Chas. H. Dawson Is Candidate For Floterial Post

TO VOTERS OF 107th. FLOTORIAL DISTRICT:

I wish to take this means of officially announcing my candidacy for State Representative from the 107th Floterial District comprising Callahan and Eastland counties, subject to action of the Democratic primaries.

I am a man 63 years of age born of humble parentage and educated in our public schools. During World War One I served overseas with the 59th Infantry. Following my honorable discharge from the service I became affiliated with the West Virginia State Police which position I held until coming to Texas in 1921 to enter the oil business as an independent operator.

For the past 25 years I have been interested in Callahan and Eastland counties, the last three of which have been a citizen of Cross Plains. I am a Democrat, bitterly opposed to the encroachment of Communism and as your Representative would fight uncompromisingly to destroy the threat of this menace on every occasion. It would be my aim and objective to represent you at Austin as servant and not as master. I do not seek this office as a means of personal honor or self-gain, but as an opportunity to again serve my country for which I fought.

Eldridge Issues Statement In His Race For Office

C. S. Eldridge, candidate for county judge, has issued a statement in connection with his campaign. His announcement appeared recently in The Daily Press, and his statement to the voters of the county follows:

"My father moved to Eastland county in 1905 and secured near-goman where we farmed. All the family left the county except me. I attended Hankins College and have taught school for more than thirty years. I served from 1934 until 1938 as your county superintendent. Since then I have been superintendent at Scranton and Deadmona, where I am now living. I have served you long and have done my best to serve you well. The thirty-odd years in the schools of the county speak for themselves. That service is unbroken, except for World War I in which I served overseas. I have been an active member in both the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars ever since they were organized. I served in various capacities, including Post Commander. My Church and civic leadership speak for themselves.

"My friends, I believe, that I am due a very careful and liberal consideration for the office of County Judge. I ran four years ago and have waited the required Democratic two terms to run again.

"It has been a real pleasure meeting old friends and making new ones. You people have been extremely courteous and in appreciation I have run a clean race, taking part in no campaign except my own, running on my own merits and finding no fault in no one. Since the office of county judge is one primarily of business and common sense, I am positive I can give you the clean, courteous, dignified service you pay for and expect to get. Former Cisco Boy Fatally Injured In Explosion and Fire at Amarillo

Rising Star Man Accepts Tech. Post

Judd Morrow of Rising Star, Texas Technological college graduate, has been elected a staff member in the plant industry department at Texas Technological college. President M. M. Whyburn announced.

Morrow took a BS degree from Texas Tech in 1947 from the plant industry department. He will instruct in agronomy, replacing E. L. Mader who has accepted an associate professorship at Kansas State college. Morrow has been at the college for the past year working on a master's degree and teaching part-time.

Lyndon Johnson Speaks in Cisco

In view of developments in Europe, the next six years may be the most crucial period in the entire history of mankind, Congressman Lyndon Johnson told residents of the Cisco area in a speech here Saturday afternoon.

Johnson landed his helicopter in the triangle at the north end of Avenue D amid a large crowd. He spoke here for some thirty minutes and departed for Eastland. He had 14 stops on his schedule Saturday. R. W. McCauley, local tire dealer, introduced him.

"Your vote in the senatorial race next Saturday may be the most significant you will ever cast," the candidate said. "Upon you is the grave responsibility of deciding, on one day, how you would vote for six years to come."

Saying he has learned a great deal about what the people are thinking in his campaign, Johnson laid heavy emphasis on his qualifications "for the job I am applying for."

Johnson explained how a member of Congress gains stature and prestige through length of service. He said he has been in Congress 12 years, representing the 10th district.

By using a helicopter, Johnson said that he has been able to see more of Texas and Texans than any candidate ever has done before.

Dick Sikes of Amarillo was fatally burned late Friday in an explosion and accompanying fire at the Phillips Petroleum Co. warehouse in Amarillo.

Young Sikes was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Sikes who formerly lived in Cisco. He was a grandson of the late J. M. Williamson, former Cisco mayor. Sikes was born in Cisco in 1926 and lived here until moving to Amarillo with his parents.

Sikes, 22, and Jodie Foster, also of Amarillo, were attempting to repair a leak in a broken high octane gasoline line when the explosion occurred. Foster died instantly and Sikes died later in an Amarillo hospital.

Three other men: T. G. Hunter, Leroy Phillips and Dave Mitchell, all of Amarillo, were seriously injured.

He was the nephew of Mrs. John Ducker of Ranger. Mr. and Mrs. Ducker and daughter, Carolyn, left early Saturday for Amarillo. They were joined in Abilene by Mrs. J. M. Williamson, grandmother of the youth, and Mr. and Mrs. Henson Williamson of Eden.

Mr. and Mrs. Sikes were away on a vacation when their son was fatally injured and rushed to their home but were unable to reach him before his death.

George R. Gordon Rites Are Set For Sunday Here

Funeral services for George R. Gordon, who passed away suddenly Friday night at the Huey residence, 600 Avenue I, where he had lived for the past several years, will be held in the chapel of the Thomas Funeral Home at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Rev. Clifford Williams of Fort Worth will be in charge of the service. Burial will be in Oakwood cemetery.

George Gordon was born at Knickerbocker, Texas, a small community near San Angelo, on October 8, 1886. In 1919, after he had served as a Texan Ranger patrolling the Rio Grande and as a superintendent of Mexican labor in an ammunition plant in Tennessee during World War I, he moved to Cisco. The oil boom had attracted his attention and he was interested in its development. He retired from the oil and ranching business two years prior to his death.

He was married to Berta Ellis of San Angelo on July 20, 1920. She died August 28, 1942. Their only son, James Gordon was killed in action near Linnich, Germany in February, 1945. His body is to arrive in the near future for reburial.

Mr. Gordon is survived by one brother, Ruben Gordon of San Angelo and three sisters, Mrs. Herman Bayer, Melvin; Mrs. Arthur Streigler, Salt Gap; and Mrs. Robert Schmidt of Fort Worth. He is also survived by a host of nephews and nieces.

Kincaid Well Is Near Completion As Good Producer

Lone Star Producing Company was making plans Saturday to begin drilling on two new locations in Cisco's Kleiner Oil Field, and workmen were expected to complete the company's No. 4 Kincaid early this week.

In order to begin on the two new wells, Lone Star's drilling contractor was moving in a second rig. It was understood that Lone Star would keep the two rigs in operation in the Kleiner Field, along with a third rig in their Caddo pool eight miles northeast of town.

The new wells will probably be Lone Star's A-2 C. J. Kleiner and their No. 5 Kincaid.

Testing of the No. 4 Kincaid was underway Saturday afternoon. Bottom of the hole was 4,065 feet in the Ellenberger, where geologists reported indications favorable to completing a good flowing well. In addition to Ellenberger pay, topped at 4,039 feet, the No. 4 Kincaid can be completed as an excellent Mississippi lime producer, oil men said.

The No. 4 Kincaid is an offset to the field's discovery well. A drill stem test in the top of the Mississippi showed 2,570,000 cubic feet of gas. Core tests in some 300 feet of the lime showed heavy oil saturation.

Following of Saturday's tests, further tests were expected to be run Sunday. The well probably will be cemented Sunday night with completion early in the week either in the Ellenberger or Mississippi.

Nearby, the Sam Killingsworth No. 1 George P. Fee topped the Caddo lime at 3,245 feet at noon Saturday. They expected to find the Mississippi at about 3,700 ft. early in the week. It was understood that a test would be run in the Lake Sand, just under the Caddo.

Hickok Oil Co.'s No. 3 C. J. Kleiner in the same area was drilling below 3,650 feet and expected to be near the pay horizon in the early future.

The same company was completing its No. 2 Hart well, Section 66, H&C Survey, 3 miles northeast of town, as a gas well at 3,300 feet in the Lake formation.

The W. G. Skelley No. 1 Thomas in the Kleiner pool was reported to be drilling at 2,960 feet Saturday. Southeast of town, Glover Producing Co. was reported to be drilling at about 2,400 feet on the Kirkland farm.

Funeral services will be held at 4 p. m. Sunday at the Baptist Church in Sipe Springs for George Calvin Barnes who died Thursday at 7:10 p. m. Thomas Funeral Home will be in charge of the services.

Mr. Barnes, a radio man, died as a result of injuries received in a traffic accident Wednesday night. Rev. C. D. Wooten will conduct the services and burial will be in the Sipe Springs cemetery.

He is survived by his wife and his father, J. C. M. Barnes of Lubbock, and one sister, Mrs. R. C. Henderson of DeLeon.

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## Judge Hart For Your Consideration.

Of the three branches of our state government, the Judiciary is the one about which the general public is probably least enlightened. A recent state-wide poll bears out this contention. It showed that only one of every seven Texan knows the name of any of the candidates or incumbents for the Texas Supreme Court.

The judgeships in our highest state court are among the most important political positions in Texas — the positions requiring men of ability, integrity and honesty. And it would seem the people have been negligent in their duty as good citizens in not learning about the men at the helm of our court system.

However, the average citizen during his lifetime has no occasion to deal with our high state courts, and thus has no reason for becoming alarmed, or enthusiastic, as the case may be, about the men sitting on the bench of our highest state tribunal.

Moreover, the candidates for judicial offices are at a disadvantage in letting the public know about themselves. The dignity of the position they seek, or are now holding, requires that they do little more in an election than explain their qualifications. Since their job is strictly interpretation of the laws, no issues are involved. Campaign stunts are taboo. And, because they cannot conduct campaigns along the lines of most candidates, they receive little publicity.

The point is that a great many voters will go to the polls on election day with little or no knowledge of the men who are candidates for the state Supreme Court.

Fortunately, during the campaign, a great number of people in Eastland County had an opportunity to size up one of the candidates for the Texas Supreme Court, James P. Hart of Travis County, one of the junior members of the tribunal. Judge Hart made a favorable impression.

Judge Hart was appointed to the Court last October by Governor Beauford H. Jester when Judge C. S. Slatton resigned. Judge Hart carried with him to the bench more than 20 years of varied legal experience. This included 2 years as a practicing attorney, eight years of public service, including the positions of district judge and district attorney of his home district, and assistant attorney general of Texas.

Judge Hart is a Texan through-and-through. His father is a native Texan as were his grandfathers. His great-grandfather brought his family to Texas 100 years ago this summer, landing at Galveston and traveling by ox cart to Central Texas, where the Hart family has been residing ever since.

The Austin justice is known among his acquaintances as a man with sound judgement, a sense of fairness and an abiding love for justice. Judge Hart is 43 years old. He and his wife, the former Katherine Drake of Austin, are the parents of five children.

In the comparatively short time Judge Hart has served on the Supreme Court, he has already rendered Texas a distinct service and deserves to be returned to the Court for a full six-year term. The Press recommends Judge Hart to the voters of Eastland County for consideration.

prevalence of communicable diseases by counties. "In the light of our present knowledge regarding the control of diphtheria, it is unfortunate that the disease is allowed to flourish," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said.

For the week June 26 to July 3, Nueces County reported four cases; Hopkins, Tarrant and Val Verde Counties reported one each. For the year 1947, seventy-seven deaths from diphtheria were recorded.

"A life-time immunity may be established in 90 per cent of the children receiving the diphtheria toxoid," the health officer said. "If all parents of children over six months of age would have their children inoculated, the incidence rate of the disease would be rapidly reduced."

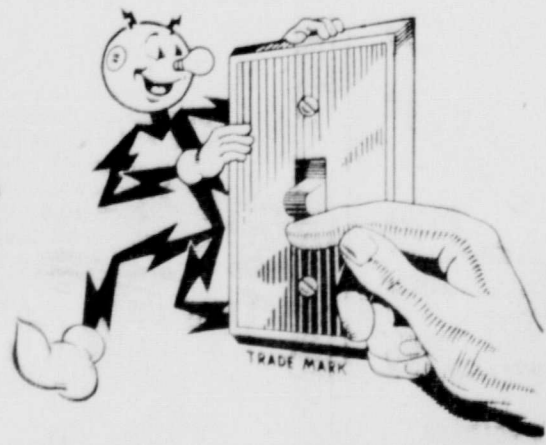

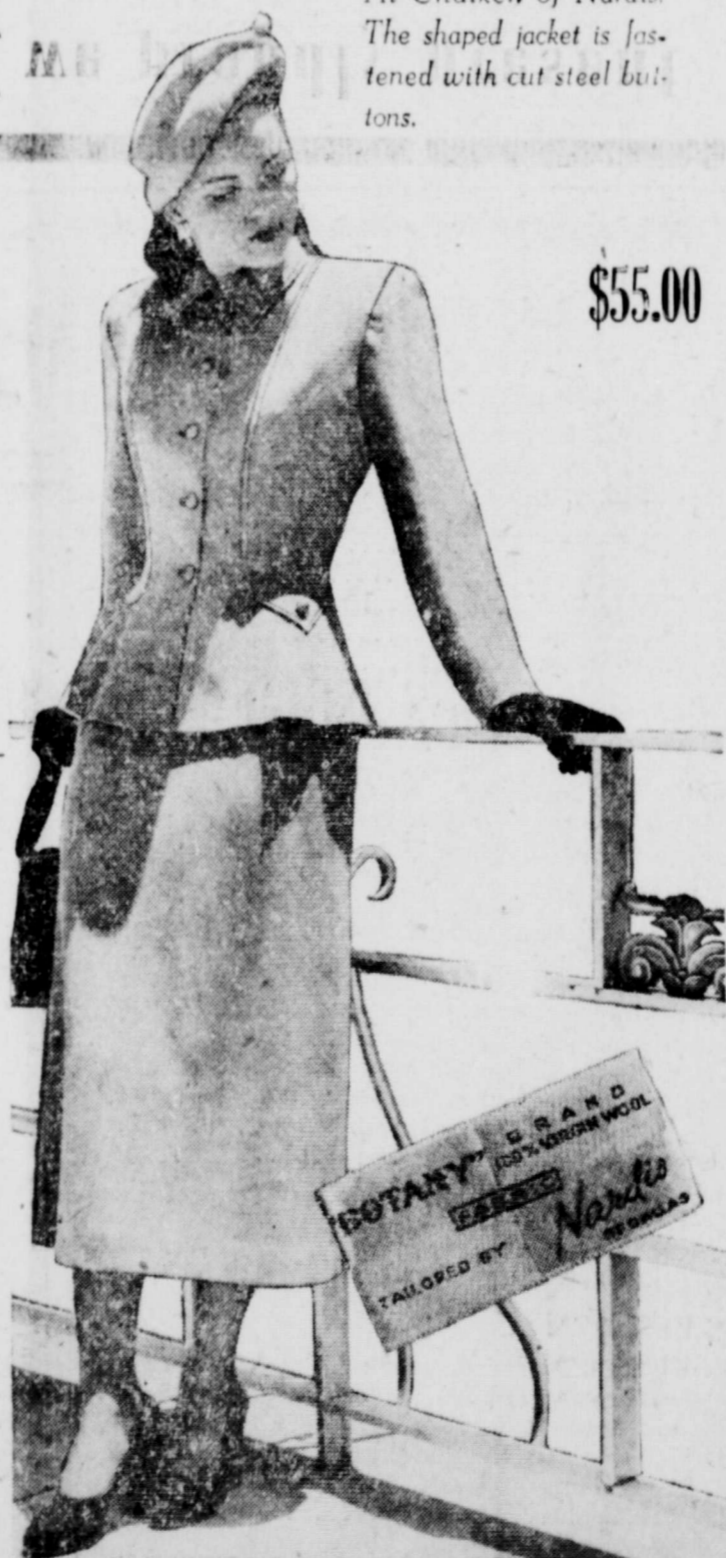
