KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARKE

Hot weather is no time to fuss about meals. Introduce cool King Neptune Salad with a hot soup, supplement salad and soup with nourishing wheat toast wafers, add iced tea and ice cream and you have a simple evening supper. For the salad, combine one 12-oz. can flaked tuna fish (1 1/2 cups), 1/4 cup diced celery, 1 cup diced cucumber and 1 1/2 tsp. grated onion. Mix 1 tsp. lemon juice, 1 1/2 tsp. catsup, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, add to tuna fish mixture, season with salt and pepper, toss lightly, chill. Wash 6 tomatoes, remove stem, chill. Cut tomatoes into fourths, petal fashion, only about two-thirds, enough to spread petals. Stuff with fish mixture. Serve on crisp salad greens. Serves 6.

Your automatic washer uses up from 20 to 30 gals. of hot water while you are washing for a half hour to an hour. Because of its "quick recovery" an automatic gas water heater keeps well ahead of such increased hot water demands in the home.

Leftover sandwiches can be well wrapped in wax paper and damp towel and put in the refrigerator. Next day take them out, spread with melted butter or margarine and toast under the broiler flame.

Corduroy play clothes and towels need not be ironed when dried in an automatic gas dryer. Just take them out when faintly damp, and smooth with the hands.

The button holes of wool sweaters often stretch during washing. Sew them up before laundering to keep them in their original shape.

As commissioner of the General Land Office Bascom Giles has collected for public education \$50,000,000 in a single year, which is five times that of any former commissioner.

During his administration the public school permanent fund has increased from \$56,000,000 to \$130,000,000.

In his tenure the University and A. & M. permanent fund has increased from \$27,000,000 to \$83,000,000.

He has fought vigorously for the rights of Texas to her submerged and other public lands.

He recommended the creation of the School Land Board to supervise the sale and lease of public lands and has served as chairman of that board since its creation.

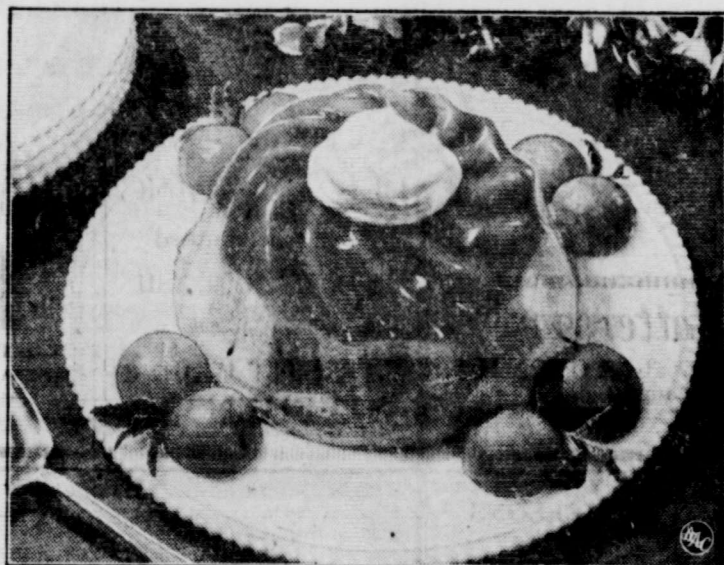

But festive desserts like the Apricot Two-Tone Snow in the photograph can be served at family meals and "company" meals alike with the help of unflavored gelatine to make things thrifty. There's a simple trick, explained in the recipe below, to making two-toned and two-textured gelatine snows that are a treat to the tongue. Apricot nectar lends distinctive flavor to the Snow and halved apricots make a pretty garnish. Here is the recipe to follow in making an Apricot Two-Tone Snow.

Apricot Two-Tone Snow

1 envelope unflavored gelatine	6 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup cold water	1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup apricot nectar	1/4 cup lemon juice
1 cup hot canned apricot nectar	1 egg white

Soften gelatine in cold apricot nectar. Add hot apricot nectar, sugar and salt and stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice. Pour 1/2 of the mixture into a large mold; chill. Chill the remaining mixture until slightly thicker than the consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Whip until light. Beat egg white until stiff; add gelatine mixture. Place the bowl in ice water; continue to beat until mixture begins to hold its shape. Pour on top of stiffened gelatine and chill until firm. Unmold and serve with whipped cream or soft custard. YIELD: 6 servings.
