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Draining The Nation.

Last year, the fire insurance industry rendered a greater public service than ever before. More losses were paid to more individuals for a greater total of dollars than in any prior year. At Texas City the companies dealt with the greatest single disaster since the San Francisco fire of 1906. Other costly disasters included the Florida hurricane, the Maine forest fires, and the tornadoes in the Southwest. Fire insurance thus stood solidly between thousands of families and businesses and financial disaster. It provided, swiftly and efficiently, the money needed to rebuild and repair: It was always on the job. It proved again that no form of protection is more necessary. Yet, this industry's magnificent record of service is in itself indicative of the criminal carelessness of the people when it comes to fire. In a single year we have destroyed \$700,000,000 worth of property through fires which were largely preventable. And the rising fire waste cannot be entirely blamed on inflationary values. The number of fires — no less than the damage done — has steadily increased. The main reason for fire prevention, of course, is to save life and property. But there is another financial reason as well. For four successive years, the industry has operated at a loss. A number of states have recently allowed increases in insurance rates. This is just one more of the drains fire imposes on the nation.

The Editor's Stake.

A free press is made possible by advertising — a thousand and one different advertisements of industries seeking to sell their wares or services to the public. From such a field in which to seek business the press of the United States can maintain its financial independence — the smallest country weekly or the greatest metropolitan daily has an equal chance. Such financial independence means editorial independence. American newspapers are not creatures of government as in dictator countries where they are controlled and subsidized. They are not afraid to criticize government, public officials or business. There can be no free press or individual opportunity without private enterprise. Communism and socialism kill free enterprise and personal liberty because under such political systems government owns industry, including newspapers, and the individual. American editors are against communism and socialism, first, because such governmental philosophies destroy a free press. Any successful move to socialize an industry in the United States, undermines by that much, personal liberty, the foundation of a free press, and the unrestricted opportunity of individuals to choose a line of work or an employer. Under socialism and communism you work for the state and like it, or else. This is why individuals and newspapers wishing to retain their independence should oppose government ownership of business in our country, while they have a chance. Don't be lulled into a false sense of security by thinking it can't happen here.

It's made with bologna or other variety meat that will prove popular with hungry boys. And there's a menu suggestion to go with the meat ring that's guaranteed to bring the boys back next Saturday. JELLIED MEAT RING 1 1/2 pounds small bologna cut 1/4 inch thick 1 package aspic flavored gelatin 1 cup hot water 1 cup tomato juice 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon sugar 1 tablespoon onion juice 1/2 cup chopped cabbage 1/2 cup diced celery 1/2 cup chopped carrots Mayonnaise Dissolve gelatin in water. Add tomato juice, salt, sugar and onion juice. Cover the bottom of an eight-inch ring mold with half of the gelatin mixture. Chill in the refrigerator until it becomes firm. Arrange slices of bologna on the gelatin so they overlap slightly. When remainder of the gelatin thickens, mix in vegetables and pour over bologna. Chill until firm. Unmold on large chop plate. Arrange remaining bologna slices in a fan-shaped circle around the salad. Fill the center with a tossed green salad and serve with mayonnaise. Serves 10. Soldiers Will Study Publicity

AUSTIN, Aug. 10th— Seventy newspaper editors, publishers, and managers of radio and television stations throughout the country have agreed to furnish 90 days of on-the-job training to 100 Army enlisted men recruited especially to do public information work.

After recruitment, these men will take the normal basic training of a ground soldier and then go to the Armed Forces Information School, Carlisle Barracks, Pa., for six weeks of preparation. From the school they will go to newspapers, radio or television stations in their areas for 90 days of practical experience at no expense to the cooperating news media. During this period most of these soldiers will draw Army pay and full monetary allowances for off-post maintenance. They will wear civilian clothes and work entirely under direction of the media to which assigned.

The news media will prepare a report evaluating the soldier's work. This will give the Army a

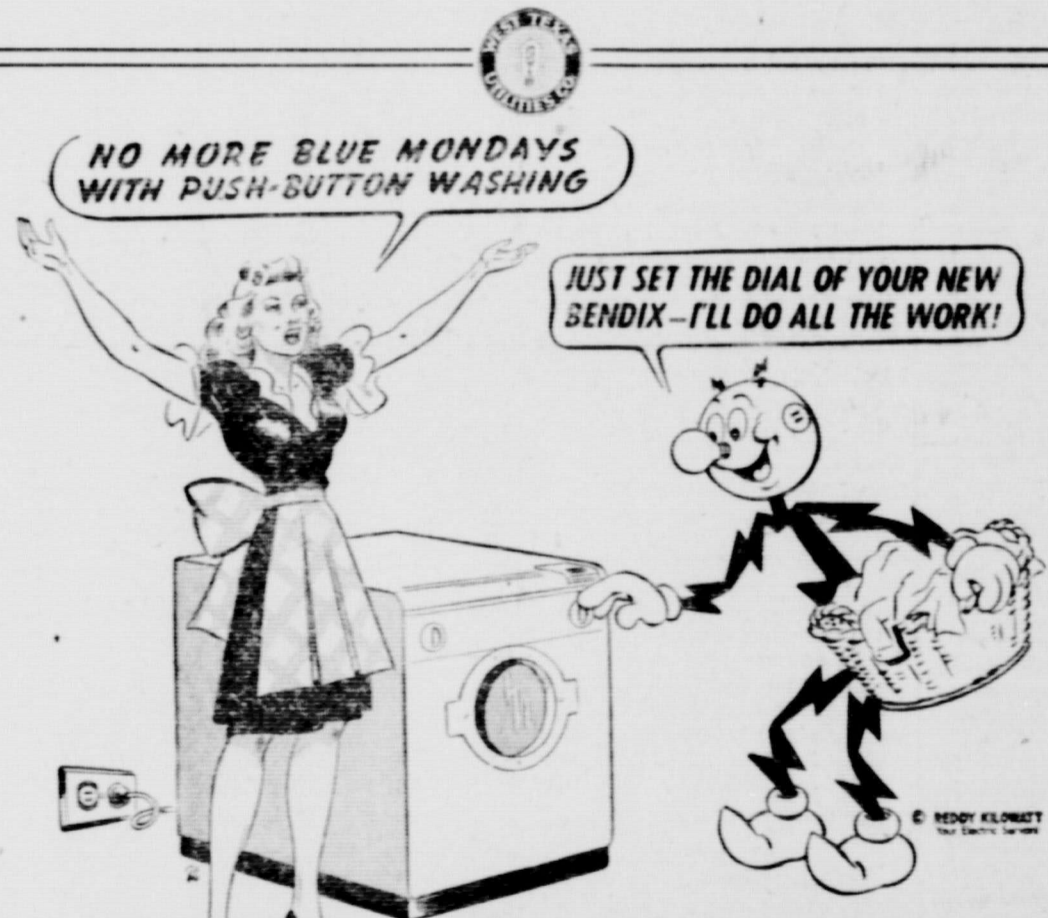
