Heart Disease Is Number 1 Killer

AUSTIN, Texas, July 22. Heart disease continued in the top spot as the number one killer of Texans, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

Mortality rate figures show an increase of 255 deaths from the April, 1946 figure of 1,099, as compared to the April, 1948, total of 1,354. This represents an increase of more than 18.5% for the comparative period,

"So-called functional heart" disease is usually traceable to hervousness, infections from bother parts of the body such as teeth and tonsils, a disturbed function of the thyroid gland, and to influenza," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said. "And the excessive use of tobacco, coffee, tea, or other heavy stimulant is often a contributing cause,"

Malfunction of the heart is a correctable condition, the health officer said, so far as the sources of infection may be located and eliminated, as in the case of bad teeth or tonsils. Incurable organic heart ailments exist only too fre-

Strict adherence to competent medical advice will eliminate much worry about either functional or organic heart conditions, Dr. Cox said. He added that such adherence would unquestionably reduce deaths from heart disease materi-



Fire Prevention Work.

D avenue, Cisco, Texas.

Texas is a leader in fire prevention work, and its Firemen's Training School is nationally recognized, according to Horatio Bond, of Boston, chief engineer for the National Fire Prevention Associa tion. Bond has been at Texas A&M College during the past week as one of the lecturers for the Firemen's School at which 589 Texas firemen, mostly from volunteer departments, received training in the techniques of fire fighting.

Cities whose fire fighters have passed the course at A & M get special credit in their insurance rates. The Firemen's Training School at A & M College was founded 18 years ago, in 1930, and has since served as a model for similar schools in other states, according

Air Forces also recognize the Texas school as "tops in the nation" and this year sent 40 men from 25 air fields to the school for fire training, according to H. R. Brayton, director of the school and former A & M chemistry professor. The Air Force men came from 14 states, and represented the fire-fighting forces of such installations as Scott Field, Bellville, Illinois and Lowery Field, in

The Texas Firemen's Training School had 589 students this year, from 283 cities, compared with 176 men from 96 cities in the first class in 1930, Brayton said. Of the present year's class, 75 per cent were attending for the first time. On the other hand, one of the firemen-instructors has been present for every one of the nineteen annual sessions. He is Adolph Solmky of Seguin, president of the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association of Texas

In addition to the summer course, the Firemen's School division of A & M College conducts training schools in various communities all year round, with five full-time instructors. Each man conducts class es on a "circuit," consisting of five cities, within a short distance of each other. Each city is visited once a week for five weeks. Most of these courses are for mixed departments, with several paid firemen but a large number of volunteers. Special courses are also given for professional fire companies in larger cities. Altogether, about 200 Texas fire departments are taught by the traveling instructors each year. All the instructors are former firemen

Bond is also secretary of the fire services section of President Truman's National Committee for Fire Prevention, and reported that Texas is cooperating with that national group.

Teaching of fire prevention in teachers' colleges, so that the teachers may in turn pass the information onto their pupils was among additional steps urged by Bond for Texas. He also urged that uniform pay scales be established for firemen of all departments. It should be possible. Bond said, for a fireman to go "up the ladder" in ings become available, rather than in spending an entire career in the fire department of a single city.

Establishment of rural fire protection districts, in cooperation with the Forest Service, was urged by Bond. He also pointed out the necessity of disaster relief planning, similar to civil defense work. The Department of National Defense has set up an agency to create civil defense planning on a national level, and a report from Washington on what the Federal Government must do will be made shortly, said

At the last session of the Legislature Harley Sadler introduced House Bil No. 634 which levied the following tax

- 1. The Sadler Bill levied a TAX on all soft drinks whether served at the fountain or in bottles.
- 2. The Sadler Bill levied a TAX on TIMBER, LIME, SAND, SHELL, GRAVEL and LIMESTONE, or building stone. (This would have increased the cost of building homes which are so badly needed.)
- 3. The Sadler tax Bill would have levied a TAX on Gypsum from which WALL BOARD and other building materials are made.
- 4. At the previous session of the Legislature Harley Sadler introduced House Bill No. 174 which levied a TAX on Gasoline used in Farm Tractors. (This would amount to the same thing as taxing a bushel of oats or other horse and mule feed).

These original Bills are on file in the Secretary of State's Office in Austin just as they were intrduced by Mr. Sadler. A copy of these Bils by Harley Sadler, certified by the Secretary of State, has been mailed to each Cunty Judge in the 24th Senatorial District. We suggest that you examine these Bills to verify the truth of the above statements.

The issue between these two candidates is clear. Senator Bullock opposes additional taxes. Mr. Sadler tried to tax the necessities of life.
