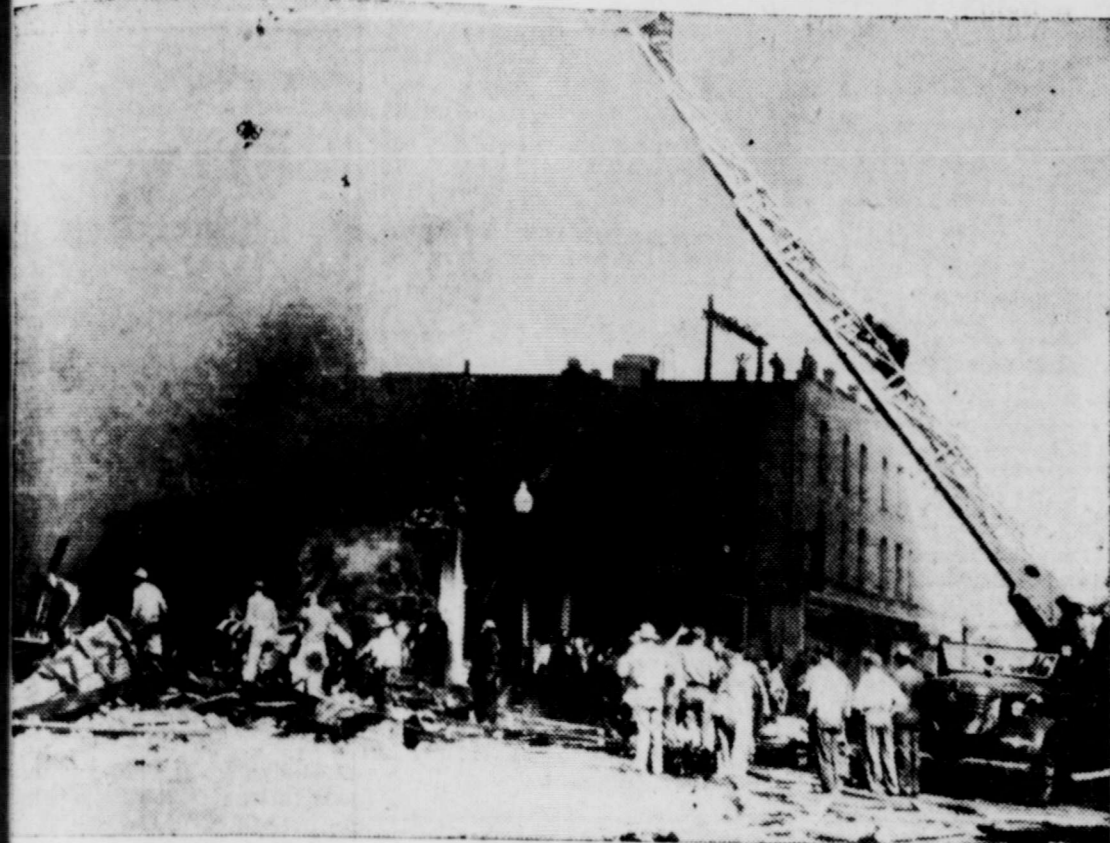

Polio Victim is Critically Ill in Ft. Worth Center

Four year old Jimmy Coats, Cisco's second polio victim, was slight-improved but he was still critically ill Monday it was announced by attending physicians at the Tarrant County Polio Center.

Jimmy, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Coats of Rt. 4, was taken to the Fort Worth hospital after his illness was diagnosed as polio by Dr. E. E. Addy. When he arrived at the hospital the diagnosis of Dr. Addy was confirmed by staff doctors and he was given treatment.

His condition was thought at first, not to be serious, but over the weekend he became worse, and his breathing was impaired. He was placed in a respirator Monday and the announcement was made after he was placed in the chamber.

Plant to Produce Oil By-Products From Cisco Sector

Construction began this week upon the plant of the recently organized Cisco Hydro-Carbons Company, to be linked with the Compton-O'Conner pressure maintenance plant of Fred M. Manning Company in the O'Conner-Kimmell Caddo lime development by Manning in southwestern Stephens county, 14 miles northwest of Cisco.

The plant will represent an investment of roughly one and one-half million dollars, according to E. Armstrong of Houston, vice-president in charge of operations who is here overseeing the installation. The plant was designed by the Fish Engineering Corp., of Houston, which also is the contractor.

It will produce natural gasoline butane and propane from the gas used in the pressure maintenance unit, with a prospective daily output of 45,000 gallons, handling about 20 million cubic feet of natural gas daily. Of this some 16 million feet will come from the Manning properties.

Location will be adjoining the Manning recycling unit, on the Henry Compton farm in Section 40, Block 7, T&PRR survey, Stephens county, and the operation will be integrated with that of the recycling plant. Between 150 and 200 men will be employed in the construction, E. D. Newman, construction superintendent for the Fish corporation, said. An estimated operating force of 25 will be required. They will be housed at Cisco.

The Cisco Hydrocarbons company was recently chartered under Texas laws with a capital stock of \$25,000. Ray C. Fish of Houston is president, Mr. Armstrong, operating vice president, was formerly with the Tennessee Gas Transmission Company at Houston.

Mr. Newman and M. S. Rudy are construction superintendents. Mr. Rudy was in charge of building the Manning recycling plant, also designed by the Fish Corporation. The project was developed under supervision of A. M. Ballard, superintendent of natural gas properties for the Manning interests. Superintendent of the recycling plant is F. M. Wright of Cisco. The project is significant in that it is repressuring the Caddo lime formation, a formation hitherto regarded as unsuited to recycling operations.

Besides the plant, the construction program includes seven miles of water line, for which contract has been let to Sam Kimmel of Cisco and C. J. O'Conner of Breckenridge; two and one-half miles of low pressure gathering line, a field booster and seven miles of high pressure gas line, and a product line to a loading rack on the Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad at Moran.

No delay, due to material shortages, is anticipated, most of the critical material having already been secured, Mr. Newman said.

Mr. Armstrong said that the company also plans to load LPG fuel mixture at the plant itself, several offers to take large quantities of the product having been received.

Local School Man Made Principal of Carrollton Schools

Announcement was made Tuesday that E. L. Kent had resigned his position as Cisco Junior High School principal, and had accepted the principalship of the Carrollton, Texas, schools.

He came to the Cisco school system in September of 1946, and was reappointed for the 1948-49 term by the school board. He has been attending the summer classes at North Texas State Teachers College in Denton, where he is working on a Masters degree. He plans to continue his work in the Southern Methodist University night classes, it was announced.

Mr. and Mrs. Kent and their two children will leave for their new home on September 10.

Two Local Boys To Enter State TAAF Meet in Ft. Worth

Cisco's TAAF entrants, after sparkling in the warm-up bouts and the semi-finals Friday night at ABC Park, will send two standouts to represent this city in the forthcoming Texas Athletics Federation scraps to be held at Fort Worth's La Grave Field, August 19-21.

The two representatives, Wayne Hayes, middleweight contender, and Bill Tabor, lightweight contender for the state berths, were automatically decided winners, since both fighters went through the district tournament unchallenged.

A favored contender for the welterweight division, Gene Miller, 148 pound prancer with a dynamite left jab, lost a three round decision to Oscar Jones, 146 pounder who had previously advanced to the finals by scoring two consecutive knockouts over Dutch Hessler of Breckenridge. Jones defeated Bunyan in the semies for the final spot.

Stanley Thompson, 127 pound hustler from Abilene, out-slugged and out-waltzed his opponent, Charles Lee for the featherweight title. Thompson fought George Watts of Cisco in the second half, defeating the local with a knockout punch in the first seconds of the second round. The Abilenian will represent this district in the featherweight division at Fort Worth, Aug. 19.

Breckenridge's undefeated Snuffy Woralis won a three round tight decision over Joe Knight, 147 pound hefty, also of Breckenridge. Both ringsters, starting in the second, powdered their blows at the other until the third round's end. The exhibition bout, fans said, was the highlighting feature of the evening.

Hug Harwell, 130 pound exhibitionist, lost a three round struggle to Doug Johnson, 128 pound classiey. Both sluggers presented flashy form while in the arena.

In addition to the morning service which begins at 10 o'clock, and the evening service which begins at 8 o'clock, Mr. Hill is conducting a special young people's service which begins at 7:30 p.m. During this part of the work he is teaching the fundamentals of the Bible and its application to the youth of the world, it was announced.

Mr. Burke, speaking on the behalf of the clubs two-hundred members, expressed appreciation for the citizens' support the athletic program.

The club will continue throughout the winter months with other athletic programs, he added. The plans will be disclosed later.

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For Better Rural Roads.

A state-wide organization has been formed, the sole aim of which is to provide and sponsor a planned program designed to give Texas all weather rural roads.

Many state-wide groups interested in all rural problems have attempted in the past to sponsor better rural roads. However, each organization had its individual program, and many times it enabled pressure lobbyists to play one group against the other. In order to avoid this in the future, these state-wide groups met with many individuals and representatives of such organizations as were primarily dependent upon good roads, and it was decided to form "THE TEXAS RURAL ROADS ASSOCIATION."

All modern benefits now received by the rural people of our state are the result of organized effort. The rural mail service, rural electrification, telephone, conservation districts, Co-ops, and many others were made possible only after the people organized themselves into one common group and worked for enactment of the necessary legislation. Realizing this, THE RURAL ROADS ASSOCIATION will attempt to organize ALL the people of Texas who are not now satisfied with the mileage of better rural roads they are receiving.

Such an organization as THE TEXAS RURAL ROADS ASSOCIATION attempt to get legislation providing a long range, well planned program of rural road building. Such a program has resulted in our having now an excellent system of state highways. Without a well planned program, the present highway system would probably have not been what it is. At the present there is no such planned program for building rural roads. The only means of obtaining such a program for rural roads is through a state-wide organization working for us.

Judge Roger Garrett of Anson, Director of the TEXAS RURAL ROADS ASSOCIATION for the 24th Senatorial District, has called a district meeting for Tuesday, August 24, at 10 o'clock in Abilene, at which time all interested citizens are invited to attend this meeting and to join in the movement to obtain better rural roads. Organization of all people interested should be the correct method to get results.

Such an organization as THE TEXAS RURAL ROADS ASSOCIATION has long been needed. Many things which modern science has developed and which are in use for the betterment of urban areas, are now being denied the rural sections due to poor rural roads. It is hoped that every person interested in "getting his county out of the mud" will join in with Judge Garrett and the other local citizens in organizing a substantial local group who will work with the Texas Rural Roads Association.

Reserve Officers Answer Call to Active Army Duty

AUSTIN, Tex., Aug. 17. — Since the announcement on June 5th of

the opportunity to re-enter the Army on extended active duty, 230 Texas Reservists have made application to don their khaki for another three years. Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, Senior Instructor for the Texas Organized Reserve Corps, announced here today.

The results of the applications are beginning to be felt throughout the Army in the United States as each day a long list of Reserve

officers are being ordered to various camps, posts, and stations. It is too early though, for the effect to be felt in the overseas commands, as most Reservists scheduled for embarkation are given time to get their personal affairs in order.

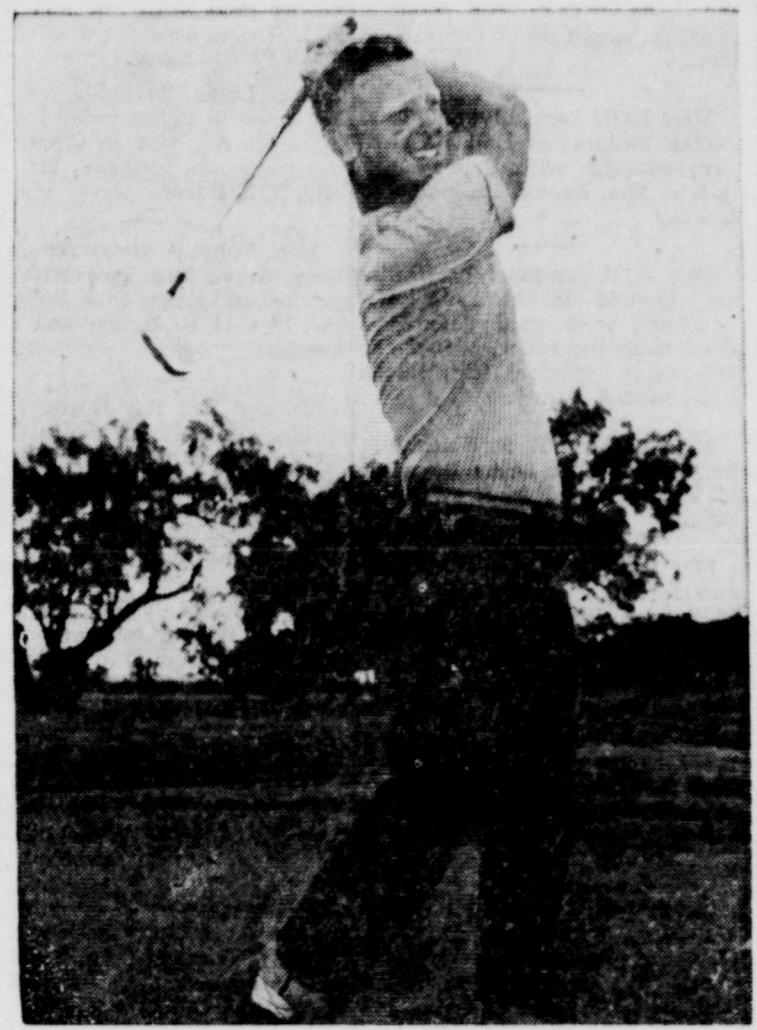

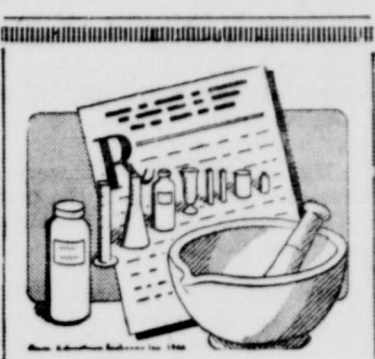

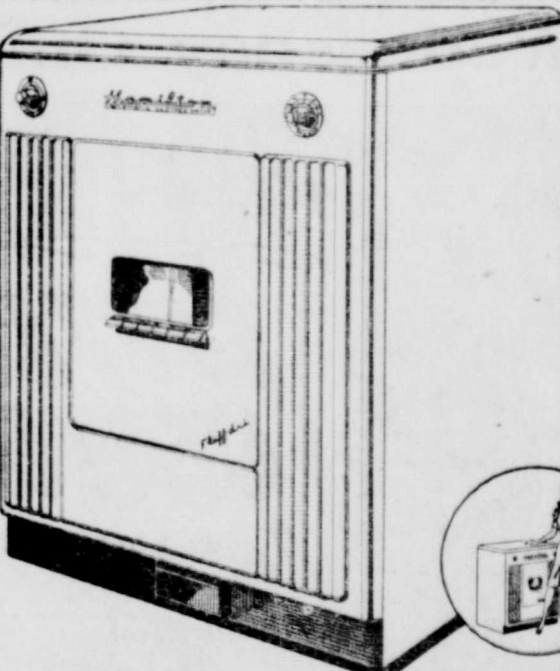

Civil Service Sets Examinations For Federal Positions

The Civil Service Commission today announced examinations for Engineer, Printer's Assistant, and Elevator Operator.

The Engineer examination is for filling positions in all branches of engineering at the P-1 grade (\$2,974 a year) located in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. To qualify, applicants must have had either 4 years of college study in professional engineering leading to a bachelor's degree, or 4 years of progressive experience in technical engineering, or any time equivalent combination of such education and experience. No written test is required. Applications will be accepted from students who expect to complete their college course within 6 months of the date of filing applications. The age limit (18 to 35 years) are waived for persons entitled to veteran preference.

The position to be filled from the Printer's Assistant examination are in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing in Washington, D. C., and pay \$1.10 an hour. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test, age limits are from 18 to 45 years (waived for persons entitled to veteran preference). The Bureau desires women for these positions.


