AUSTIN, Aug. 19. — A project earlier in the month. to prevent building settlement by removing water from foundation soil before construction begins is under way in the University of Texas Bureau of Engineering Re-

Bureau Associate Director Ba mond F. Dawson explains that buildings settle because their weight pushes water out of foundation soil, pressing it down. The Bureau plan is to drain the water out before building begins by running electric current through the

Laboratory experiments have been successful. Currently the project has progressed to the most important question -- can the process be applied to larger areas and will the cost be prohibitive to

general use? Considerable work and testing has to be done before the final value of the method will be known. Prof. Dawson says.

## **Weevil Damage** Seen As Slight

early maturing cotton in Central and North Texas. In the late-fruiting cotton, heavy damage from both weevils and bollworms has been recorded and such fields need protection from these pests.

Cotton insects are doing ver little damage in most cotton fields in the West Cross Timbers and northwest areas. Most fields in spected showed a heavy crop of fruit. Although fleahoppers were spected, it is believed that this pest will not cause much, if any, damage at this late date in the heavily

In northwestern areas, it is imporant to continue to inspect cot ton for insect damage and to apply control measures when necessary Cotton leafworms were found in

late-planted fields of succulent cot ton in Falls and McLennan counties during the past week. Since most of the cotton in Central Texas is mature, it appears unlikely that leafworms will increase to damaging numbers except in fields of late-planted cotton. The leafworm having appeared in Central Texas indicates that it is spreading and may be found in northern and

of pink bollworms and boll weevis. Early fall destruction of cotton stalks is one of the best and cheapest means of reducing damage the correct methods of handling from the boll weevil. A new two page circular entitled "Plowing Under Cotton Stalks Gills Cotton And Enriches Insects Soil" has been published and is available through your county agent or the Texas Extension Service at College Station,

#### Tips For Drivers.

You wouldn't rely on another guy to tip your hat when you meet a lady. Neither can you build your reputation as a considerate driver on someone else's courtesy!

Make courtesy characterize your driving - then watch your driving record improve. Every motorist and every pedestrian should keep constantly in mind the thought that courtesy does prevent accidents. Courtesy saves lives. You never heard of anyone apologizing for being courteous, but you can be sure that many a driver has been sorry for his recklessness.

Courtesy tips for drivers were listed by the Texas Safety Association as follows:

1. Use hand signals to inform other motorists of your intention to turn or stop.

2. Know the lane you should be in, then stay in that lane. Don't take your half of the road out of the center.

3. Recognize a situation where others have the right-of-way, and Boucher Saturday. yield to them

4. Don't insist on the right-of-way even when it's rightfully your. 5. Give pedestrians a break. They can't walk or run as fast as you

6. Use your horn to warn, not to bully.

7. Dim lights for other drivers at night.

8. Remember that the other fellow may be in a hurry, too.

#### New Man From Texas.

Appointment of Gus Valdemar, of Denver, Colorado, as a Texas state representative of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, has been disclosed by Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation.

Mr. Valdemar, who is widely-known as a physical therapist skilled in the treatment of infantile paralysis, studied at Kjellbergs Institute, Stockholm, Sweden, and also at the University of Stockholm. Arriving in this country in 1936 he joined the physical therapy department of the Children's Hospital, Denver, and in 1941 was named director of the department.

His professional knowledge as a physical therapist was of great service in helping cope with polio outbreaks in North Carolina in 1944, and the Colorado epidemic, 1946. During 1945 he taught physical therapy in the treatment of polio at the University of Kansas, and the University of Washington, Seattle. The following year, Mr. Valdemar took a special assignment with the American Red Cross as an instructor to members of the U.S. Occupation Forces in Ger-

As a state representative of the National Foundation he will act as liaison between chapters in his area in Tevas and national headquarters, with a view to still further implementing National Foundation programs of service in that section. At present his office is lo cated in Room 612, 128 West Confmerce St., San Antonio, Texas.




