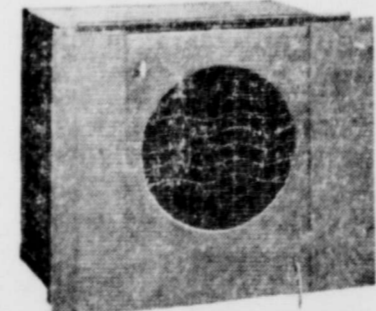

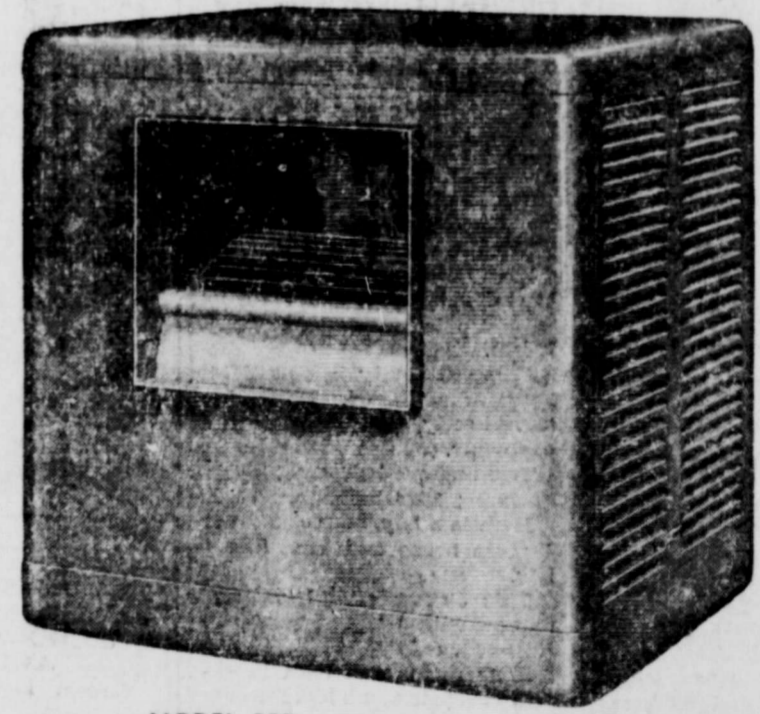
