Loboes to Try Hand at Throwing Steers in Game at Big Spring

Encouraged by an impressive send off by some 350 followers the Cisco Hi Loboes departed early Friday morning for Big Spring where the local gridders will invade the stomping grounds of the favored Steers of that city tonight. It will be the second game of the '48 season for both teams.

Kickoff time has been set for eight o'clock at Big Spring's Gruman Field, radio station KFLC, FM, Abilene, will broadcast the game with a play by play description for fans in Cisco who are unable to make the trip. The broadcast will be heard at Chesley Field.

With ideal football weather predicted by the weathermen a near capacity crowd is expected to fill the Gruman Field for the wild offensive clash predicted by rival coaches.

Although sports writers have earmarked the Steers as a one-touchdown favorite over the Loboes, Coach Hansard's warring squad appears in excellent condition after a week of strenuous drills, to shatter any hopes the Steers might have for a quick win. Both elevens lost their opening games last week. The Steers were herded to 32 to 0 defeat by Brownwood.

The Loboes will go into tonight's game minus the full time services of wing back George Watts, who is nursing a sprained ankle received in the Cisco-Cleburne unravelling. Watts, however, will see some action before the evening's hostilities are halted, Coach Hansard asserted.

Coaches were cheered and the moral of the Loboes boosted this week with the report that Roy Trapp, 140 pound versatile back, was ready for action. He saw action with the Loboes for a short time in the Cleburne game and impressed both coaches and fans. He is accurate passer and runner.

In tonight's game the Loboes will buck up against a formation similar to their own. Big Spring runs from single wing balanced line formation. The locals are expected to go to the air more tonight than in the opening game. A squad of 26 boys left by bus early today and they will be followed by the band and cheering section at a later hour.

HITCHCOCK ELOPES WITH STEPHANY

Wranglers Show Power In Losing to Hardin - Simmons

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College served notice on the Texas Junior College conference that they're potential power-houses as they dropped a 14 to 7 decision to a large versatile freshman team from Hardin-Simmons University of Abilene here Friday night. Several thousand fans saw the game.

Although they were considerably outweighted, the Wranglers made up what they lacked in size with speed and teamwork. Coaches Jack Everitt and Stormy Davis presented just about everything you would expect of a top-notch football team.

The Wranglers scored first as the initial period drew to a close. Paul Mosley intercepted a pass on Cisco's 15-yard line and raced back to Hardin's 48 to begin the drive. Doug Garner skirted right end for 28 yards to Hardin's 20. On the next play Jack Leveridge circled end for a touchdown, but the referee called the ball back and penalized Cisco.

Wosley then picked up six yards, and Garner hit Lee with an 18-yard pass and Leveridge with a pass good for 7 yards. McGuire picked up five yards and Garner hit the line for a touchdown. Mosley added the extra point.

The Freshmen scored first in the opening moments of the second half. They drove 68 yards on seven plays, with Bob Hart scoring. Watson converted.

The Yearling's winning score came late in the game when they intercepted a pass on Cisco's 12. Two plays later, Harold Taylor crossed the double-strip and Watson converted.

Outstanding run of the game was a 55-yard dash by Spec Tompkins after he intercepted a pass. Another feature of the game was Mosley's kicking. The Wrangler forward wall had several stars.

In the way of statistics, Cisco made six first downs, gained 75 yards rushing, 56 yards passing, with five completions of 14 attempts. Two passes were intercepted and five punts averaged 47 yards. The Wranglers drew four penalties totaling 50 yards.

The Freshmen made 15 first downs, gained 163 yards rushing, completed five of 13 passes for 79 yards with three interceptions. Five punts averaged 34 yards. They drew three penalties totaling 45 yards.

YOUR NATIONAL GUARD DIVISIONS CONTINUE THE OLD TRADITIONS

This is the eleventh of a series on the Infantry and Armored Divisions of the new National Guard. They are presented to acquaint you with the organization which will be an M-Day Force, trained, equipped and available for immediate service with the Regular Army in the event of any future declaration of war by an outlaw nation.

36th INFANTRY DIVISION—From the Alamo to Anlo, men of the Texas National Guard have stamped their fighting prowess indelibly in the annals of our constant efforts for freedom.

The Texas National Guard, from which the 36th Infantry Division sprang, came into being as volunteer companies and bands of fighting men during the Lone Star State's war for independence. These men were the defenders of the Alamo, and from this beginning the Texas Guard continued through Indian wars, a second war with Mexico, the Civil and Spanish-American Wars and Mexican border service.

In World War I the 36th Division was officially formed at Camp Bowie, Texas, in July, 1917, and its personnel was drawn from Guard outfits of both Texas and Oklahoma. By May of 1918 it had units in France, and soldiers of the 36th met and defeated the Kaiser's men at Meuse-Argonne and St. Mihiel to add more battle streamers to their colors.

Mobilized from Texas troops in November, 1940, the Lone Star division maneuvered in this country and sailed overseas in April of 1943. It landed in the gulf of Salerno, Italy and stormed the German-held beaches in early September.

From there, the 36th moved steadily up the bitterly-contested Italian peninsula, its men braving heavy fire, snow, mud and mountains for months on end. It was at Cassino and crossed the Rapido River. Shuttled to the Anzio beachhead in the Spring of 1944, it took a big part in the final drive that reached Rome.

Then the division, with its famous 141st, 142nd and 143rd Infantry Regiments, made one more amphibious landing. On August 15, 1944, it attacked the beaches at San Raphael, in southern France, and moved rapidly inland. War's end found it fighting in the heart of Germany, with some of the top leaders of all Nazism as its prize prisoners.

The fame of the "Fighting 36th" had spread far and wide. Many of its outfits had won Distinguished Unit Citations, and the French awarded their Croix de Guerre to the entire division.

Allotted back to its native Texas in the early postwar era, it's carrying on the old traditions today in America's new National Guard.

GEN. EICHELBERGER BACK FROM JAPAN

Lieutenant General Robert Lawrence Eichelberger, veteran leader in combat on four continents, who is rounding out 40 years' service in the U. S. Army, has returned to the United States after an absence of more than six years.

He comes home from Japan where since January 1, 1946, he commanded all the ground occupational troops, including American amphibious corps, airborne, cavalry, infantry and marine divisions and various units of the British Commonwealth forces. On the eve of the sudden surrender of Japan in August, 1945, General Eichelberger, in command of the Eighth Army, had been selected to strike the main blow in the proposed armed invasion of the Japanese mainland.

In the Mexican border warfare against Pancho Villa in 1916, First

Lieutenant Eichelberger, then seven years out of West Point, first came under enemy fire. Two years later he was chief intelligence officer of the American Expeditionary Forces in Siberia. After the capture of Novitskaya Lieutenant Colonel Eichelberger, armed with a rifle, at the imminent danger of his own life covered the withdrawal of a platoon and the recovery of American wounded. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross. On that decoration he now wears two oak leaf clusters, one for "extraordinary heroism in action in New Guinea. As commander of the Buna sector, Lieutenant General Eichelberger displayed extraordinary courage, marked efficiency and precise execution of operations during the Papuan campaign (1942-43)."

A typical American small town boy, Robert L. Eichelberger, born in Urbana, Ohio, March 9, 1886, was principally interested in outdoor life and the direction of sports during his high school days. After two years at Ohio State University, he was appointed to West Point where he was graduated in 1909. He was assigned to the infantry and in 1911 was ordered to the Panama Canal Zone, remaining until 1915 when he went to the troubled Mexican border.

His principal service in World War I was in Siberia. During this tour of duty he was brought in intimate contact with the Japanese Army and he obtained a comprehensive knowledge at first hand of the Japanese military machine. He was still present in Vladivostok on April 4, 1920, when the Japanese military, in violation of international agreement, seized Eastern Siberia claiming a non-existent attack by Russian troops.

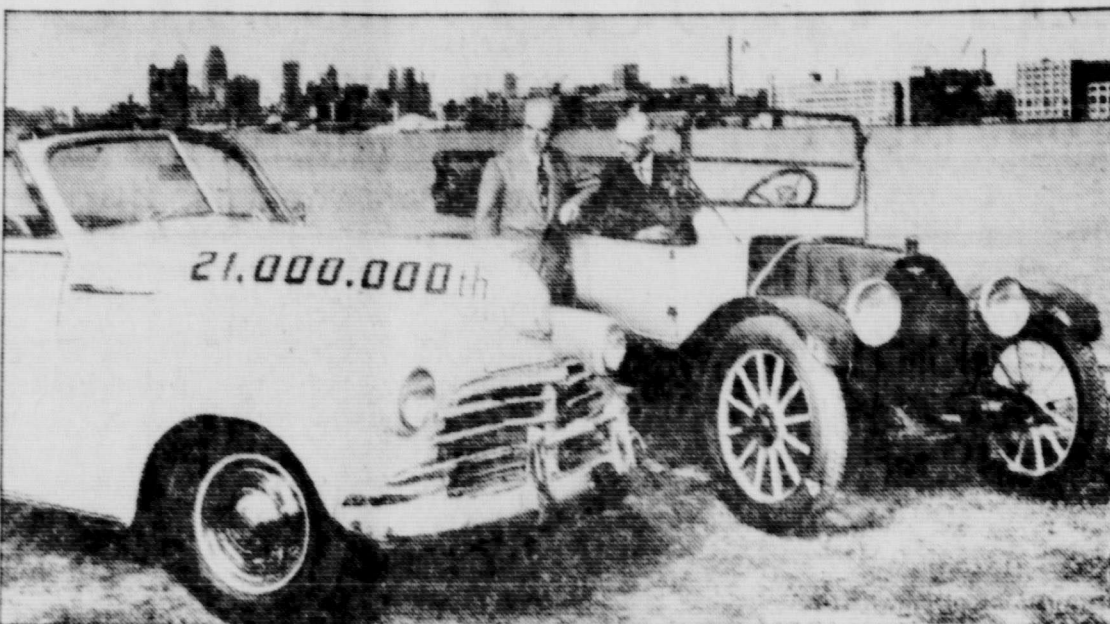
He returned to the United States in 1921 and was assigned to duty in the Military Intelligence Division, War Department General Staff. Subsequently he served as secretary of the General Staff.

His boyhood interest in sports served him in good stead when in 1940 he was appointed superintendent of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. He started the revitalization of the lagging Army football team by introducing the civilian coach system and bringing back Earl Blaik as head coach. Notable among other improvements he introduced at the Academy was the addition of flying to the regular course.

In January, 1942, he was designated commanding general of the 7th Infantry Division and a few months later was assigned to command the I Army Corps flying to Australia where he reported to General Douglas MacArthur. He led the corps through the struggle of the New Guinea campaign and in Papua, for the first time in the war, the Japanese were decisively defeated by American troops. Of him General Sir Thomas Blamey, senior Australian ground commander, said: "It has been his personality, drive and courage that kept the attack going. He went everywhere with his men, encouraging them and keeping them going at the Japanese."

In September, 1944, he was assigned to command the Eighth United States Army which he led through the last phases of the New Guinea campaign.

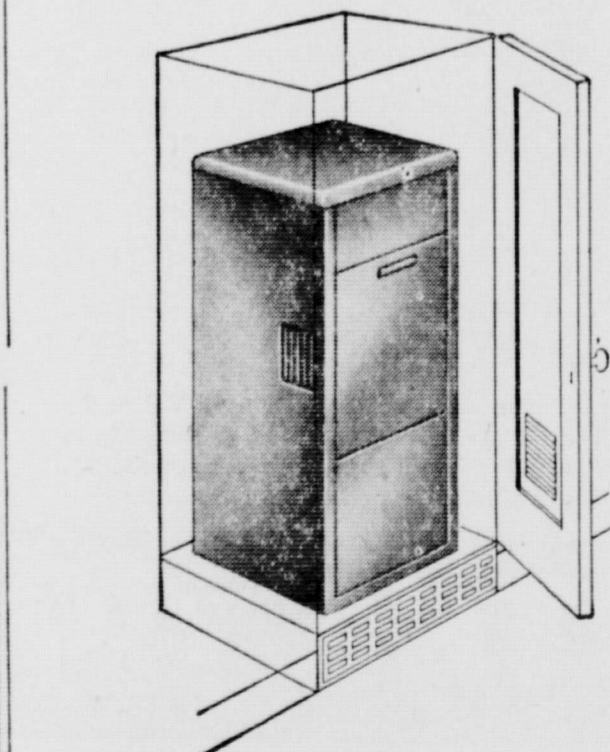
