Cisco, Eastland Getting More And Deeper Wells

Plans for four new Eastland county tests to the Ellenburger or shallower production were filed with the Railroad Commission late this week.

Two miles north of Cisco, Lone Star Producing Company is to drill the No. 1 Charles J. Kleiner A 330 feet from the south and 1,550 from the west line of the north part of section 81 block 4 H&TC survey. Permit is for 4,250 feet with rotary.

In the same general area Hickock Producing and Development Company is to deepen to the Ellenburger on the No. 3 Wright & Harrell, an old producer 1,170 feet from the north and 467 from the west line of tract 16 J. B. Hoxie survey.

Ten miles northwest of Cisco, Lone Star Producing Company is to drill the No. 1-R G. P. Mitcham, try for deeper pays in an old production area, 1,925 feet from the south and 1,760 from the west line of section 386 SP survey. It is on permit for 4,200 feet with rotary.

Four miles southwest of Eastland, A. L. Andree of Wichita Falls is to drill a 3,280 foot rotary test, the No. 1 Johnny Aaron, wildcat 990 feet from the north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 4 block 3 H&TC survey.

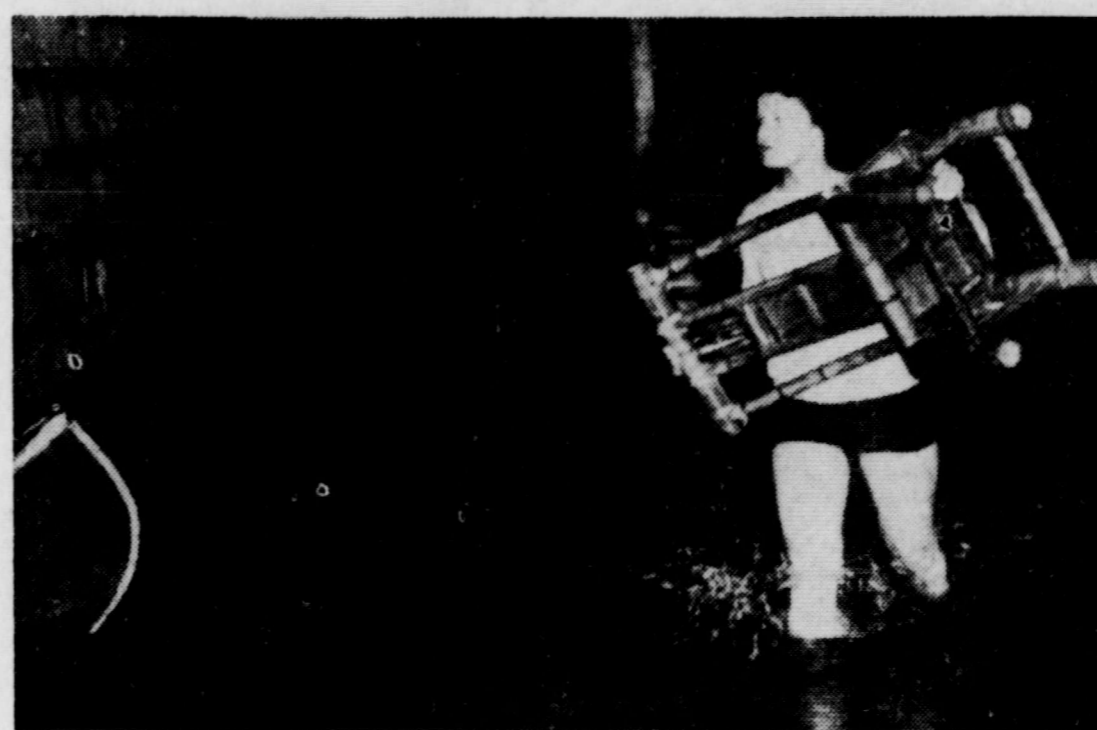

Burette W. Patterson, of Eastland and formerly of Cisco, enters race for Judge of the 91st district court of Eastland county. His statement follows:

To the People of Eastland County: "In 1944 there existed two judicial districts in Eastland county, the 88th and the 91st. By your favor I served as judge of the 88th court for twelve years, and in 1944 you elected me to serve another term of four years beginning January 1, 1945 and ending December 31, 1948. The 88th court having been abolished by the legislature in 1945, my services as judge of that court ended September 3 of that year.

The court records show that while judge of the 88th court more than 900 civil cases besides criminal, juvenile delinquency and tax cases in that court were disposed of by trial or dismissal; that during the last years of my service, by assignment I presided as judge in other judicial districts of the state, at Abilene, Anson, Haskell, Aspermeide, Palo Pinto, Stephenville, Brownwood, Coleman, Angleton, Athens, Henderson, Longview, Tyler, McKinney, Dallas and Fort Worth, at least a fifth of which

WAR AMMUNITION FOUND UNDER RAILROAD LINE

MILAN, Italy (UP)—Milan railroad officials learned with amazement that for four years a pile of ammunition had been buried under the Milan-Turin main line, 12 miles east of Milan.

The area was cordoned off by police and army forces began to remove munitions which fleeing Germans had dumped into a bomb crater, over which railroad tracks were laid later to repair bomb damage to the line.

Investigation disclosed that the hidden cache, over which an estimated 12,000 trains have run since the war's end, held enough explosives to "blow up Milan's central station."

Health Officer Issues Warning Against Typhoid

AUSTIN, Texas, June 1. — A warning against the hitch-hiking germ of typhoid fever has just been issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "They must catch a ride from an infected person to the well person; this is generally accomplished by water, milk, flies, fingers, or food. Every case is contracted by way of the mouth and digestive system, the bulletin says.

"A carrier is a person who has had typhoid fever at some time and who even after recovery carries the germs of the disease in the urine and discharge of the bowels. Carriers who are careless in their personal habits are likely to infect any food they handle with unwashed hands. Some of the most serious and far-reaching outbreaks of drinking milk or eating foods that the disease have been caused by have been handled by carriers. Per-

sons may be carriers without knowing it.

"Typhoid fever is unnecessary and preventable. Every case is due either to community negligence or to the ignorance or carelessness of some individual. Persons planning a vacation or trip where sanitation may not be rigidly enforced should protect themselves against this disease by being vaccinated. Inoculation with typhoid vaccine, a week apart, is all that is necessary to secure protection against this disease for two years. The purity of water, milk, or food cannot be judged by looking at it so the best thing to do is to play safe and have your physician protect you."

Tips To Livestock Growers On How To Avoid Losses

AUSTIN, June 1. (Spl.) — Livestock raisers today were given ten tips on how to prevent losses and speed up gains of cattle during the pasture season this summer. The American Foundation for Animal Health issued the following checklist of summer safeguards for cattle:

- "(1) Don't let the animals gorge themselves on lush, young pas-
- "(2) Inspect the herd once a week for evidence of pink-eye.
- "(3) In blackleg areas, have all calves vaccinated against this disease.
- "(4) Protect the herd against flies by spraying with DDT at least four times during the summer.
- "(5) Examine pastures periodically for the presence of poisonous plants.
- "(6) Check the herd regularly for accidental wounds through which screw worms may enter.
- "(7) If suspected cases of lumpy jaw develop, get those animals off

tures. Guard against bloat and grass tetany by making a gradual change to green feed.

"(8) When calves are unthrifty, suspect the presence of parasites. The parasite danger is especially great on old pastures and community pastures.

"(9) If cattle share pastures with stock from other farms, have them immunized against tetanus, blackleg and malignant edema.

"(10) Bovine tuberculosis is still a problem, and cattle should be tested periodically for tuberculosis as well as brucellosis."

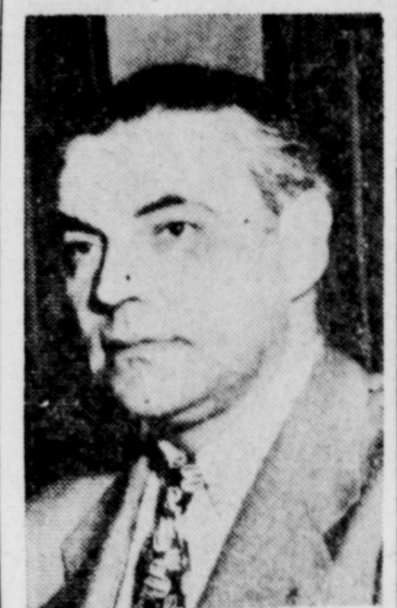

A "PEACE PLATE" FOR TODAY

Save Wheat! Save Meat! Save the Peace!

Put pork shoulder on your list of more economical buys of pork, advise government home economists. A small family can make a four-and-a-half to five pound fresh picnic shoulder do for three meals by using "extended" meat dishes.

The retail price of fresh picnic shoulder may be ten cents a pound lower than that of a pork loin roast. With meat prices at present levels, savings like this are important to every family with an economy food budget.

You might make your first meal of picnic shoulder a pot roast, like today's Peace Plate recipe, which combines the pork with sweet potatoes. There'll be meat enough left for two dinners if you extend the meat flavor in such dishes as chop suey, a curry dish, or perhaps a pork pie.

ROAST PORK SHOULDER

4 to 5 lb. pork shoulder Salt and pepper 4 medium sweet potatoes Season pork, place on rack in roaster and roast slowly, fat side up, about 45 minutes per pound, in a very moderate oven (325° F.). Allow about 4 hours or 5 pounds for it is important that pork be cooked until thoroughly done. About 15 minutes before the meat is cooked, add sweet potatoes which have been boiled in their skins and then seled. Brown with the meat. Serves with enough left for a second main dish.

MENU SUGGESTIONS: For a second vegetable, serve fresh or frozen spinach, garnished with egg yolk. With the pork, nothing is better than apple sauce topped with cinnamon. A quickly-repared dessert might be bananas, sprinkled with lemon juice, spread with tart jelly and rolled in chopped peanuts.

FOOD TIPS: This is the season of the year when your market may offer bargains in frozen vegetables. Many frozen vegetables are being sold at reduced prices right now because growers and wholesalers want to cut down supplies on hand to make way for the new season's crop. So watch your local market ads for news of bargains.

Naturally you're concerned about the quality of the frozen product. And what determines the quality? The same factors which influence the quality of fresh and canned vegetables—flavor, color, tenderness, uniformity of size and absence of defects. When a frozen package is marked Grade A or fancy, you can expect the best of these characteristics. Other grades which you may choose are Grade B, extra standard or choice, and Grade C, standard. Vegetables of these two latter grades are generally more mature than those of Grade A. But there is no difference in the sanitary conditions under which they are packed.

Not all frozen products have the letters "US" before the statement of grade. But you will find these letters when they are processed under continuous factory inspection of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Even without government inspection, the product may carry a Grade letter such as A, if it meets the government's quality standards for its particular grade.

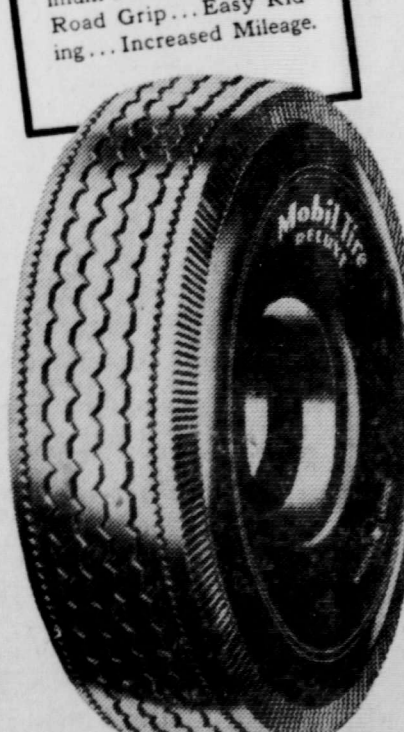
