Texas residents have an opportunity to help improve the quality of education in the state through input to determine what skills and knowledge young people need to succeed in the real world.

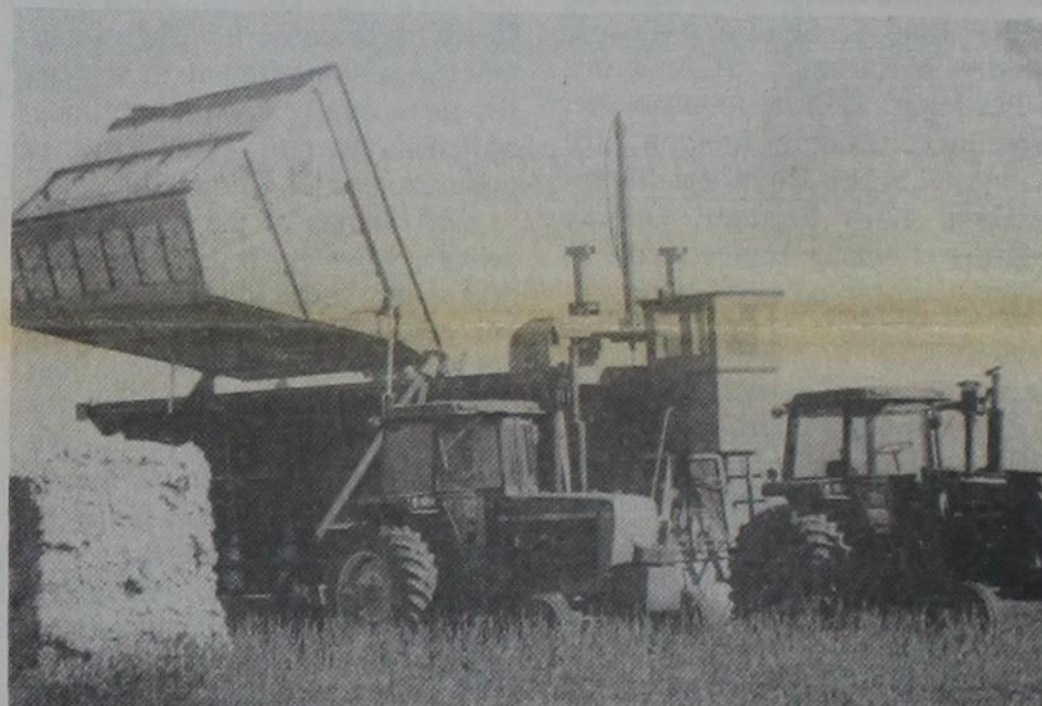

Make Plans In Advance For Your Holiday Meals

When the year came that all three of my parents' children were married, our family began a new holiday tradition. Since we all have in-laws to consider, we alternate the big family get-together with Thanksgiving and Christmas.

For example, this year, we'll all gather in Abilene at my parents' home for Thanksgiving. We'll spend Christmas with our spouses' families. Next year, we'll have Thanksgiving dinner with our in-laws and Christmas in Abilene.

So far, the system my mother designed to keep everyone as happy as possible has done just that. The added bonus (which I'm sure she considered from the beginning) is that she is ensured that at least on one holiday a year, the whole clan will be in one place.

I haven't asked yet, but I'm sure this year's Thanksgiving dinner will include a large turkey, dressing, giblet gravy, yeast rolls, cranberry sauce, sweet potatoes, salad, green bean casserole, pecan pie, fruit salad and iced tea. I'm sure I've left out a few things, but Mama won't. She knows the turkey dinner plan by heart.

But, so that no one forgets anything, there's a little, yellowed-with-time piece of paper listing all of the dishes necessary for a successful Thanksgiving dinner.

I've found such lists a requirement for big, lavish dinners--

especially at holiday times when those cooking frequently are called out of the kitchen to greet those just arriving. In fact, to make sure I don't leave anything out when I'm planning a complicated meal, I like to have a schedule that starts several weeks earlier.

Here's such a schedule for your Thanksgiving meal. I've written the schedule for a traditional turkey dinner, but you can adapt it to your particular meal.

THANKSGIVING MEAL SCHEDULE

Two to three weeks before Thanksgiving:

- *Plan menu.
- *Bake cookies and any other snacks or desserts that can be pre-baked and frozen.
- *Save leftover bread or biscuits in a large freezer bag in the freezer to be used in dressing/stuffing.

*Buy frozen turkey (if you're buying a fresh turkey, wait until a day or two before Thanksgiving).

*Start stocking up on non-perishable items--canned goods, spices, etc.

*Plan decorations, seating arrangements and confirm who's coming for dinner.

Three to seven days before Thanksgiving:

*Continue baking and freezing food that can be successfully frozen.

One to two days before Thanksgiving:

- *Buy perishable foods.

*Prepare anything that can be prepared ahead of time. For example, chop vegetables, make bread crumbs, make dishes that can be refrigerated for one to two days.

*Set table.

Thanksgiving Day:

- *Make dressing/stuffing.
- *Roast turkey. Schedule turkey to be done about an hour before dinner will be served.
- *Thaw out frozen items.
- *Prepare everything that has been pre-prepared.
- *Heat up any dishes that have been prepared in advance that need to be served hot.
- *Serve a great meal and enjoy yourself
- *Recruit others to wash the dishes.

If you need help with your holiday meal planning or preparation, call one of the following cooking hotlines:

Butterball Turkey Talk-Line: 1-800-323-4848; or, for the hearing impaired, 1-800-TDD-3848. The toll-free line offers bilingual help to callers who have questions about cooking turkey. The help-line's home economists will answer questions from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday, through November 24. On November 20 and November 21, the help-line will be answered from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., and on Thanksgiving Day, the phones will be answered from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. After Thanksgiving, the Talk-line will remain open and will be answered from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. from November 26 through December 23, Monday through Friday.

Reynolds Turkey Information Line: 1-800-745-4000. Callers can listen to one of three recorded messages on defrosting and roasting turkey on the 24-hour hotline through November 30. Callers may also leave their name and address to receive a free Turkey Made Easy recipe brochure.

Land O'Lakes Holiday Bakeline: Experts will answer baking questions from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. through December 24.

USDA Meat and Poultry Hotline: 1-800-535-4555. Callers can get their questions about meat and poultry answered from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, through November 30 and on November 20 and November 21. On Thanksgiving Day, the hotline will be open from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

For a non-traditional Thanksgiving dinner, try the following recipe from "The Turkey Cookbook."

TEXAS TURKEY WITH CHILI-ONION RUB

1 hen turkey (10 pounds), neck, giblets and excess fat removed

on the top and bottom shelves of the oven, basting often with the pan drippings, for 2 hours and 15 minutes to 2 hours and 45 minutes, allowing about 15 minutes per pound, until the thigh registers 180 degrees on a meat thermometer. Switch the positions of the baking sheets halfway through the baking period. About 45 minutes before the end of the roasting time, remove the foil to allow the skin to brown. Remove the turkey to a carving board. Loosely cover with aluminum foil and let stand 10 to 15 minutes before carving. Makes 8 to 12 servings.

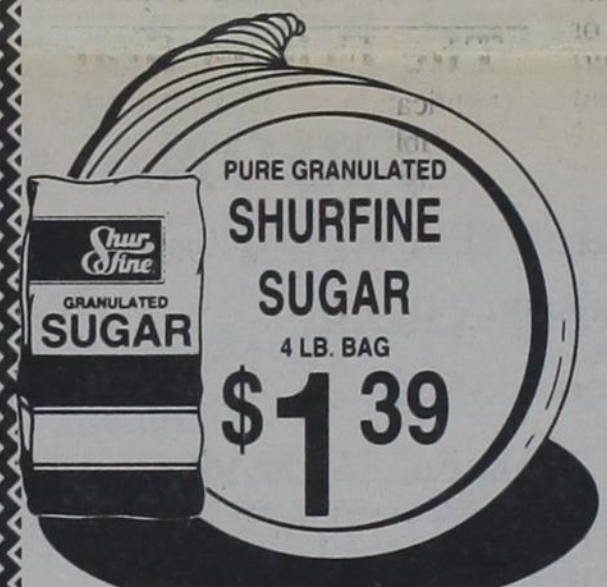

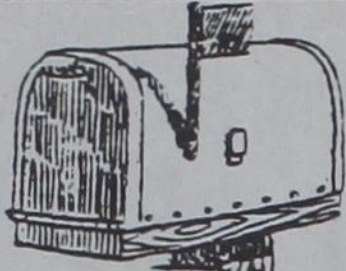

Joe Black, Sr., of Bovina, expressed the feelings of many local residents this week in a letter that he wrote to Senator Phil Gramm, with a copy to Coyt Webb, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

Black's letter was co-signed by 23 other Bovina residents:

Dear Mr. Gramm:

I'm very upset with our Big Business Corporations. They never stop to think of the small communities that they hurt when they get ready to do something.

The one I'm pointing my finger at right now is Southwestern Public Service Co. A lady in Friona retired from their service. Instead of replacing her with another person, they are closing the office in Friona and the branch in Bovina, and moving them to Hereford.

That will cost the people more to contact them, and also to pay our light bills.

It was bad enough when the railroads took out our train depots and the government changed our mail system around, and kept on adding to the price of postage. It takes us three or four days to get mail from Muleshoe or Clovis, when it used to take one day, before they started up these collection points like Amarillo, Lubbock and Albuquerque.

Of course, this doesn't bother the ones that don't have these kinds of inconveniences.

Dear Friend of Girl Scouting,

Contrary to what you may have heard or read, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. (GSUSA) voted to keep the word "God" in the Girl Scout Promise and allow individual members to substitute wording appropriate to their own spiritual beliefs for the word "God" if they choose to do so.

While the belief in a spiritual principle is fundamental to Girl Scouting, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. recognizes that some religious groups, such as Buddhists and Hindus, as well as cultural groups such as American Indians, believe in a motivating spiritual force, but use words other than "God" to express that spiritual force. The vote allows individuals to substitute a word or words for the word "God" in the Girl Scout Promise if they so choose. Delegates agreed to allow this flexibility because it will facilitate GSUSA's commitment to serving the increasingly diverse religious, cultural, racial, and ethnic population of the United States.

Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. is a private, voluntary organization and makes no attempt to define or interpret the word "God" in the Girl Scout Promise. We believe that each member must establish for herself the nature of her belief. We also recognize that religious instruction is the responsibility of parents and religious leaders.

Girl Scouting is still the leading value-based organization for girls in this country. This has not changed because we allow our membership to express "God" in their own words.

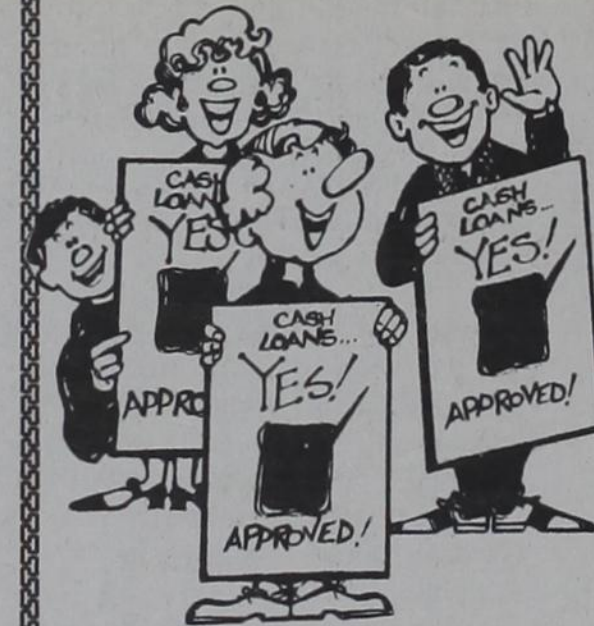

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Make Plans In Advance For Your Holiday Meals

By CARLA MCKEOWN

When the year came that all three of my parents' children were married, our family began a new holiday tradition. Since we all have in-laws to consider, we alternate the big family get-together with Thanksgiving and Christmas.

For example, this year, we'll all gather in Abilene at my parents' home for Thanksgiving. We'll spend Christmas with our spouses' families. Next year, we'll have Thanksgiving dinner with our in-laws and Christmas in Abilene.

So far, the system my mother designed to keep everyone as happy as possible has done just that. The added bonus (which I'm sure she considered from the beginning) is that she is ensured that at least on one holiday a year, the whole clan will be in one place.

I haven't asked yet, but I'm sure this year's Thanksgiving dinner will include a large turkey, dressing, giblet gravy, yeast rolls, cranberry sauce, sweet potatoes, salad, green bean casserole, pecan pie, fruit salad and iced tea. I'm sure I've left out a few things, but Mama won't. She knows the turkey dinner plan by heart.

But, so that no one forgets anything, there's a little, yellowed-with-time piece of paper listing all of the dishes necessary for a successful Thanksgiving dinner.

I've found such lists a requirement for big, lavish dinners--

especially at holiday times when those cooking frequently are called out of the kitchen to greet those just arriving. In fact, to make sure I don't leave anything out when I'm planning a complicated meal, I like to have a schedule that starts several weeks earlier.

Here's such a schedule for your Thanksgiving meal. I've written the schedule for a traditional turkey dinner, but you can adapt it to your particular meal.

THANKSGIVING MEAL SCHEDULE

Two to three weeks before Thanksgiving:

- *Plan menu.
- *Bake cookies and any other snacks or desserts that can be pre-baked and frozen.

- *Save leftover bread or biscuits in a large freezer bag in the freezer to be used in dressing/stuffing.

- *Buy frozen turkey (if you're buying a fresh turkey, wait until a day or two before Thanksgiving).

- *Start stocking up on non-perishable items--canned goods, spices, etc.

- *Plan decorations, seating arrangements and confirm who's coming for dinner.

Three to seven days before Thanksgiving:

- *Continue baking and freezing food that can be successfully frozen.

One to two days before Thanksgiving:

- *Buy perishable foods.

- *Prepare anything that can be prepared ahead of time. For example, chop vegetables, make bread crumbs, make dishes that can be refrigerated for one to two days.
- *Set table.

Thanksgiving Day:

- *Make dressing/stuffing.
- *Roast turkey. Schedule turkey to be done about an hour before dinner will be served.
- *Thaw out frozen items.
- *Prepare everything that has been pre-prepared.
- *Heat up any dishes that have been prepared in advance that need to be served hot.
- *Serve a great meal and enjoy yourself
- *Recruit others to wash the dishes.

If you need help with your holiday meal planning or preparation, call one of the following cooking hotlines:

Butterball Turkey Talk-Line: 1-800-323-4848; or, for the hearing impaired, 1-800-TDD-3848. The toll-free line offers bilingual help to callers who have questions about cooking turkey. The help-line's home economists will answer questions from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday, through November 24. On November 20 and November 21, the help-line will be answered from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., and on Thanksgiving Day, the phones will be answered from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. After Thanksgiving, the Talk-line will remain open and will be answered from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. from November 26 through December 23, Monday through Friday.

Reynolds Turkey Information Line: 1-800-745-4000. Callers can listen to one of three recorded messages on defrosting and roasting turkey on the 24-hour hotline through November 30. Callers may also leave their name and address to receive a free Turkey Made Easy recipe brochure.

Land O'Lakes Holiday Bakeline: Experts will answer baking questions from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. through December 24.

USDA Meat and Poultry Hotline: 1-800-535-4555. Callers can get their questions about meat and poultry answered from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday, through November 30 and on November 20 and November 21. On Thanksgiving Day, the hotline will be open from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

For a non-traditional Thanksgiving dinner, try the following recipe from "The Turkey Cookbook."

TEXAS TURKEY WITH CHILI-ONION RUB

1 hen turkey (10 pounds), neck, giblets and excess fat removed
 2 garlic cloves, crushed
 1 jalapeno, quartered and seeded
 1 medium onion, quartered
 1 stick unsalted butter, softened
 2 to 3 tablespoons chili powder
 1 teaspoon salt

Rinse the turkey well, inside and out, under cold water. Pat dry with paper towels. Using a heavy cleaver or large sharp knife, cut the turkey into two halves: cut down both sides of the backbone through the ribs and discard the backbone. Open the turkey out like a book and cut down the center of the turkey through the breastbone. Place each turkey half, skin side up, on a large baking sheet. In a food processor, with the machine on, drop garlic cloves and jalapeno through the feed tube to mince. Add the onion and pulse until finely chopped. Add the butter, chili powder and salt; process until smooth. Spread the spiced butter over the turkey skin. Let the turkey stand for 1 hour at room temperature. (For fuller flavor, cover each turkey half well with plastic wrap and refrigerate overnight. Remove the turkey from the refrigerator 1 hour before roasting.) Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Loosely cover the turkey halves with aluminum foil and bake

on the top and bottom shelves of the oven, basting often with the pan drippings, for 2 hours and 15 minutes to 2 hours and 45 minutes, allowing about 15 minutes per pound, until the thigh registers 180 degrees on a meat thermometer. Switch the positions of the baking sheets halfway through the baking period. About 45 minutes before the end of the roasting time, remove the foil to allow the skin to brown. Remove the turkey to a carving board. Loosely cover with aluminum foil and let stand 10 to 15 minutes before carving. Makes 8 to 12 servings.

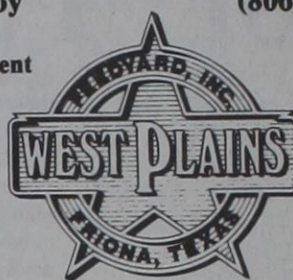

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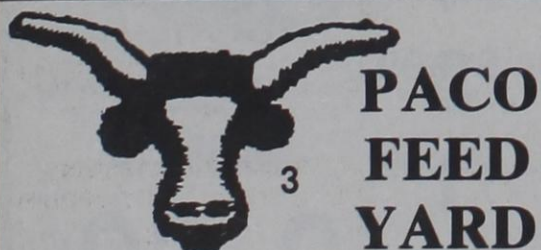
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Ruth Terry Is Buried On Tuesday

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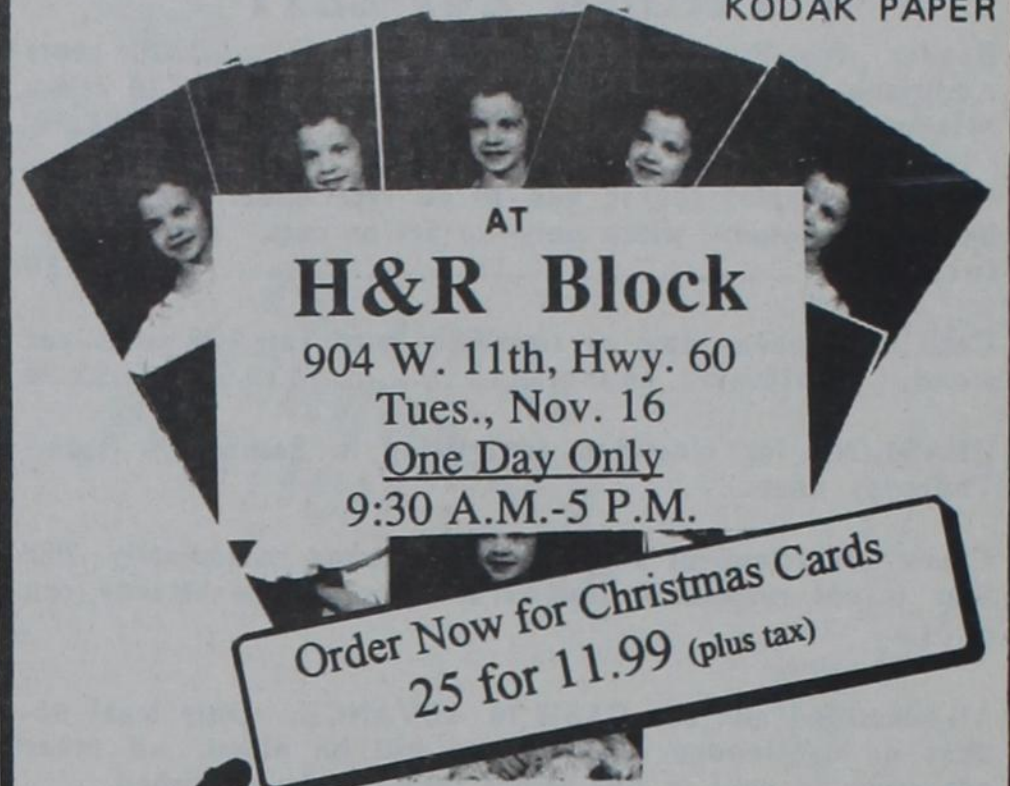
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Services Conducted For Walker

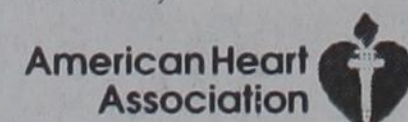

Screening Date Is Set At Hospital

On Wednesday, December 22, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital Mobile Mammography Unit will be in Friona, at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland.

Exams are done by appointment only. For information or to schedule an appointment, call 1-800-377-HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines

recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

Breast screening guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination every month; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age: age 40, one baseline mammogram; 40-49, a mammogram every 1-2 years; 50 and over, yearly mammograms.

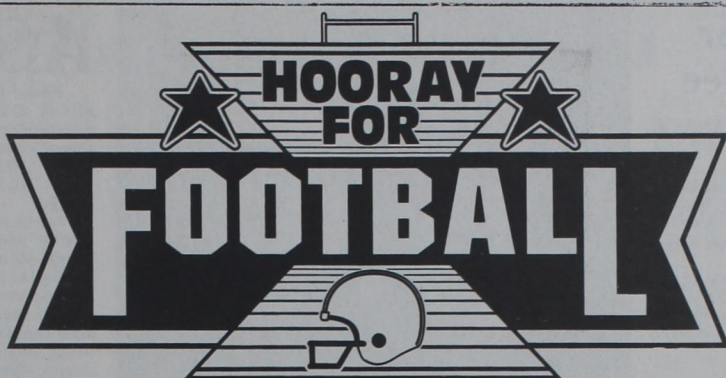

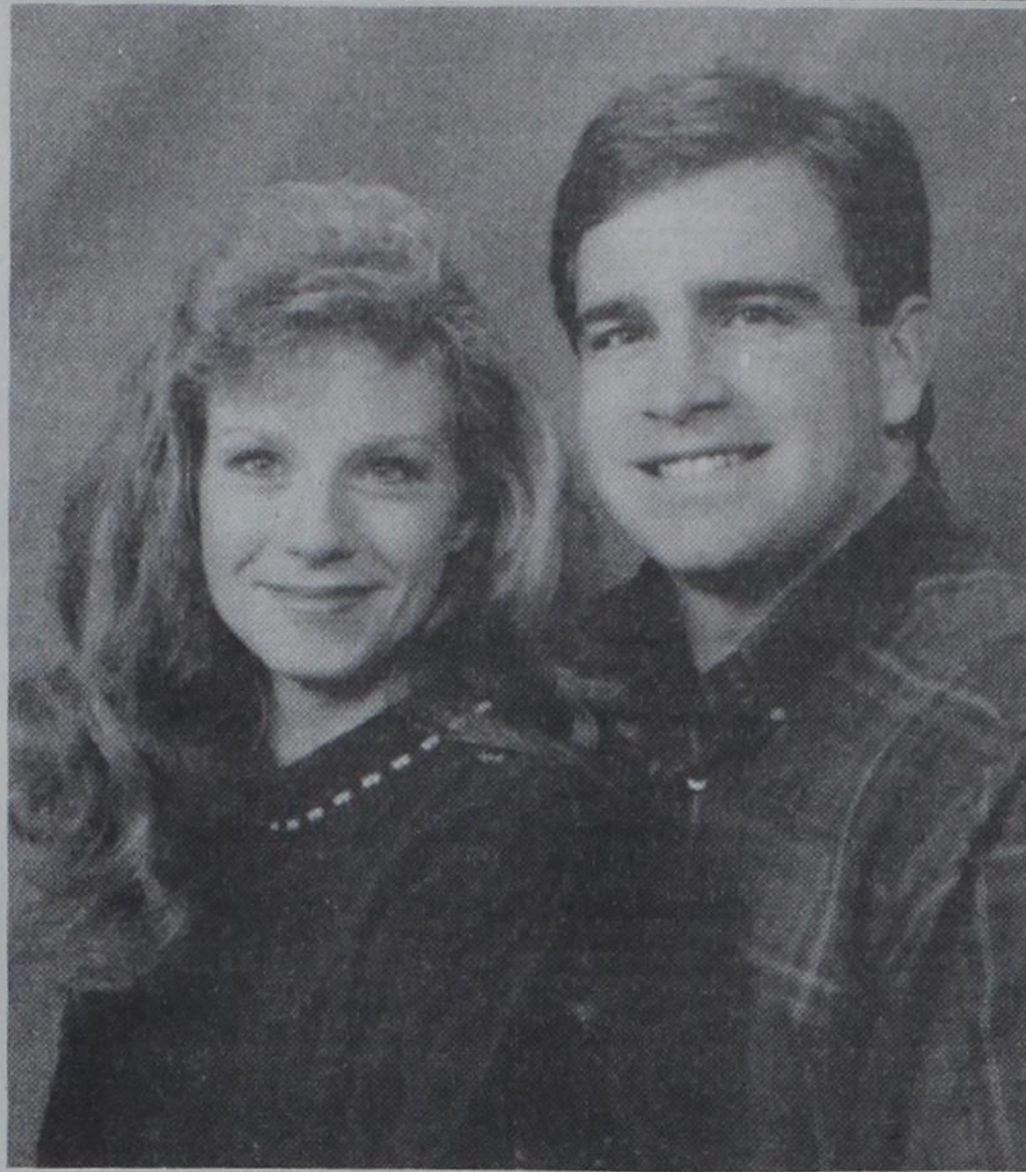

ASCS News:

Parmer County farmers were advised of a number of program details and deadlines by Curt Miller, county executive director of the ASCS, in his monthly newsletter.

Highlights of the letter included:

Applications for the 1993 disaster program will be taken through March 4, 1994. Producers are eligible for disaster assistance for crop losses suffered in 1993. Disaster assistance is available on most commercially grown crops (wheat, oats, corn, grain, sorghum, cotton, peanuts, and some vegetables) on a farm by farm basis.

To qualify for disaster payments, producers must have suffered losses greater than 35 per cent for crops covered by crop insurance, and 40 per cent for crops not covered by crop insurance. Each producer requesting disaster benefits for 1993 crop losses must agree to obtain multiple peril crop insurance for 1994, if the farms actual production for the crop was less than 35 per cent of the expected production. If multiple crop insurance is not obtained, or is cancelled, the producer will be ineligible for 1993 disaster benefits.

Producers are asked to bring all production receipts, settlement sheets and any other records that may expedite this process to the County Office when making the initial application.

FAILED ACRES:

If you have acres that have failed due to conditions beyond your control (drought, excessive moisture, hail, freeze, excessive wind, excessive heat, or combination thereof), you MUST file an Application for Disaster Credit (ASCS-574) BEFORE you destroy, plow, graze, or bale the acreage. IF YOU FAIL TO DO SO YOU MAY NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR DISASTER BENEFITS.

Producers who receive disaster benefits must purchase multiple peril crop insurance for the 1994 crop year if 1993 production is less than 35 percent of the expected production.

Producers should purchase 1994 crop insurance if there is a possibility that the 1993 loss for the commodity for which payments are being sought is greater than 65 per cent of expected production. Insurance purchased to meet the multiple peril crop insurance requirement can be cancelled if it is later determined that crop insurance is not required. Producers cannot avoid the crop insurance requirement by delaying the filing of a request for disaster benefits until after the crop insurance sales closing dates.

The ARP percentages for 1994

are as follows: Corn...5 %, Wheat...0 %, Barley...0 %, Grain Sorghum...0 %, Oats...0 %.

The "Emergency Supplemental Appropriations For Relief From the Major, Widespread Flooding in the Midwest Act of 1993" prohibits ASCS from collecting unearned deficiency payments from the disaster payment until after January 1, 1994 unless requested by the producer. Individual notification letters of exact amounts due will be sent to producers after January 1, 1994.

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Chiefs Handle Mules 35-21 In Finale

The Chiefs went into the game against Muleshoe in a tough position: a loss would give them a losing season, 4-6.

True, they were a much better team than the Mules, but they had been better than Dimmitt, too, and had lost that game. Anything could have happened Friday night, and it did.

The Chiefs downed Muleshoe, 35-21 on a cold, crisp evening.

On the opening kickoff return, Juan Gamboa ran the ball back 52 yards to the Muleshoe 46 yard line. The offense moved the ball early but could not convert on two fourth-down attempts.

Late in the first quarter, the Muleshoe quarterback broke for a big gain, but did not get into the

end zone. Friona's defense stiffened and held Muleshoe to a field goal. The Muleshoe fans went wild. The momentum was clearly in their favor.

The second quarter was like a game of "Hot Potato". Ball possession changed frequently back and forth through a series of fumbles, interceptions, and dead drives.

Friona started moving the ball after completions to Jimmy Arias and Jay Belcher. But the drive was stopped by Muleshoe. Belcher then intercepted a Mule pass to stop the Muleshoe offense. Then the Chiefs turned the ball back over to the Mules. Things were looking grim.

The turning point came at the end of the first half with less than one minute left. Muleshoe was at the goal line with just 14 seconds to

score. The Chiefs had had enough. It was time to get serious. Chris Hanna intercepted the ball and returned it 100 yards for a touchdown. The PAT failed, but the Chieftains were ahead by three points (and at least a gallon of adrenaline) going into the third quarter.

The Chiefs came out early after the half, stopping Muleshoe's offense. Hanna scored again on a 52-yard run. Jay Belcher completed a pass to Jimmy Arias for a two-point play and Friona led. Muleshoe came back with a score, but Friona answered with another Hanna 82-yard run.

Friona was on a roll, and Colby Carthel and Davy Hamilton had to put in their two cents. Carthel blocked a punt in the end zone, Hamilton fell on the ball, and the teamwork racked up another touchdown for the Chiefs.

Jay Belcher also cashed in on the scoring with a touchdown from Blair Burney from 43 yards out.

The fourth quarter proved to be a sloppy one. Muleshoe scored two more touchdowns late in the game, but by then Friona had a 35-9 lead. The Chiefs were too far ahead by that time for the Mules to catch up.

So the Chieftains ended the year on a positive note. "For the first time in six years, Friona

football has not had a losing season," said Coach James Morton. The game against Muleshoe brought the Chiefs up to a 5-5 season and a more respectable place in the district.

Next year could very well be the season these young men take Friona into the playoffs.

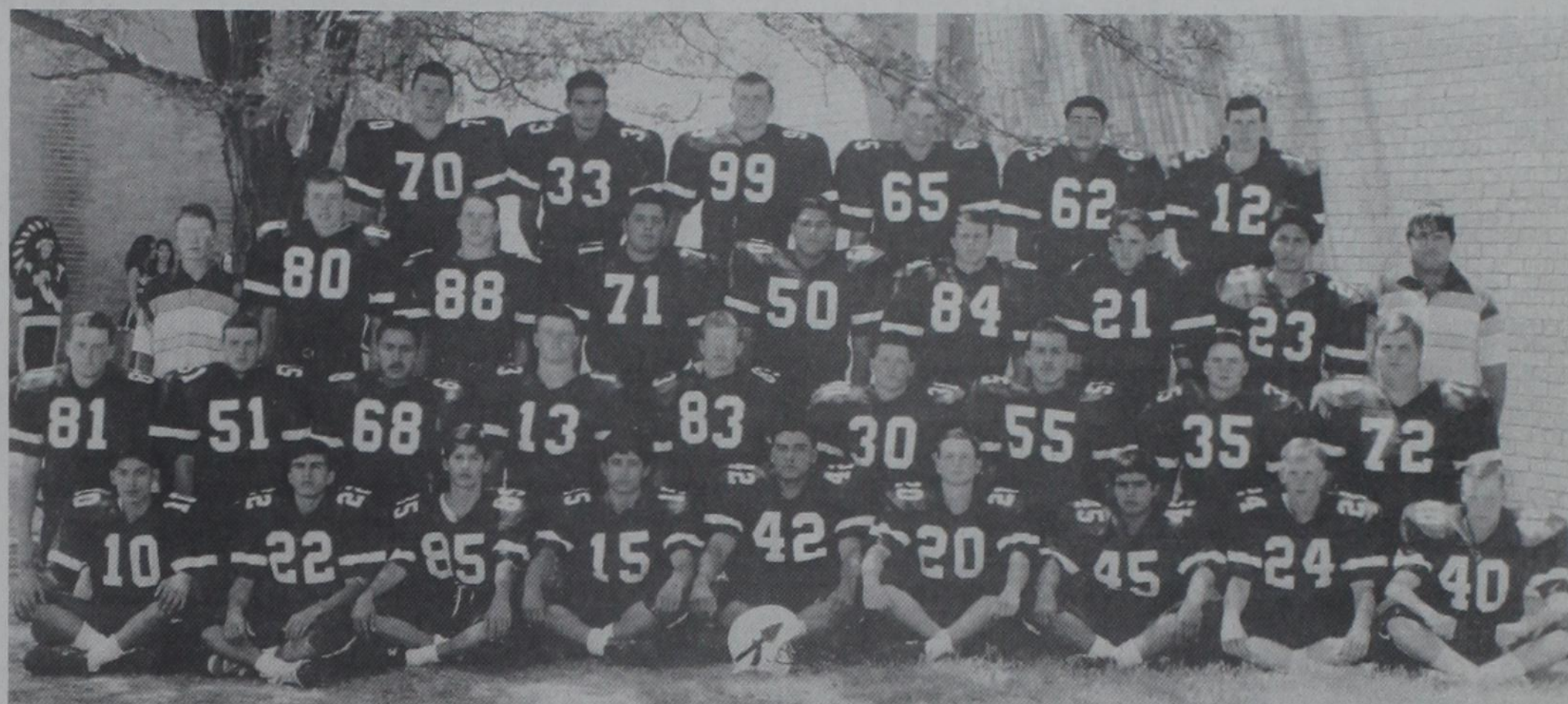

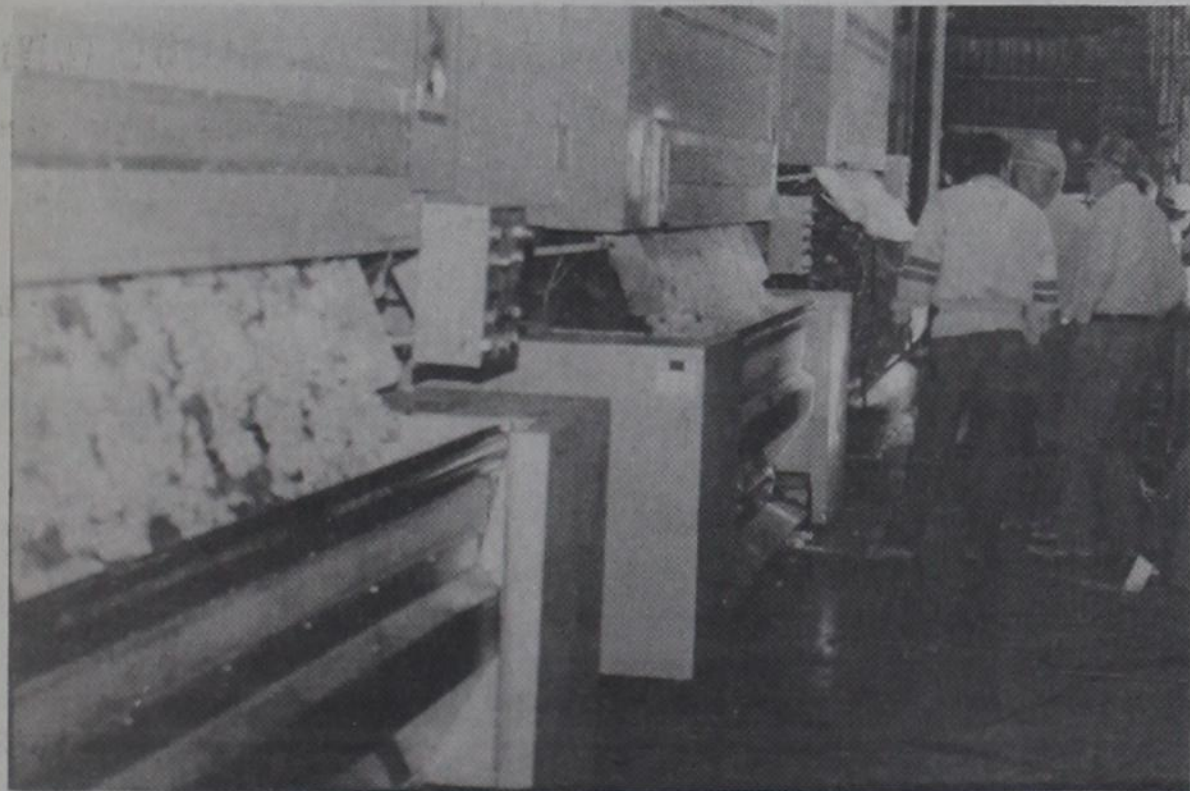

Martin Niemoller was a leader of the Christian Church in Germany prior to World War II. He narrowly escaped execution, was declared Hitler's personal prisoner, and spent seven years in a concentration camp.

What were Christians in Germany doing prior to and during World War II? Did they speak out against the government for the injustices taking place?

There were some 18,000 pastors in Germany during the 1930s. Most of them capitulated to Hitler's idea of one leader, "The Fuhrer Principal." Hitler had once said of the Christian pastors: "They will betray anything for the sake of their miserable little jobs and incomes." Most of them did. Some did not.

How easy it is for us 50 years later to look back and see who understood the times and stood for what was right. How hard to see what is taking place in our day.

Better Vision, Safer Biking

Know the Rules Before Withdrawing Retirement Funds

(Editor's note: the first of two columns on the 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule)

Last year, this column informed readers about a new tax law taking effect January 1, 1993, that could seriously affect retirement funds. The law, called the 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule, already has affected so many workers that it merits another review.

The 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule applies to lump-sum distributions from an employer's retirement plan. The most common types of employer-sponsored retirement plans include 401(k), profit sharing, employee stock ownership (ESOPs), 403(b) for teachers or employees of charitable organizations and keogh plans for self-employed individuals.

Lump-sum distributions occur more frequently than you might think. Any of the following events may result in a lump-sum distribution: retirement, job change, termination of a qualified retirement plan, disability or when you, as a beneficiary, inherit a distribution from a qualified plan of someone who has died.

The law states that if you take possession of a lump-sum distribution from one of these qualified plans, your employer must withhold 20 per cent for taxes. This withholding is required even if you roll the entire amount into another retirement plan or individual retirement account (IRA). Whatever amount is not rolled over

within 60 days is subject to be taxed as ordinary income for that calendar year. If you are under age 59-1/2, any portion of your lump-sum distribution not rolled over within 60 days is penalized an additional ten per cent. (One exception: if you are between 55 and 59-1/2, and no longer employed, the ten per cent penalty will not apply to the qualified plan distribution.)

One way to avoid the withholding is to have your employer roll the distribution directly into an IRA or other qualified plan. Your money will continue to grow tax-deferred with no immediate withholding. This option is similar to the traditional rollover, except your employer now must handle the transaction on your behalf or must give you a check payable to your IRA or qualified retirement plan trustee or custodian (e.g., "XYZ Trustee for the IRA of John Doe"). This transaction is called a "direct rollover."

Remember, the 20 Per Cent Withholding Rule applies only to lump-sum distributions from qualified retirement plans. There are no changes in the conventional rollover from one IRA to another. For example, if you have an existing IRA and decide to roll the funds into another IRA, you may still take direct distribution of the terminated IRA, make the rollover into your new IRA within 60 days, and no taxes will be withheld.

The new regulations can be confusing and costly. If you expect to receive retirement funds in the near future, consult a tax professional. An informed decision can save you thousands of dollars in taxes and penalties.
