Large Crowd Attends Band Concert, Football Preview at Chesley Field

National Child Safety Campaign Work is Urged

AUSTIN, Texas.—A state-wide effort to reduce Texas' child accident toll of about 900 lives yearly through participation in the national child safety program in September was set forth by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, as an immediate public health objective calling for concerted cooperation by all public health and medical authorities and interested civic organizations within the state.

The needless loss of a single life, or the crippling of even one child is an exorbitant price to pay for any neglect of this problem," said Dr. Cox.

Approximately 1,500 fans were at Chesley Field Tuesday night to witness the presentation of the 1948 Cisco Junior High School Lobos, the Cisco Junior College Wranglers and the 1948-49 Cisco High School band.

Coaches Hansard and Overall began the program at 7:30 p.m., by presenting 30 of the 38 candidates for berths on the starting eleven at the high school. Coach Hansard said that the Lobos were rounding into shape and would be ready for the opening game with Cleburne on September 10.

He assured fans that the team would be fighting for every game, and that he was well pleased with the prospects.

The first and second teams entertained the visitors with a few minutes of scrimmage.

Band director Fred Baumgardner presented his band to the public for the first time this fall, and they presented a 30-minute program of marches and overtures. John James Haynie was guest director and guest soloist.

Coaches Everett and Davis then presented the members of the Wrangler squad, and expressed themselves as being well pleased with the turn out. Everett said that they had more candidates for backfield positions this year than they had on the entire squad last year.

New Insecticide Developed for Use in Homes, on Farm

One of the most promising of the many new postwar insecticides for use in the home or on the farm and ranch is a material called Chlordane, according to County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper who has been trying the material out.

Many people want insecticide that will kill any and all bugs and beetles. Chlordane comes close to it but warns that all bugs are not affected by it. The red spider, grape leaf hopper and cattle grubs are seemingly not affected by the material in any way.

The material is slow acting and kills from contact or from its vapors. Usually several hours are needed to a complete kill but one of its many advantages is that it retains its potency over a period of several weeks and for that reason makes it superior to many of the old insecticides.

Several companies are now making and distributing the material. It was discovered in a war materials plant in Denver, according to reports.

The material comes in several percentages of strengths. Usually the higher the percentage of chlordane the cheaper in the long run because the liquid is mixed with water. The dust forms should not be mixed with any other powder. It is not poisonous when used according to directions on the container.

The household solution is very effective against moths, cockroaches and silverfish. The solution leaves an invisible, non-staining film. Other solutions are effective against chiggers, sowbugs, ants, fleas and many others. Flies will eventually be killed by it but should be mixed with a DDT solution for a quick kill on flies.

National Guard To Meet at Armory Wednesday Night

All guardsmen and junior officers of the 961st Field Artillery, Cisco National Guard unit, were summoned today by the unit's commander, Capt. Olin O. Odum, to attend the battalion's regular Wednesday night meeting at the junior college armory building, promptly at 7 o'clock, he said.

Capt. Odum, who has recently returned from a two weeks training course at Camp Hood, Texas, urged the guardsmen to report at the given hour, and said that the Texas State National Guard commander was to inspect the ranks.

Announcing to the 31 officers and guardsmen at the unit's meeting last Wednesday that the War Department had formally recognized this unit's application for a charter, Capt. Odum said new equipment, both personnel and field, would arrive within the next two weeks.

"Once this unit's program gets underway," Capt. Odum told the unit, "the 961st Field Artillery has the makings and the material for being the most advanced National Guard unit in this part of the state."

He spoke briefly on his training course at the National Guard camp.

R. E. Kinney managed to hang up a total series of 717 pins without benefit of handicap to attain the highest mark for three games ever shot on the Cisco lanes in tournament play. In the first game Kenney shot a 261 followed by a 220 and 236 for an average of 239 per game.

Some three months after they left their classrooms for their summer vacations, Cisco's school children returned Tuesday to register for the 1948-49 school year.

Approximately 1,500 students registered in the Cisco public schools and the Cisco Junior College on the opening day, and were dismissed, after they were registered, for a few hours more play before getting down to business at 8:45 a.m. Wednesday.

The time Wednesday morning was spent in the issuing of books and the instructing of students as to procedure for the coming term. Teachers were kept busy answering questions fired at them by new scholars and those who had forgotten the way to various rooms during their three months absence.

Superintendent Birt announced that a special pre-school class had been arranged for boys and girls who reached their 6th birthday after September 1 or who will become six before January 1, 1949. Children in this group are not eligible for enrollment in regular classes, it was announced.

The new class will be located in the East Ward School and will be under the direction of Mrs. Stanley Webb. Mrs. Webb will not begin the classes before next week and parents wishing to have their children enrolled were asked to call Mrs. Webb on phone no. 646-W. They will be given regular first grade work and will be eligible for the second grade next year providing they pass the work required of a first grade pupil.

In the Cisco public schools West Ward led in enrollees with 485. The high school was second with 310. Grammar school registered 261 and East Ward had 65. Cisco Junior College began the fall term with 363.

The total enrollment was a little under the number expected by school officials, it was announced, but there are a number who will register within the next few days.

4-H Club Meeting Set For Chicago

With the forthcoming National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, more than 26,000 rural boys and girls from all parts of the nation will have attended the event since the first meeting in 1922. The Club Congress, scheduled this year Nov. 28 - Dec. 2, is held annually to honor 4-H Club members for work well done in agriculture and home economics activities. Fifteen hundred 4-H delegates, leaders and extension service workers, together with youth from several foreign countries, will attend.

The delegates — state and sectional winners in national 4-H awards programs — will take part in group discussions and educational tours. They will also be guests at special functions given in their honor by awards donors and civic groups.

Trips to the Club Congress are a part of the prizes offered in the programs. With other incentives such as college scholarships, watches, savings bonds, county medals, plaques and leader training funds, more than \$325,000 worth of merit awards are provided in 1948 through the National 4-H Club Committee by private citizens, educational foundations and industrial organizations interested in furthering 4-H Club work.

Football is back: A drop in the temperature, a bit of rain, and there is promotion of fall in the air. A glance at the calendar reveals that September—and the beginning of football thrills—are upon us.

Take it from there: It is a date that the coaches at Cisco Junior College have been anticipating for the longest. Up to the opening curtain raiser, Jack Everett and Stormy Davis have been in a huddle planning the strategy for the Wranglers' '48 campaign, promising a lot of "run-downs" and "charley-horses" to each of the 66 huskies who have formed for the pre-season shaping. And spoken from the lips of a Wrangler-candidate, "no promise could have been more exact."

The Wrangler chisel-jawed coaches have been looking forward to the coming season with gawking eyes, confident that their roughriders will play a good brand of football. But, on the other hand, the mentors are not so confident that they're unaware that material is plentiful at the opposing colleges and that the Wranglers are in for a greueling campaign.

Hitting the leather: The first of a series of pre-season intersquad scrimmages were the order of the day Saturday . . . with potential varsity candidates versus frosh and B-squad desirers. And from the look of things after the head knocking, the frosh demonstrated that they intended to make life rather strenuous for their more seasoned brothers for a while this season.

It was rugged: Although it wasn't a game conditioned affair, the varsity eleven managed to shake loose runners three times for what might have been termed scouring jaunts, while the opposers would have tallied a trio of touchdowns themselves. Both squads mixed the padding and handled themselves fairly well on defense, despite long gallops and injuries on the contingent eleven.

Loboes look sharp: Lobo coach John Hansard is not famous or overdoing optimism regarding

his team's future coming season's undertaking.

Not that Hansard has too much to be enthusiastic about anyway, because he is faced with a stiff task of building up the 1948 Loboes into a marauding machine.

Taking a glance at the situation as the Loboes prepare for the final days of work for the Cleburne unraveling, the mentor believes that the big weakness lies in defense. And, fortunately, time and more hussle can change everything.

A look in the crystal ball: This writer believes that the Loboes have a setup, in more ways than one, of panning the district pennant. It may be too early to think about such things, but behind the doubtful status lies a brighter prospect that the "Hansard Plan" will forge ahead to win eventual triumph. And all Cisco will be watching.

After three weeks: In the time that has elapsed from the beginning of pre-season drill work-outs Coach Hansard has given the nod to Paul Woods, George Watts, Gene Milner, Ray Kylee, Rex Farley, Robert Mac Murray, Norman Boggs, Durwood Smith, Clarence Noble, Russell Johnson and Robert Rendall for starting berths on the Lobo eleven against the Cleburne Yellowjackets Friday night. Until then, see you at the sideline.

Roy Parker, No. 1 Daniels has spudded in and is now drilling at 350 feet.

Decker and Raymond are making location for their No. 1 Jordan and are rigging up. This well will be about two miles Northwest of Desdemona.

Wrather, Penn and Walters have set pipe on their No. 4 Dominy which they bottomed at

2880 feet. They are rigging up on the No. 3 location which they skipped in setting up on the No. 4. The No. 4 has been as good if not even better show than the No. 1 and No. 2 on the same lease.

Mrs. Shugart (of Shugart Picture Studios) is in receipt of a letter from Harley Sadler Monday morning (Labor Day) in which Mr. Sadler sent instructions for having slush pits, etc., dug and everthing ready for the rigging up on Mrs. Shugart's mother's place (the Kinney lease.) As has been reported, this outfit intends trying to spud in on this location not later than the 13th of September which gives them just one week to get ready.

George and Wrather are drilling a well for E. F. Roche et al. of Austin, on the No. 1 Grisham which is about 1 1/2 miles South of Cisco. This well is now down to about 2615 feet. They topped Caddo at 2577.

Ownby No. 1 Lindley acidized Monday afternoon. They intend to test the oil structure first even though they seem to think that the gas encountered is more promising.

Kirk and Gregg, et al, have hit the Ellenberger on the No. 1 House. This operation is not looking too promising and they have about fulfilled their contract as to depth.

J. R. Hunter et al No. 1 Blackwell have set pipe and are WOC. Man and Griffin No. 1 Bryan is drilling for Coast Oil on the Bryson lease and are drilling at about 2500 feet.

Coast Oil No. 5 Della Graham gauged 290 barrels crude oil of 42 gravity on potential test thru 16-64 choke on a 24 hour test.

Coast Oil Della No. 8 is drilling at 60 feet.

W. B. Johnson No. 5 Ireland Watson is drilling at 2783 feet and just now topping pay.

Gillespie No. 1 Waller is drilling at 2983 with a gas showing so far as only sign of pay.

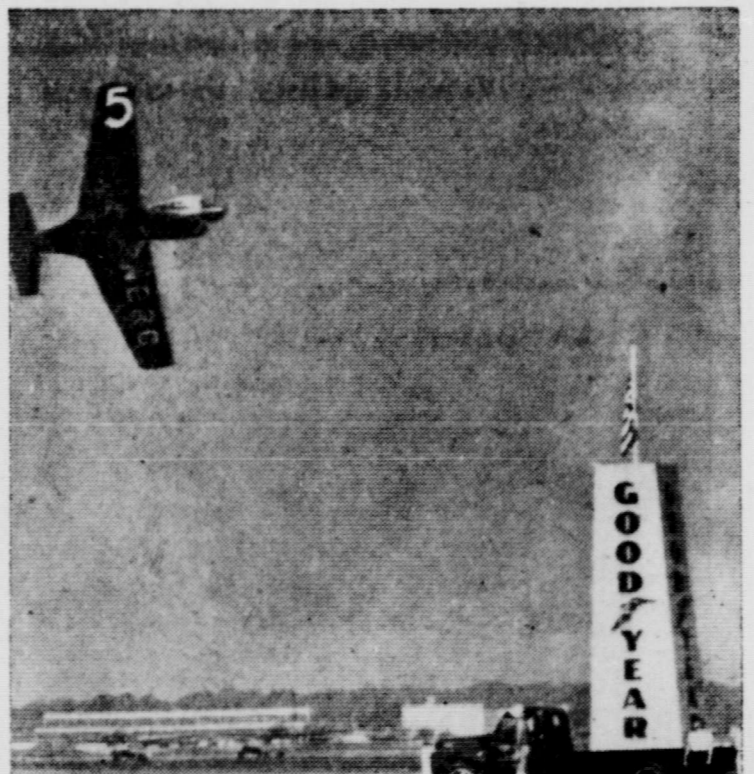
