Funeral Services For Lieut. Thomas To Be Held Sunday

Final funeral rites for 1st Lt. Kessler O. Thomas, whose body was to arrive on the Sunshine special Friday afternoon, will be held at the First Methodist Church Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Thomas Funeral Home will be in charge of the services.

Lt. Thomas, a P-51 fighter pilot, was attached with the American Eighth Air Force at the time of his death in England. He was among the first Americans to witness the Russo-German artillery duel along the River Oder, some 30 miles northeast of the German capital.

Kessler Thomas was born in Thurber, Texas, on November 10, 1917, later moving to Cisco with his family. He graduated from Cisco High School in 1936 and later attended Texas A&M College, where he was graduated in 1940.

He was married to Auralie Pittman of Scranton in March of 1940. After enlisting in the air corps and completing his basic training, he was sent to England in September of 1944, where he served until he was killed.

Lt. Kessler was awarded the Air Medal with one oak leaf cluster and the Purple Heart, posthumously.

The deceased is survived by his wife who lives in Dallas, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Thomas and one brother, Raymond Thomas of Cisco.

Dr. Claud P. Jones of the First Methodist Church will conduct the services. He will be assisted by Rev. Joseph I. Patterson of Graham and Rev. Otis Strickland of the First Baptist Church, Cisco.

The American Legion will be in charge of the services at Oakwood Cemetery, where he will be buried with full military honors.

Pallbearers are Victor Lawson and Jack Lauderdale of Cisco, Clifford Thomas of College Station, Baynard McMahon of Odessa, Gerald Merkert of Odessa, Dr. George Irwine of McCamey, J. W. Thomas of Midland and Joe Slicker of Fort Worth. John James Haynie of Lubbock will play taps and a coronet solo at the grave side.

Amid a cheering crowd that taxed the seating capacity was at ABC park Thursday night to see Royce L. Boyd's softball club shuffled to a 3-to-1 victory over Gorman for their tenth successive victory in home territory. An audience of more than 500 softball fans saw the tilt.

RUMORS OF POLIO IN CISCO FALSE

Little Loot Taken In Theft From Two Business Houses

Officers were investigating, today, the robbery of two business houses in the 500 block of Ave. D, which occurred Thursday night.

Entered were the OK Shoe Shop and The Alexander Cleaners. Entry to the places was made through rear windows which were damaged by the thief.

The OK Shoe Shop reported the loss of a pair of cowboy boots belonging to a customer and a new band tooled belt. The thief left a pair of old tennis shoes and a belt in the floor of the shop.

Mr. and Mrs. Alexander stated that a sport shirt and approximately 500 pennies were taken from their building which is located next door to the shoe shop. They said that the loss might include a pair of men's slacks but a careful check failed to verify the belief. The thief overlooked a ladies wrist watch which was in the cash register.

Clothing was scattered over the floor and much of it will have to be re-cleaned. Apparently the thief spent considerable time in trying on the clothing.

Employees of the Cisco Ice Co., reported that a youth, who appeared to be about 16 years of age, came into the plant several times to check the time. He was roughly dressed when he first appeared but came back later with clean clothing.

Officers believed that he was checking on the time between runs made by patrol cars and timed the robbery between runs.

Reserve Officers School Planned

FORT SAM HOUSTON, Texas, July 16. — Reserve officers in the Fourth Army Area who have not applied for attendance at the Military Intelligence-Reserve school to be held August 1-15 at Fort Sam Houston are still eligible to receive this training. General Thomas T. Handy, Fourth Army Commander, announced today.

Although primarily designed for Military Intelligence-Reserve officers, officers of other branches may attend, it was pointed out. Reserve officers taking this training will be placed on active duty for the period of the school.

Subjects to be stressed in the school will be Interrogation of Prisoners of War, Intelligence Staff Officers, Photo Interpretation, and Order of Battle. Classes will be held in Building 198, Stanley Road, at Fort Sam Houston.

Instruction in this course, the first Fourth Army-wide Military Intelligence school to be held, will be handled by qualified Reserve officers recalled to 90 days active duty for this purpose.

Fourth Army Reserve officers desiring to attend this school should contact local Organized Reserve Corps unit instructor.

Winston-Salem, N. C., will no longer enforce parking limits against veterans who lost either one or both legs during the war.

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HEALTH OFFICERS ISSUE STATEMENT AFTER CHECK-UP

Reports that Cisco has a number of polio cases were branded as false today by Dr. William P. Lea, city health officer. Rumors had spread that there were at least four cases in Cisco this week.

Dr. Lea pointed out in a formal statement that all reports and rumors had been carefully checked and that there definitely has not been a case of polio in Cisco.

Dr. Lea's statement follows: "Rumor is being spread among our residents that we have a number of polio cases in this city. As health physician for this city, I would know of such cases, as all of our local doctors are very cooperative in reporting contagious diseases.

"In checking into where these rumors originated, it was found that a representative of an insurance company, whose sales office is located in a neighboring city, was selling polio policies and stated that there were two or three cases of the disease in Cisco.

"I would like to assure the public that they will be informed if any polio cases are reported and definitely verified."

The deceased is survived by her husband, a son, Russell Brown, Jr., of Cisco and one daughter, Mrs. Mervin Strother of Houston. She is also survived by two grandchildren; three brothers, Walter Beene, Breckenridge; George Beene and J. R. Beene of Cisco, and two sisters, Mrs. Velma Hunt, Eastland, and Mrs. Ruby Davis of Dallas.

Building For Learning.

"Building for Learning," a sound motion picture in technicolor, depicting the old and the modern school rooms, will have its premiere showing July 26 at Texas A&M College. The motion picture is the first of its kind ever filmed and ready for showing. It will be available to parent-teacher associations and schools over the United States.

The film is another step forward in the "dream" of an A&M professor, William Caudill of the Architecture department. Some years ago Caudill foresaw the need for better lighted, better sound, better functional rooms and better school structures. He reasoned that a student's efficiency will be upped 50 per cent in a properly lighted room, sound proof and with the right kind of ventilation.

Build the building to suit the child became a popular expression with the architecture students and in cooperation with the Engineering Experiment Station, of which A. W. Mellor is vice-director, they did something about it. In magazines and other periodicals the word was spread. They produced the motion picture.

The project of fifth year graduating students was school design. A trip to California to study school architecture was a further step in designing buildings. Pictures were taken of schools in California. The film also shows pictures of schools at Seguin, Alice, Houston, Fort Worth, College Station and other places.

The film revolves around seven-year-old Judith Ann Bishop, winsome little red-headed daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Bishop of College Station. It shows Judith Ann as she leaves for school and in the room. Photographs of her and her classmates were taken during actual classroom sessions of Consolidated district of College Station.

Scenes in the picture represent 7,000 miles of travel. No professional actors were used. A number of fifth year architect students took part in the film. They did the art work. The narrator, Allison B. Perry, was a member of the class. The music was written in the mood of the picture and played by the composer who directed the picture, Larry Jene Fisher.

Notables from over the state have been invited to attend the premiere which will be shown in connection with the twelfth annual Texas School Administrators' conference to be held at Texas A&M College in July.

Tribute Is Paid Judge Hickman By Old Friend

FORT WORTH, July 16.—Tribute to the character and achievements of Chief Justice J. E. Hickman of the Supreme Court of Texas, who is up for re-election, was paid by his long-time friend, Boyce House, in the latter's widely-published "column" this week.

House wrote: A truly great man in a great position is J. E. Hickman, chief justice of the Supreme Court of Texas. I have known other chief justices personally but it was after they had attained that lofty place. Of Judge Hickman, however, it is my privilege to say, "I knew him when..."

met in a motion picture theater Sunday mornings and drew many oil field workers and cowboys that you would have had to rope and hog-tie to get into a church-house. So human, down-to-earth and yet inspiring were Judge Hickman's messages that the class membership reached way up into the hundreds.

When he was elected to the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals, he moved to Eastland, where the court sits. In Eastland, he taught the 9:49 Bible Class and his religious presentations were a great influence on the lives of many men.

In 1935, Judge Hickman became a member of the Commission of Appeals of the State Supreme Court and moved to Austin, and he teaches the largest Sunday School class in that city. He became a member of the Supreme Court in 1945, was elected in 1946, became chief justice last January and is up for re-election to the full term in the July primaries.

Judge Hickman was born at Liberty Hill in Williamson County in 1883, attended the University of Texas, taught public schools and was principal of Lampasas High, returned to the State University, where he received his law degree, then practiced law in Erath and Stephens counties. He is a trustee of Southern Methodist University and a member of the Masonic order.

Great in physique—six feet, three or four inches tall; great in powers of mind as lawyer and judge; and great in character—democratic and friendly and eminently fair to all—such is Chief Justice J. E. Hickman of the Supreme Court of Texas.

Reports Vast Store Of Oil in Arctic
BIRMINGHAM, Eng. (AP) — Colonel S. J. M. Auld, past president of the Institute of Petroleum, reports a great untapped source of oil around the North Pole.

He told a meeting here that the North Pole basin is one of four known oil basins in the world. The others are the Caribbean, including the United States oil fields, the Middle East and East Indies.

United States' share of world production has dropped from 73 per cent in 1923 to 60 per cent last year and is still declining. Production in the Middle East, however, has jumped from 34,000,000 tons in 1945 to at least 45,000,000 tons this year, he said.

By 1951, he said, Middle East wells should yield at least 90,000,000 tons of oil a year, nearly one-quarter of the world's requirements.

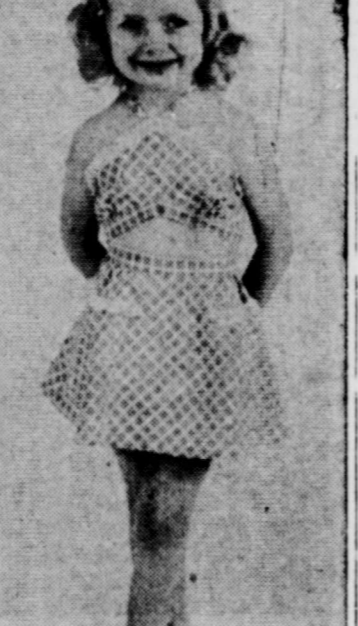
