You still hear people talking about buying something or other "when prices go back to normal."

Anyone has a perfect right to defer his purchasing in hope of a price millennium. But, judging by the evidence, he's going to have a long wait indeed.

The inflationary pressures are as strong as ever. The usual upward in any direction. The cost of the European Aid Program and the wage adjustments are taking place. The national income is still at or near its peak. The government is showing little disposition to economize preparedness program will turn more dollars loose, and lead to more competition for scarce goods. ## Spray Now With Arsenate of Lead For Cedar Bag Worms Before Too Late

During the month of May arborescent, Italian Cypress and similar plants should be examined every few days for cedar bag worms. When the bag worms are young they are so small and so well covered that they are hard to see. Camouflaging is a fine art these little worms practice right along. They spin a cone shaped waterproof bag which they cover with bits of bark and leaves. As they grow larger they add to their tent-like home. They never leave it only sticking their heads outside and front feet out to crawl up and down the limb to feed on the tender tips of small branches. Eventually they seal this bag over. The cone shaped cover grows with the insect and may be three inches or longer by August. If sprayed once a week with arsenate of lead they may be killed before they destroy or seriously damage a plant. They must be sprayed before they close the end over themselves however. The formulae is three table-spoonfuls of arsenate of lead per gallon of water while they are still young. Once the bag is closed no spray or insecticide can get to the worm. If the trees are watched closely
