A COMMUNITY CENTER.

Tuesday, May 25, is an important day for every citizen of Cisco. It is the day on which civic leaders will take to the rield with determination to raise \$15,000 to finance a new Community Center building in its entirity.

The term "community center" is used advisedly, for the building will serve a multitude of purposes. It will provide our nigh school and college with a gymnasium that has been needed for many years. It will serve the community as a city auditorium, adequate in every respect for large-scale gatherings. In addition, it will be the center of virtually all indoor athletics and meetings the year around.

Cisco is fortunate indeed to be able to obtain this structure for the sum of \$15,000. A building 88 feet by 124 feet would cost in excess of \$50,000 through normal channels. Alert school leaders purchased the structure from the War Assets Administration, and the \$15,000 will move it to Cisco, pay for its erection and add anything needed to make it at-
