OUR REPORTS of late on the rust-or-what-ever is in our city water have attracted considerable interest around town.

OUR OLD FRIEND, W. H. LaRogue, former science teacher at Cisco Junior College and Cisco High School, has this to offer regarding removing the stains from your clothes.

"ANY WEAK ACID such as Oxalic Acid will cause a reaction in the waters deeply impregnated by iron and other minerals that have an alkaline reaction and causes settings or stains made by iron chloride."

"Perhaps more practical and economical is acetic acid (common vinegar). This will react with the iron chloride and neutralize it and the stains can be easily removed."

"For washing we suggest adding a little vinegar to the wash water and clothes may be made white as usual. Follow this with a rinsing water into which some common baking soda has been added. This is to remove any acid that may not have been neutralized by the reaction between the alkaline mineral and the acid vinegar, since it is well known that acid will destroy the fabric of clothing if allowed to remain in the cloth."

"Washing powders are alkaline in reaction and add to the iron chloride in the water, making them dingy and yellow, but the vinegar will neutralize this and clothes should be white as usual. Perhaps a little excess bluing will aid the acid reaction. But don't forget the soda to neutralize the excess acid that may not be neutralized by the mixture."

Civil Service To Hold Examination For Meteorologist

Examinations were announced today by the U. S. Civil Service Commission for filling Meteorologist and Patent Draftsman positions.

Meteorologist positions to be filled from the examination pay \$2,974 a year and are in the U. S. Weather Bureau in Washington, D. C., and throughout the country. A few positions in the Weather Bureau in territories and possessions of the United States and in foreign countries may also be filled. To qualify for these positions competitors must pass a written test. In addition, they must (a) have had four years of technical or scientific experience in meteorology or related fields, or (b) have completed a full curriculum of college study including 20 hours of laboratory work in meteorology; or (c) have had a combination of such experience and education. Age limits, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference, are from 18 to 35 years.

The Patent Draftsman positions, paying salaries ranging from \$2,498 to \$3,351 a year, are located in the U. S. Patent Office and other Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and nearby Virginia and Maryland. No written test is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must show that they have had from 2 to 4 1/2 years of appropriate drafting experience and must submit to a satisfactory sample of their drafting work. Pertinent study in architecture, engineering or drafting may be substituted for part of the required experience. Age limits for this examination, waived for persons entitled to veteran preference, are from 18 to 62 years.

For further information and application forms may be obtained from the Commission's Local Secretary, Mr. Sam King, located at Cisco postoffice, from Civil Service regional offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications for the Meteorologist examination should be sent to the Commission's Washington office and must be received not later than August 31, 1948. Applications for the Patent Draftsman examination will be accepted until further notice by the Executive Secretary, Committee of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, U. S. Patent Office, Washington 25, D. C. Persons who wish to be considered for Patent Draftsman positions to be filled immediately should have their applications on file not later than August 24, 1948.

District TAAF Boxing Tournament To Be Held in Cisco August 13-14

Fighters from Cisco, Eastland, Breckenridge, Ranger and Gorman will participate in the District TAAF boxing tournament to be held in the high school gymnasium here August 13 and 14, it was announced today. The winners will compete in the state meet to be held at Fort Worth August 19 - 21.

The Cisco Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland Quarterback Club will act as co-sponsors of the tournament and Neil Day of Eastland will be in charge of the arrangements.

It was expected that Tom Adams, state Golden Gloves lightweight champion, and Olympic trials representative from this section, would be on hand for the bouts. Adams is said to be one of the leading fighters in his age and weight group.

In last years state matches the Eastland - Cisco team was one of the leading contenders for the state crown. Bill Henderson won the featherweight title for the team.

A warmup for the district meet is scheduled Saturday night in the Cisco High School gymnasium, when Cisco fighters will entertain battlers from surrounding towns. G. P. Mitcham is trainer and manager for the Cisco contingent, and promises to have his boys in good shape for the bouts.

Good Oil Show Is Reported in Fee; Skelly To Cement

Successful completion of two outpost wells in Cisco's new Kleiner pool was prospect today, adding optimism to the outlook for the field. Some concern had been expressed over the two wells — the Killingsworth No. 1 George P. Fee and the H. W. Skelly No. 1 Thomas.

The Fee well, which logged only a few feet of Mississippi lime, was expected to be completed as a producer in the Chappell lime, just on top of the Mississippi. Monday, the tubing was perforated in ten feet of the 60-foot section of Chappell.

Five hundred gallons of acid were run into the hole, largely to expedite cleaning operations. Swabbing was begun and oil appeared in the mud. It was estimated that at least five barrels of oil per hour was coming out in the swabbing operation. It was understood that after cleaning it completed this afternoon, the well will be treated with 1,500 gallons of acid.

Pipe was being run into the Skelly well today to be cemented. The hole was about 4,050 feet deep. After the cement sets for some three days, it will be perforated in the Mississippi where saturated lime was cored last week. Oil men believed the Skelly well would be a good Mississippi producer. Some felt that it would have to be acidized to make it kick off.

Lone Star Producing Company's No. A-2 C. J. Kleiner was drilling below 3,400 feet and was expected to top the Mississippi some time Wednesday. It is an offset to Hickok Oil Co's No. 3 Kleiner, which has been cemented and is expected to be completed this week.

Lone Star was clearing a location to drill their No. 1 Daniels in the same area today. Derrick and equipment will be moved in probably Wednesday.

In the Caddo pool northeast of Cisco, Lone Star has completed their No. 7 Elliott. No official tests have been run, but it was described as a "big well."

Fair Designates Texas Swine Day

DALLAS, Aug. 3. — Oct 20 has been designated as Texas Swine Breeders' Day at the 1948 State Fair of Texas, Fred Hale, superintendent of the Fair's Swine Show, has announced.

An auction sale of purebred breeding hogs, sponsored by the Texas Swine Breeders' Association, will be the major event of the day. The breeders' association is working closely with State Fair officials to make this the most complete swine show ever arranged in the history of the sixty-three-year old exposition.

Dates of the State Fair are Oct. 9-24 with the Swine Show scheduled for Oct. 13-22.

The State Fair will award \$5,218 in premiums in the breeding division, and \$2,150 in the fat barrow division. Various national swine breeders' associations have announced special awards for the show. Choice hams will be given daily as prizes in a special identification and weight-guessing contest, Hale said.

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## Accidents Take Many.

Accidents, now the greatest single threat to the life of children one to four years old, kill about 5,000 of these children in the United States each year, according to statisticians of a life insurance company. About one death in every four among preschool children results from an accident.

An analysis of the death claim records of 775 children insured by the company who died in accidents in 1946 and 1947, shows motor vehicle accidents to be responsible for the greatest number — 267, or 34 per cent — of all the fatal accidents under study. Burns, scalds and fires ranked second, accounting for 213 fatalities, or for 27 per cent of the total.

Other types of more common accidents, in the order of their frequency among children one to four years of age, were drownings, falls, the swallowing of poisons, choking, being struck by falling objects, and the inhaling of poisonous gases.

The study indicates that fatal accidents occur much more frequently among boys than among girls, for more than three fifths of the victims were boys. In drownings the boys made up 80 per cent of the total, and of the youngsters run over or hit by an automobile, there were nearly twice as many boys as girls.

A large percentage of the accidents happened when the children were in or near their homes, and many of these could have been averted by the vigilance of an older person. Many of the 267 young boys and girls killed by automobiles were hit or run over while they were in their own yard or driveway. Many of the fatalities from burns and scalds were caused by the children falling into tubs of hot water during laundering time, or by pulling percolators or other coffee makers over upon themselves.

The study shows that at the preschool ages safety depends upon the constant vigilance of others. From the time youngsters begin to move about on their own until they are off to school, they will heedlessly venture wherever they can. A more watchful eye on young children will save many lives each year.

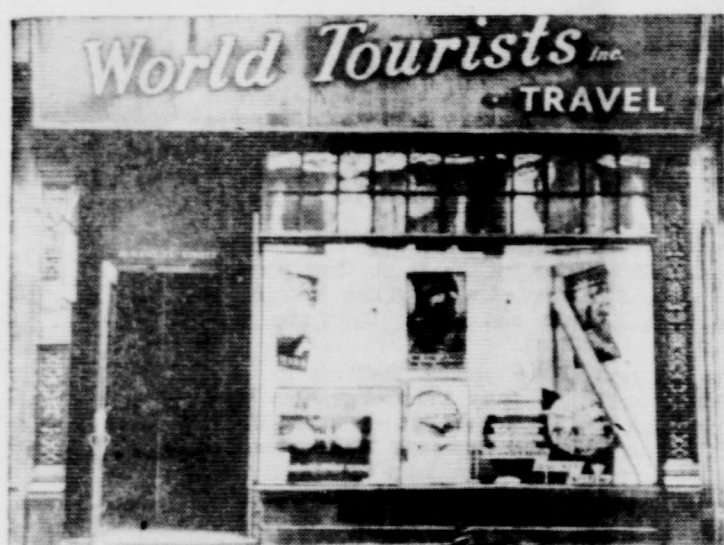

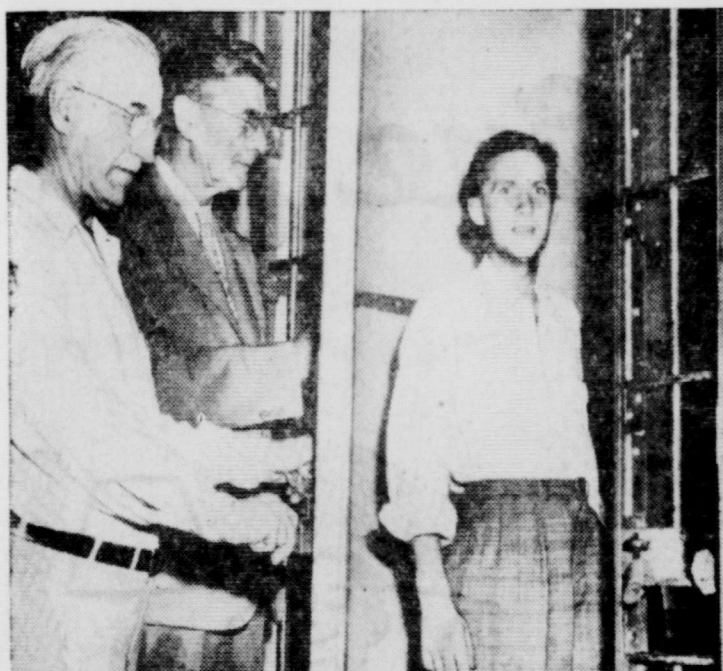

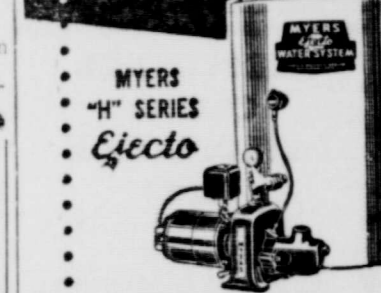
