**S. E. Hittson No. 3 Comes in For Good Well; No. 4 Drilling at Near 3,400 Ft.**

Oil drilling continues to keep the Cisco area more or less in the limelight as new wells continue to be brought in and old ones deepened to find products. Cisco seems to be the center of activity that closes in as more territory is proven.

The S. E. Hittson No. 3 was completed Monday by Cities Service Oil Co. for an official gauge of 424 barrels of 42 gravity oil in 24 hours from the Lake Sand section.

Drilled with cable tools to total depth of 4,060 feet, the well was plugged back and perforated with 80 shots at 3,656-70 feet. The production was on flow through 3/4 inch choke with packer on casing and 60 pounds pressure on tubing. Gas-oil ratio was 1.121.

Location of the new well, 3/4 330 feet from the north and 2,397 from the west line of section SP survey.

The Hittson No. 4 is now drilling at 3,400 feet and expects to find the Lake Sand at about

**Drilling Active In Gorman Section Of Oil Field**

Oil activity around the Gorman area continues lively. Below is a brief summary of developments in that field as given out by the Businessmen's Club of that city, composed of T. L. Jay, president; W. G. Kirk, vice president, and T. O. Shelley as officers.

W. B. Johnson No. 1 Arlen Watson set pipe last of week, cemented preparatory to acidizing Sunday or Monday. Acidized Sunday. At 1600 lbs. pressure on tubing, well gauged at 40 bbls. per hour, under a 3-4 choke.

Foster No. 2 Burns drilling at 500 feet.

Commercial Production No. 1 Mears (Erin) has a potential of 60 bbls. (This was taken from the test sheet with permission of company representative).

Commercial Production rigging up on No. 2 Mears (Erin).

E. K. Burt and E. M. Murt et al. No. 1 Bryan drilled. Trying to correct cement error. About ready to recomplete.

Snowden made location on No. 2 Westmoreland. Will rig up Tuesday.

Snowden No. 1 Albritton laying flow line. Reacidized Monday using 2000 gallons. Well responded to second treatment and is flowing 200 bbls. Shut down for the potential test.

Joe Baldwin has completed a new location on the Watson. Drilling has been started with Gilchrist in charge of drilling operations.

In Southern Eastland County, six miles southwest of Carbon, amended drilling application has been filed for the Price Crawley and Crawford No. 1 Bessie L. Shaw et al, 330 feet from the north and west lines of the Bessie L. Shaw et al 165 acre tract in Erath County School Lands. A wildcat location, it is on permit for 2,600 feet with cable tools.

A second deeper pay for the old Callahan County shallow production area eight miles north of Putnam appeared assured yesterday after a successful drillstem test in the Caddo on the Fox Harvey Oil Co. No. 1 Caddo George Anthony, 2,320 feet from the north and 2,050 feet from the west line of section 2 DDA survey.

On the test, from the top section of the Caddo at 3,295-3,340 feet, the well had gas to surface in 15 minutes and had filled about 3,300 feet with clean oil and 150 feet of oil cut mud at the end of three hours. No water was reported for the test. The drillpipe unloaded as it was being pulled from the hole and flowed itself almost dry.

Following the test, drilling was resumed to the second break in the Caddo, at 3,413 feet, and operators were coring that section yesterday afternoon. Current pans are to set casing on the lower section if it shows no water, and to complete in the upper zone if water develops in the lower section.

The well is a twin to the Tex Harvey Oil Co. No. 1 George Anthony, which had a show in the Caddo, drilled to the Ellenberger, failed in that formation, and plugged back for completion in the Mississippi.

**Biology Class Visits Fish Hatchery**

In private cars furnished by class members and instructors, 60 biology students and chauffeurs spent two class periods at the fish hatchery last Thursday—not eating fish—but watching the fish eat.

All students wrote a resume of the trip. Gleanings from some of their write-ups are as follows: Wanda Pharr's biggest surprise was the aquatic earthworm of which she wrote: "Mr. Baum, the hatchery superintendent, was waiting for us at a little ditch which had a shallow stream, an algae and some barnyard manure in it. On closer observation we saw that it was filled with a culture of tiny aquatic earthworms which he was growing. He told us that these worms differ little from the regular angle worm; that they reproduced by fission and can regenerate any part of the body that the fish bite off.

Project No. 2, includes the construction of pump house and two 1,000-G.P.M. pumps with automatic controls to act as boosters to maintain constant pressure on the distributing lines. The Chlorinator will also be located at the booster stations at the reservoir location.

Project No. 3 is the replacing of 1,200 feet of 8-inch lines with 10-inch lines to increase pressure. Project No. 4 calls for the extension of 10-inch lines on D ave., south to 14th street to accelerate water flow to east an west lines.

This work should be completed within the 60-day allowance for the contract, and in that case will be ready for use by the middle of July, time of need for greatest water pressure, it was stated.

At the peak of water demands last summer, the present water system was unable at certain times to maintain sufficient pressure to accommodate demands, and certain parts of the city suffered inconvenience when water was needed, not withstanding there was plenty of water in the lake.

## A Republic Not a Democracy.

No word in the English language has been dealt with more carelessly or interpreted more loosely than the word democracy.

The fact is we do not have a democracy in America. We never have had. Ours is a republic, as set forth by the Constitution of the United States. The two forms of government are not consistent with each other. They are not compatible. In a democracy the people govern themselves without representatives. In a republic they are governed by elected representatives, as we, in America, have been ever since 1776.

Democracy is defined by the Standard Dictionary as "the political system in which government is directly exercised or controlled by the people collectively; government by the people." The same authority defines a republic as "a state where the sovereign resides in the people and the administration is lodged in officers elected by and representing the people."

It is interesting to note that the word democracy does not appear in the Declaration of Independence or the Constitution of the United States.

It is difficult to visualize a government under a pure democracy. It is not clear that there are any governments extant of this nature, where the people rule directly and without representation. It would be interesting to learn if there is any sovereignty which actually employs such rule. It would be even more interesting to know how, in detail, it is operated.

Down to the time of Woodrow Wilson, the United States was seldom described as anything but a republic. The word democracy occurs rarely in state papers. Nearly always the country is "the republic." Thomas Jefferson was the founder of the Democratic Party; but, in his first inaugural address, though he refers several times to the republic or the republican form of government, yet he does not once use the word democracy or any derivative of it.

The pledge long used in our schools is a pledge of loyalty "to the flag, and to the republic for which it stands."

Julia Ward Howe did not write the "Battle Hymn of the Democracy."

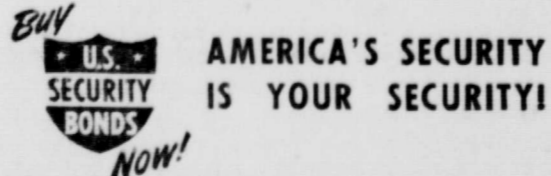

Grath pointed out that more than 2,200 businesses have disappeared since 1940 as the result of acquisitions and mergers.

**Small Firms Gobbled Up**  
Most of these, he said, were small businesses which have been gobbled up by their larger competitors since the end of the war. The Democratic Party, McGrath declared, is doing its best to arrest this dangerous trend but is blocked at every point by the Republican Congress. He cited the efforts of Democratic legislators to plug the loophole in the Clayton Act which permits firms,

which are legally barred from buying the stock of other companies, to buy up their assets, thus accomplishing the same result in the end.

But the bill to ban this practice, he said, is languishing in committee, bottled up by the Republican majority.

Now the Republicans have gone one step further, the Senator said, by Congressional action ending the Office of Small Business in the Department of Commerce, despite the fact that small business represents 95 per cent

### Gallup Poll Shows Stassen Leading Truman in South

The figures in the poll by Dr. George Gallup, announced this

of all business enterprises in the United States.

week, showing that Harold E. Stassen now leads President Truman by a big margin in the preferences of voters throughout the nation, have set political observers here to speculating this week on what effect the poll might have on local voters.

With voters in all major regions of the country swinging towards Stassen, according to this latest poll, most observers were inclined to think the announcement of the poll results would help to increase sentiment for Stassen in this state and in the country generally. How much of an impetus it might give was the question.

The new Gallup poll, announced Sunday, stated that Stassen had 56 per cent of the votes of persons interviewed, while only 33 per cent expressed a preference for President Truman and that, most surprising of all, Stassen now is leading President Truman even in the South, with 42 per cent to Truman's 41 per cent. In thirteen years of political polling by his organization, Gallup said, nothing like this has ever been found. Only once since the Civil War, he said, has a Republican candidate made such headway in the South. This was in 1928.

Stassen's percentage in the poll, running against Truman, has jumped from 41 per cent to 56 per cent since February, the report showed. He was first choice in the poll in every region of the

country. Stassen's position in the Gallup poll has been rising rapidly, stimulated by his successes in the Wisconsin and Nebraska primaries. A Gallup poll among Republican voters, issued April 24th, showed that his standing had doubled in a month, while that of Governor Dewey and other major opponents had declined.

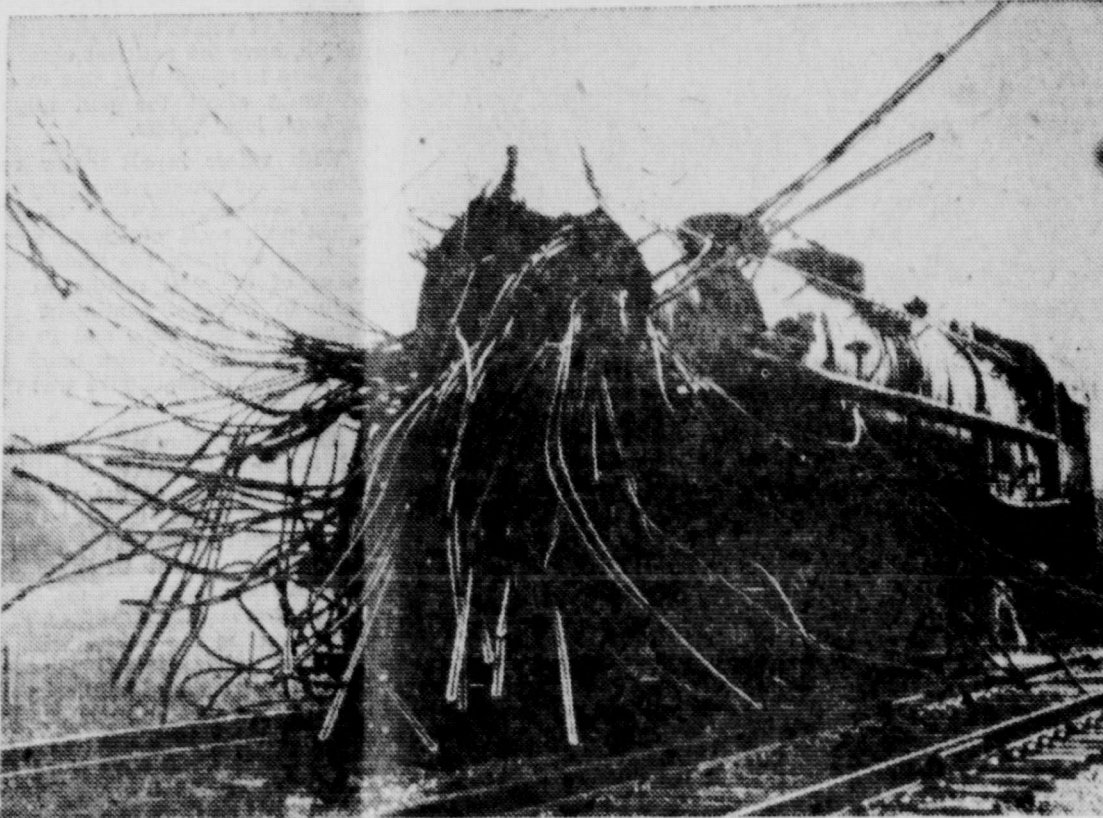
